PURIM NOTES TO PARENTS

This Wednesday evening we will usher in the holiday of Purim with the traditional Purim service, highlighted by the reading of the Megillah. This service is of exceptional interest to the children of our congregational family and we have made special arrangements in order to ensure that they will be comfortable and happy.

- 1. Students of Ramaz School will meet in the auditorium at 5:15 where they will receive their groggers and be led to their special section in the synagogue.
- Students of the Park East Religious School and all other children will meet in the gymnasium at 5:15. They will also receive the noisemakers and will be led from there to a special section in the main synagogue.
- 3. Once the children are left at their places of assembly, parents are urged to leave them in the hands of the teachers who will be present to supervise them. The children will be much better off if this request is followed, and their parents will be better able to enjoy the service.

The complete schedule for Purim can be summarized as follows:

5:15 Children from Ramaz assemble in the auditorium. At the same time students of the Park East Religious School and all other children assemble in the gymnasium.

Service Schedule –

5:30: Mincha services in the Synagogue Chapel.

6:00 Ma'ariv and the Reading of the Megillah in the Main Synagogue.

Purim Day

On Thursday, March 2, Purim Day, the regular morning service will begin at 7:00 o'clock in the Synagogue Chapel. The Megillah is read as part of this service. The observance of Purim Day is highlighted by the festive meal (seudah) which should be started on Thursday afternoon before nightfall. The special prayer of "Al Hanissim", which describes the miracle of divine deliverance from danger, is recited at every service on Purim and is included in every Grace after Meals.

THE WEEKLY PORTION Tetzaveh, Exodus 27:20 - 30:10 "Who Sanctifies a Sanctuary?"

The portion of Tetzaveh is principally concerned with the sanctification and dedication of the sanctuary and the priests who minister therein.

In concluding the rules for the sanctification of the Tabernacle, the Torah says in the words of God: "And I will meet there with the Children of Israel, and it will be sanctified with my honor."

The obvious inference from this verse is that only God's spirit can sanctify a Tabernacle and that man's preparations are merely preliminaries to the Divine sanctification.

The Midrash, however, is not content to accept this obvious inference as the last word. Our sages rephrase God's statement to read: "And it will be sanctified with my honored ones."

In other words, man, when he conducts himself honorably and with dignity, is the source of sanctity in the House of God. The Midrash describes the dishonor which two of Aaron's sons were destined to bring to the Tabernacle. They introduced an intoxicated spirit, strange modes of worship, and a rebellious attitude to the sanctuary.

When these spiritual aberrations were removed and when dignity, respect, and tradition were restored, God's sanctuary became once again a repository of holiness.

The conclusions from this Midrash are not irrelevant to the present day. A synagogue is as holy as are its members. The House of God is as Godly as are its worshippers. The "Beis Hakenesseth" is as sacred as are those who assemble therein.

A worshipful attitude on the part of man; a spirit of reverence in young and old; a sincere concern for religious ideals and behavior on the part of members; all of these set the stage for the sanctification of the House of God. Under such circumstances, the spirit of God dwells in the synagogue which thus becomes a sanctuary.

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein to Renew Supper Lectures

Rabbi to discuss "Two Approaches to the Jewish Faith" on Sundays March 19 and April 16

After several years of absence from the program of our congregation, the Sunday Supper Lecture Series will be resumed this year. The series is under the joint sponsorship of the Sisterhood and the Men's Club as part of the Adult Institute of the Congregation.

The lectures will be delivered by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein on March 19 and April 16. The general theme of the series will be "Two Approaches to the Jewish Faith." The first lecture will be entitled "The Non-Traditional Approach — Judaism and Sociological Factors." The second lecture will deal with "The Traditional Approach — Judaism and Halacha."

The Subject Matter

The twentieth century has witnessed the rise in America of three major streams of Jewish Life — the Reform, the Conservative and the Orthodox. The Rabbi will endeavor to explain why the first fwo streams were diverted from the traditional current of Judaism which has flowed continuously through 4,000 years of Jewish life.

Why was Reform Judaism a logical outgrowth of Jewish life in Germany? Why did Conservative Judaism receive its impetus from the Eastern European immigration to America in the late 19th and early 20th Century? What is Conservative Judaism, and what are reservoirs of its unusual popularity on the American scene. What is Orthodox Judaism? How does it differ from the non-traditional approaches? What are the prospects for

Jewish survival as implied in this tripartite division in American Jewish life?

These are some of the questions with which the Rabbi will concern himself in his lectures. Those who have attended these very popular series in the past know that his approach will be most forthright as well as erudite and comprehensive. Here is an opportunity for all of us to gain a more thorough understanding of the forces which affect Judaism in America today. Here is also an opportunity for all of us to clarify our own relationship to Judaism, to see where we stand and to explore the consequences of our position.

The Arrangements

The format of the Sunday Supper Lecture Series will be as follows. On each of the lecture nights, supper will be served at 6:30. The lecture will follow at about 8 o'clock. The entire program will be concluded at a reasonable hour.

The cost for the Supper Lecture Series will be a nominal one — \$5.00 for the two Supper Lectures and \$3.00 for one. Reservations must be made in advance.
