

RAMAZ HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES 32 82% Win Regents Scholarships

The class of 1961 at Ramaz High School has surpassed the exemplary traditions of its predecessors. 32 Seniors distinguished themselves in every facet of academic life. The academic record of this class and the abundance of honors won by its members are a source of pride to the school and to Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun, its sponsor.

The following colleges have each admitted several students from this graduating class: Barnard, Boston University, C.C.N.Y., Columbia, Cornell, Gaucher, Hofstra, Hunter, N. Y. U., Queens, R.P.I., University of Pennsylvania and Yeshiva University, among others.

23 Regents Scholarships

Out of the 28 students who were eligible for the Board of Regents Scholarship Examination, 23 were awarded scholarships. This represents an unbelievable 82% of the graduating class. To the best of our knowledge no other school in the State has ever compiled such a record.

Our students have also distinguished themselves by winning Engineering Scholarships, by a position of finalists in the National Merit Scholarship, by winning the Bausch and Lomb Award, the Jewish Agency Award for excellence in Hebrew, the Mayor's citation for outstanding achievement, the Betty Crocker Home Maker Award, the American Medical Society Student Award and other academic honors.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

SHELACH

"The Grasshopper Complex"

In this week's portion we read how the Children of Israel sent spies to tour the Promised Land before attempting to enter and conquer it. The spies returned with mixed feelings about the Land.

On the one hand, they saw this Land as one flowing with milk and honey. They brought back samples of the delicious fruit of its trees and soil. On the other hand, they reported that the Children of Israel could not possibly conquer the Land. The inhabitants were giants and the fortifications were too powerful.

One phrase which they used is most revealing. "We were in our own eyes as grasshoppers; and so were we in their eyes". This is known as the grasshopper complex. It means that if a person views himself as inadequate, then he actually renders himself inadequate thereby. Moreover, if a person considers himself inferior, it is most likely that others will see him as he sees himself.

Two of the spies did not suffer from this kind of complex. Their reaction to the problem of conquering the Land was: "We shall surely go up and inhabit it for we are fully equal to the task". These were the words of giants and not of grasshoppers. Those who spoke these words eventually led the children of Israel in triumph into the Promised Land.
