CAPACITY AUDIENCE HEARS RABBI JOSEPH H. LOOKSTEIN AT SUPPER LECTURE

Non-Traditional Approach to Judaism Discussed

After an interlude of four years, the Sunday Supper Lecture Series returned to the educational program of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun. The return was effected in grand style. Some 200 members of the congregational family attended the first lecture in a two part series on the general subject "Two Approaches to the Jewish Faith." The first lecture was entitled "The Non Traditional Approach-Judaism and Sociological Factors".

The series, which forms an integral part of the program of our Adult Institute, is under the joint sponsorship of the Sisterhood and Men's Club of the Congregation. Under the expert and "Balabatish" leadership of Mrs. Joseph Roth, a committee of some 15 Sisterhood women administered the culinary portion of the evening with grace and precision. The dinner was an excellent one, made even more so by these ladies who served so cheerfully.

At about 7:45, Elgin Shulsky, President of the Men's Club, rose to introduce Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein. The Rabbi began by offering a definition of religion. He termed it a "personal commitment, expressed in a social environment and motivated by suprasocial considerations."

Judaism - Socially Oriented

Judaism, as explained by the Rabbi, is a socially oriented religion in which man can find God only after discovering his fellow man. In Judaism, public worship is always preferable to private devotion. Prayers are never recited in the singular, always in the plural. In the throes of illness, a stricken soul prays to God to, "heal us". In the grip of economic depression, a stricken individual calls to God to "bless us with a good year". In the aftermath of sin, a contrite heart confesses "the sins which we have com-

mitted." In the process of an agonizing reappraisal of values, a penitent personality prays to God to "forgive us."

Judaism - Supra-Social

Despite its socially-minded character, Judaism demands that the individual be prepared to rise above society when the times require it. "Moses took the tent and pitched it outside of the camp." When a people worships a golden calf then the individual must divorce himself from the ideals of society. In order to be "in bounds" with God, one must sometimes be "out of bounds" with man.

The prophets were such suprasocial individuals who disassociated themselves from the idolatry and adultery of their time, from the exploitation of the weak and from the degradation of the poor. Examples abound in history where pious Jews reacted against sociological factors, resisted them, survived them, and ultimately triumphed over them.

The present non-traditional approaches to Judaism are not of a supra-social character. They are, rather, the result of attempts by the acculturated Jew to mold his religion in accordance with the requirements of his environment. Acculturation is that process, whereby an individual adapts and adjusts himself to the culture of his land. As a social phenomenon, it is a process of considerable value. As religious motivation, it is of questionable purpose. The beautiful modern temples which give the Jew a feeling of ethnic solidarity, a means of identification or a higher level of social

AUTHOR AT AM HASEFER MEETING

Group 1 of the Am HaSefer Program met recently to discuss "The Cat in the Ghetto", a series of vignettes on life in the ghetto of Lodz under Nazi occupation and the terror of Auschwitz. The author of the book, Rachmil Bryks, was present at the meeting and accepted graciously the unstinting praise of the members of the group for his work.

Mr. Bryks, whose older daughter is a student at the Ramaz School, explained how he gleaned his material from personal experience. He and his wife - she shared this same experience - elaborated upon the ingenious methods which the Germans utilized to maintain their Jewish victims in a docile and submissive state. For years they studied the Jewish people and learned that their powerful faith could be used to blind them to reality. And so it was. No matter how brutal the treatment which they received, the Jews as a group refused to believe that the Nazis were bent on genocide. Things were bound to get better and conditions would improve.

This same faith, which was insidiously utilized by the Nazis to lead a people like cattle to the slaughter, was also the redemptive force which made life under the blackest conditions bearable. Many Jews felt that, despite intolerable persecutions, they had to show their superiority of the spirit to the Aryan beasts. They had to display human dignity in the face of moral depravity, and the triumph of love and tenderness of humanity over the hatred and loss of the animal.

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Paradoxically, it was a 19th century German philosopher who stated: "He who has a why to live for, can bear with almost any how." The remnant of Jews who survived the concentration camps is eloquent testimony to the philosopher's judgment. "The Cat in the Ghetto" is a memorable account of this saga of faith. It is recommended reading for all sensitive people.

To mention more names would be to run the risk of omitting one of the ardent workers for this affair. To mention less, would be unfair to those who were singularly responsible for its success.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein Presents "This is your Life"

Following the opening remarks of Mrs. Meyer Texon, the President of the Sisterhood, Max J. Etra brought greetings as President of the Congregation and Elgin Shulsky spoke briefly on behalf of the Men's Club. Mrs. Moses P. (Judith) Epstein, former National President of Hadassah, whose mother was one of the first presidents of the Sisterhood, spoke nostalgically of the good old days of the Congregation when young ladies came to the synagogue, not always for religious communion, but to meet prospective young men. She might have added that times has not changed so radically.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein then surprised the ladies with a presentation entitled "This is Your Life, Kehilath Jeshurun Sisterhood". Tracing the Sisterhood back to the Victorian Age, the Assistant Rabbi enabled the women to relive the history of the Sisterhood; at times in a humorous vein and on occasion in a serious mood.

During the course of his presentation, the Rabbi mentioned all of the past Presidents who were present at the affair. He cited the individual qualities of each of them and the events which made each of their terms of office significant.

In conclusion he offered the wish that: "this milestone be for the Sister-hood, not the culmination of effort

but a beginning of achievement; that it signify, not the end of an era but the onset of a golden age; that it constitute, not the twighlight of the Sisterhood's organizational life, but the dawn of accomplishment and fulfillment. In short, may it always be said that for the Kehilath Jeshurun Sisterhood, life begins at 75."

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Concludes

The concluding remarks were offered by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein. In commenting on this 75th Anniversary, the Rabbi said that Jews do not believe in birthdays. To be born is not an achievement for it is not a result of the celebrant's efforts. What is significant, is the continuity of life as it spins its way through the tap-

estry of time. The 75 years of the Sisterhood demonstrate the abiding persistence of an Orthodox synagogue and its affiliates. The record of the Sisterhood achievements is further evidence of the judgement that Orthodox Judaism is not stagnant nor rigid but rather dynamic and resilient. Resiliency is "the power to bend without breaking". This is characteristic of Traditional Judaism.

The Rabbi complimented the women on 75 years of achievement, fruitful accomplishments and fulfillment. He expressed the hope that "All of us should meet at the Donor Luncheon of the Sisterhood on its 100th Anniversary". To all of this, the women answered silently, Amen.

status, are not necessarily religious institutions. If a Jew needs a sumptuous House of Worship in order to "rate" with his Presbyterian neighbor, then such a House reminds one of the judgment of the Prophet: "Israel forgot its Maker, and it built temples."

Herberg and Sklare Cited

Quoting liberally from Will Herberg's "Protestant, Catholic and Jew" and from "Marshall Sklare's Conservative Judaism", the Rabbi illustrated the socially motivated character of certain forms of non-traditional Judaism. These books, both of which were read in our Am HaSefer programs during the past two seasons, are studies of the sociological forces which at present are the prime motivations for all religion in America.

The crucial question which each individual—Orthodox, Conservative or Reform—must ask himself is "Why am I associated with a particular religious group?" The answer of many Jews in America to this question would have to be that their religion is externally and socially conditioned. The response of the Jew should be that his commitment to God is both unconditioned and unconditional. It is this second response which Rabbi Lookstein will discuss on April 16 at the second supper lecture. The title of that lecture will be "The Traditional Approach — Judaism and Halachah".

THE WEEKLY PORTION

"Shabbat HaGadol"

This Sabbath is called in Jewish tradition "Shabbat HaGadol" — the Great Sabbath. There is some controversy concerning the reason for the special title.

The most popular opinion considers the name to be derived from the special Haftarah for this Sabbath which comes from the final chapter of Malachi, the last prophets. The final verses read: "Behold I will send you Elijah the prophet before the coming of the Great and fearful day of the Eternal. And He shall restore the heart of fathers to children and the heart of children to fathers . . .

The Great Sabbath, then, refers to the Great day of judgment and redemption. The ultimate redemption, according to the Talmud is destined to take place in Nisan even as did the first redemption. It is interesting to note the nature of the ultimate redemption — an era of family peace and human brotherhood.

A second, and more scholarly, view indicates that the name "The Great Sabbath" is derived from the outstanding personality who used to address the People in ancient times. Every Sabbath afternoon a scholar would offer words of instruction and comfort. On the Sabbath before Passover, the greatest scholar would speak. Thus the name, "The Great Sabbath".

It might be added that, for Kehilath Jeshurun, the Great Sabbath has an added significance this year. It is the day which we are devoting to the honor and support of an institution which produces great scholars who speak words of instruction and comfort to the American Jewish community.

Ours is a Great Sabbath because we celebrate the achievements of the Great Yeshiva — Yeshiva University.

HEBREW HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS CONVENE AT KEHILATH JESHURUN

The first annual Kinus (Convention) of the Hebrew High Schools affiliated with the Metropolitan Commission on Talmud Torah Education was held at Kehilath Jeshurun on Sunday, March 19. Over one hundred youngsters attended from the five boroughs and the suburban areas of Metropolitan New York.

Mr. Joseph Fuchs, Principal of the Park East Religious School served as the coordinator of the Kinus. Rabbi Norman Lamm, Assistant Rabbi of the Jewish Center, spoke on the theme of the convention: "Understanding Our Heritage". Following this talk, the delegates were divided into five panel discussion groups to consider various aspects of the central theme.

At noon time, the children were served lunch and Paula Ballan, a graduate of our Religious School, entertained with Israeli songs on her guitar. The luncheon was followed by Mincha services in the chapel. The afternoon session was devoted to reports from the individual panels, greetings by Rabbi Morris Finer, Director of the Community Service Division of Yeshiva University, and a closing inspirational talk by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein.

This convention marked the inauguration of a new and elite youth organization for students in the Metropolitan Hebrew High Schools associated with Orthodox Synagogues. We have every reason to believe that this organization will make a significant contribution to the future of traditional Judaism in our area.

PASSOVER NOTES

There are several important matters that should be kept in mind during the last few days before the Passover Festival.

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On Thursday evening, March 30, every Jewish home should be inspected to make sure that all chometz has been removed. Like every religious practice, there is a ceremony connected with this inspection. It is well to observe that ceremony, not alone because it is a religious requirement, but because it affords an opportunity to impress the children of the household. The benedictions to be recited are found in any standard Haggadah.

Disposal of Chometz

No chometz may be eaten on Friday March 31, after 9:50 A.M. All chometz must be completely disposed of by 10:50 o'clock Friday morning.

Sale of Chometz

The ritual sale of chometz must be completed by early Friday morning, March 31. For those who cannot attend to this matter in person, there is a form provided on this page which authorizes Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein to sell your chometz. This form should be returned to the synagogue by Thursday morning.

Service for First Born

Passover Eve is a traditional fast for the first born. It is obligatory upon every first born who cannot observe the fast on Friday, March 31, to attend the special service on that day and to participate at its conclusion in the light collation that is served. The service for the first born (Siyum Bechorim) will be held in the Chapel on Friday, March 31, as part of the regular morning service. It will begin at 7:30. The attendance at this service grows from year to year and we urge all first born to make a special effort to attend.

Y. U. Dedicates Petegorsky Chair

The David W. Petegorsky Chair in Political Science was dedicated last week by Yeshiva University. The Chair was named in memory of the late Executive Director of the American Jewish Congress who was ordained by Yeshiva, who was a member of our Congregation, and whose twin boys attend the lower school of Ramaz.

Helen Hayes Banned in Egypt

A touring American theatre group, featuring the world renowned Helen Hayes, has been refused permission to give three good will performances in the United Arab Republic because the troupe will later perform in Tel Aviv. U. A. R. authorities made it clear that Egyptians did not care to receive an international good will offer which would include Israel on its itinerary.

Israel — Yugoslavia Trade to Continue

The Israel — Yugoslav trade pact has been extended for two years. The agreement calls for imports by each country of \$7,200,000 worth of products. Israel will buy mainly timber and metal. Yugoslavia will purchase tires, citrus fruits and rayon fibres.
