MIDNIGHT SELICHOTH SERVICE

The High Holy Day Season, will be ushered in on Saturday night, September 22nd with the traditional Selichoth Service.

As in past years, this service, which inaugurates the penitential season, will contain all of the special features which have made it a wonderful experience for the entire congregational family.

"Midnight" Snack

The proceedings begin with a "Midnight" Snack, sponsored by the Sisterhood and Men's Club, to which all the members of these groups, as well as the entire membership of the congregation, are invited.

Our congregational family has been scattered all over the world during the past few months. Many new people have recently moved into the neighborhood and will be worshipping with us for the first time. The pre-Selichoth snack is an ideal time to meet old friends and to greet the newcomers. This "social hour" will begin at 11:30 p.m.

At 12:30, the congregation will assemble in the main synagogue for the Selichoth Service. The service, which lasts a little over an hour, is rendered more intelligible by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein's interpolations and explanations. Congregational melodies and responsive readings will enable all to participate actively.

For the convenience of the ladies, a special section will be reserved for them on the main floor of the Synagogue.

In recent years, more and more young people have come to feel that Selichoth is not a service for the "old folks", but rather a religious experience which they too find rewarding. A special invitation is extended to the teenagers and young adults of our community to come and to bring their friends.

Our warmest invitation is extended to the entire congregational family to attend the "Midnight" Snack and the Selichoth Service this year, and thereby usher in the High Holy Day season in the proper religious spirit.

WITH RABBI LOOKSTEIN IN ISRAEL

Rabbi and Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein should be on the high seas by the time this Bulletin reaches you. They will return home, please God, early next week. Much of their time abroad was spent in Israel where the Rabbi reviewed the status of Bar Ilan University of whose Board of Governors he is President.

While in Israel the Rabbi delivered a paper at the World Conference on

Jewish Education held in Jerusalem. He was asked by Moshe Sharett to submit the paper to the Jewish Agency for publication following the extremely favorable comments on it in the public press. Rabbi Lookstein was also elected this summer to the Merkaz Olami of Mizrachi, an executive council of 15 members which directs the world movement of Religious Zionists.

"A RELIGIOUS CHECKLIST FOR THE YEAR-END INVENTORY"

THE WEEKLY PORTION KEE TAVO

Among the acts and attitudes which are included in the curses in this week's portion is the failure "to uphold the commands of this Torah regarding their performance." On the surface this category presents a difficulty. If it includes the violation of any command in the Torah, then the preceding categories dealing with incest, hired murderers, exploiters of the weak, etc., are superfluous.

Nachmanides, therefore, considers this category to be a general one referring not to the performance of the mitzvoth but rather to the acceptance of them. He cites that the paramount concern here is in the affirmation of the validity of the commandments by the Jew, the acceptance of them in his heart, and the understanding that they entail some form of retribution. "But if he violates one of them (the commands), for example by eating . . . (non kosher foods) because of his desire, or by not using a sukkah or a lulav due to laziness, he is not included in this . . .

According to Nachmanides, therefore, there are two levels of disregard for the Torah which are recognized by the Torah itself. The first level is characterized by a full acceptance of the law but by only a partial compliance with it. On this level the Jew recognizes the validity of shabbos, kashruth, and all the other laws but, for one reason or another, he is not able to conform fully to all the requirements of the law.

This is characteristic of a group of people who have been called "the non observant orthodox." Every Jew is in this category to the extent that he violates some part of the law while still accepting its full validity. This is not unlike the fellow who exceeds a speed limit for one reason or another without disputing the right of the city to impose limits and the obligation of the police to enforce them.

The second level of disregard is of an entirely different nature. Here the validity of the law itself is questioned and the right of the Torah to impose limits is challenged. To people of this outlook, Judaism is not law but custom or folkway, habit or tradition. There is no binding character to Jewish practice and the Jew is not obligated to conform to the standards of the Torah.

The crucial interpretation of Nachmanides here is that the entertaining

of such a position is equally to be deplored whether it is toward all 613 mitzvoth or confined to only one rule. The denial of the validity of one law in a God given system is tantamount to repudiating the whole structure. Moreover, if one accepts the law, then even if, at a given moment, he cannot fulfill it entirely, he leaves the door open for a return. If, however, the law itself is denied, there is nothing to which to return.

Jewry Duty, a "first" with Kehilath Jeshurun, is a plan by which a member in our community is "summoned" to attend the morning services during one week of the year. HEADLINES OF

Foul Ball

For the second time in recent weeks an Asiatic Moslem country has invited Israel athletes to participate in games and then denied them entry.

Israel is a member of the Asiatic Games Federation and had been invited by Indonisia to participate in the Fourth Annual Asian games. The Israel team which was organized to go to Jakarta was denied entry permits.

The second incident involved the State of Malaya in which games celebrating that country's independence were held. The Israel Soccer Team was invited to compete in the tournament. The British Counsel in Tel Aviv issued the Malayan visas but less than twenty fours hours before the Israel team was to embark, the visas were ordered cancelled.

300 Ancient Scrolls Released By India

The White House request to Prime Minister Nehru of India to release 300 ancient Torah Scrolls has been met with a favorable response by India.

Indian authorities had refused to allow the export of the scrolls, inasmuch as restrictions on the export of silver were in force in that country. The scrolls, used by former Jewish communities of Calcutta, are encased in ornate vertical silver containers. Recently, U. S. Ambassador John Kenneth Galbraith reported that success had been achieved and that the scrolls will be released. The scrolls will be distributed to various synagogues throughout America.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein may be heard on the radio over Station WABC on the program, New York Religious Composite - Today's Judaism. The program, produced in cooperation with the New York Board of Rabbis is on the air Sunday evening from 11:20 P.M. until 11:40 P.M.
