ADULT INSTITUTE CONCLUDES SEASON Preparations for Next Year Under Way

Beginning on Saturday afternoon, April 15, the class in "Ethics of the Fathers" will meet one hour before Mincha Services. This class has become increasingly popular from year to year. We hope that this interest will continue to manifest itself during the coming months.

With the closing of the regular season of the Adult Institute, plans

are being made for next year's season. In order to help us with these plans, we are sending a one page questionnaire to the members of the congregation in order to determine their needs and preferences. OVER \$4,000 CONTRIBUTED TO PASSOVER RELIEF APPEAL

YOUNG MARRIEDS DISCUSS "LAST OF THE JUST"

A very enjoyable and stimulating evening was spent by the Young Marrieds Group of the Congregation recently at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Mortimer J. Blumenthal. On that occasion the group participated in a discussion of Andre Schwartz-Bart's novel, "The Last of the Just."

The reaction to the book was a very mixed one. The majority view maintained that this was a book which was sufficiently powerful to survive even the rigorous test of translation. The book is written in a moving fashion and the characters in it are clearly delineated and intensely human, capable of, arousing the readers' sympathies. The symbolism of the book was not completely clear although it was felt that the protagonist and his ancestors represented the totality of the Jewish people as it suffered through the last 900 years of exile, culminating in the Nazi holocaust.

The proponents of this view criticized the historical inaccuracies of the book as well as the Christological implications in the author's view of the purpose for human suffering.

While it was agreed that the book aroused considerable emotions on the part of the reader, several members felt that this was due primarily to the events which the author described and not to the way in which he described them. As one might imagine the discussion was quite exhilarating. Perhaps this, more than any other single factor, is indicative of the book's intrinsic worth.

FINAL PASSOVER NOTES

There are several important matters that should be kept in mind for Passover Eve.

Disposal of Chometz

No Chometz may be eaten on Friday, March 31, after 9:50 A.M. All Chometz must be completely disposed of by 10:50 o'clock, Friday morning.

Sale of Chometz

The sale of Chometz must be completed by early Friday morning. Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein will be at the synagogue until 10 A.M. on that day for those who would like to attend to this matter in person and who may not have taken care of it before.

Service for First Born

According to Jewish tradition, all first born sons must fast on Passover Eve. Tradition provides, however that if the first born participates in a religious, festive celebration, he is not required to fast. Such a celebration will be conducted as part of the regular morning service on Friday, March 31. The service begins at 7:30. The attendence at this service grows from year to year. We urge all first born to make a special effort to be with us on Friday morning.
