

AM HASEFER GROUP II DISCUSSES SKLARE'S "CONSERVATIVE JUDAISM"

Group II of the Am HaSefer Program held its second regular discussion meeting at the home of Rabbi and Mrs. Haskel Lookstein. The group has had many successful meetings in the past but this one excelled them all by far. For over two hours, the members discussed the sociological nature of Conservative Judaism.

Marshall Sklare, in his book on the subject, makes the point that this branch of Judaism was motivated largely by social forces and not by any particular religious dogma. As a matter of fact, the Conservative movement, which is now more than sixty years old, is still struggling to develop a uniform ideology — a struggle which is meeting with very limited success.

The reason for the absence of ideology in the Conservative movement is that its constituents, the laymen, are moved to accept religion on a practical basis rather than on an ideological one. Their decisions concerning the acceptance or rejection of kashruth, the Sabbath, worship and other features of Judaism are made individually and pragmatically without recourse to a consistent philosophy of religious observance.

In this connection, our discussion group, which is composed of people of varying degrees of observance, engaged in a prolonged discussion of an introspective nature. They asked themselves whether they, as Orthodox Jews, were not also making their religious decisions pragmatically rather than ideologically. A worshipper in an Orthodox synagogue, they felt, ought to be reminded from time to time that there are right and wrong, good and bad, legal behavior and illegal behavior in accordance with the principals of the Torah and Traditional Judaism.

There was a great deal of soul searching at this meeting, as members grappled sincerely with problems which touched upon every area of their lives. This was an example of discussion in the Talmudic sense—"learning is good when it affects action."

The next meeting of Group II of the Am HaSefer Program will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Akabas, on Monday evening, March 20. The book under discussion at that time will be "Judaism — A Historical Presentation" by Isidore Epstein.

CONGREGATIONAL SEDORIM TO BE HELD

Our members have already received information regarding the sedorim which will be held at our congregation on Friday night, March 31 and Saturday night, April 1.

In order to preserve the family character of these sedorim we can only accept reservations of members and those of their immediate families.

A great deal of planning and effort is required in order to make the sedorim as beautiful as they are each year. We must know, well in advance the number of members who plan to attend. PREPARING FOR PASSOVER What is Chometz?

Throughout the eight days of the festival, we abstain from eating any Chometz, i.e. foods which contain grains and which have been subjected to moisture.

Wheat, rye, barley, oats and, generally speaking, all grains and grain products, as well as foods and liquids made from them, are subject to the laws of Chometz.

All baked articles, candy, soft drinks, wines, liquors, milk, canned foods, and dry fruits, as well as other similarly processed foods, must have a reliable endorsement by a recognized rabbinical authority. Our suggestion, contained in last week's Bulletin, continues to be appropriate. Wherever possible, products should be used that are manufactured by the reputable Matzoh firms. An alternate suggestion would be to use products which carry the endorsement of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations for Passover use.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

Vayakhel-Pekude, Exodus 35:1-40:58; Number 19:1-22

"Rest on the Sabbath"

These two portions from the Torah are primarily concerned with the construction of the Tabernacle. It is surprising, therefore, that the first portion opens with a brief statement concerning the religious obligation of every Jew to rest on the Sabbath.

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This unusual introduction provides the Talmud with the clue to the Torah concept of "rest" on the Sabbath. The juxtaposition of the Sabbath to the construction of the Tabernacle indicates to our sages that the creative labors required for building the sanctuary are the labors which are prohibited on the Sabbath Day.

In other words, on the Sabbath, the concept of "rest" is different from the modern notion implied by that word. Rest on the Sabbath day means a cessation not from work per se, but rather from creative activity. There are 39 categories of creative activity which were necessary fo the constuction of the Tabernacle. These categories are what the Torah excludes from our Sabbath activities.

The question has often been asked. Why does Jewish Law oppose the switching on of an electric light on the Sabbath day? It may be, that in olden times, the creation of fire required great exertion in cutting down the trees, slicing the wood and generating a spark. Nowadays, however, the operating of an electric switch could hardly be considered an exertion.

In view of the introduction above, this question has an obvious answer. What is prohibited on the Sabbath is not exertion but rather creativity. The generation of an electric current is every bit as creative today as was the generation of a spark of fire 3,000 years ago. Perhaps it is even more so in our day. Electricity is necessary for so many of the machines and utensils which make possible all sorts of creative activity. Abstaining from the use of electricity on the Sabbath is a way of saying that all the creative powers which we possess are, in reality, derived from God. On the seventh day of each week we take cognizance of that derivation by desisting from all manner of creative activity.

FIRST CONFERENCE OF HEBREW HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO BE HELD AT K. J.

Fifteen students from the Park East Religious School will be among the one hundred and fifty students attending the first conference of Hebrew High School Students which will take place on Sunday, March 19, 1961 at our congregation.

The program, arranged by the Metropolitan Commission on Talmud Torah Education, which is sponsored by the Yeshiva University Synagogue Council, will bring together students from a score of schools in the metropolitan area for a day of Jewish inspiration and comradery.

Revolving about the theme, "Understanding our Heritage", the program will feature panels and discussions on current Jewish issues, guest personalities, elections of an inter Hebrew High School Council and a concluding Jewish Music Festival program.
