ALEXANDER GROSS, HENRY M. REM AND IRWIN SHAPIRO RECEIVE TORAH HONORS

Three outstanding sons of Kehilath Jeshurun have been selected for special Torah honors this year. Mr. Alexander Gross was designated as "Chasan Torah". Mr. Henry M. Rem was appointed "Chasan Bereshith" and Mr. Irwin Shapiro will be "Chasan Maftir".

Alexander Gross is one of the most devoted members of Kehilath Jeshurun and one of its most generous supporters. For some time now he has been serving with distinction as one of the most faithful trustees of the congregation. His wife Lola served as Vice-President of the Sisterhood and remains one of the most active members of that organization.

Mr. Gross' particular love is, of course, Ramaz School. His daughter Alice, now Mrs. David Beier, is, like her husband, a graduate of Ramaz. His son Steven is at present a junior in the Ramaz High School.

Over the years, his greatest concern was the Scholarship Fund of Ramaz School through which countless de-

serving children are able to enjoy the benefits of the institution. For a number of years, he led the Ramaz Parents' Council in giving and getting others to give, to make possible the Scholarship Aid Program.

At the present time, he is girding himself to direct the campaign of the parents for the Building Fund, towards the erection of the new Ramaz School building. He is confident that the quota of \$250,000 will be raised by the parents.

In the community at large, he is one of the respected hotel men of our city. He always finds time, however, for Yeshiva University, for the Bronx Hospital of whose Board he is a member, and for other great causes in the community. He is one of the early Founders of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine.

Henry M. Rem is relatively new in the congregation; yet in the short time that he is with us he proved himself one of the precious assets of Kehilath Jeshurun.

Early in his career as a member he was made an Associate Trustee, and at the last Annual Meeting, in recognition of his great service, he was promoted to a full Trustee.

He, too, is one of the valiant workers and leaders in Ramaz. His wife Mary shares his enthusiasm for the institution. Their two sons, Gerard and Richard, are students at Ramaz.

Henry M. Rem is one of the bestnatured and warm-hearted individuals to have come into our midst. An industrialist involved in numerous business ventures and enterprises, he nevertheless, is associated with great causes and movements. Many an institution of learning and mercy is familiar with his quiet and sincere generosity. Chief among them is, of course, Yeshiva University.

He comes from a distinguished rabbinic family and traces his ancestry to great names in the Hassidic world.

Irwin Shapiro married into Kehilath Jeshurun. His wife Ruth is the daughter of our late, unforgettable trustee, Samuel Schreiber and of Mrs. Schreiber.

It is not generally known that our "Chasan Maftir" is an ordained rabbi whose rabbinic education was received at Yeshiva University where he was one of the gifted students of Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik. With becoming humility he does not use his title "Rabbi" but prefers to be a learned, pious and exemplary layman. He received his general academic training at the same institution.

We greet the "Grooms of the Law" and assure them that the congregation is proud of the honors conferred upon them. The warmest and sincerest blessings and congratulations are extended to the recipients of the honors and to their families.

In keeping with the tradition of Kehilath Jeshurun, the Grooms of the Law will be inducted into office at the Musaf service on Shemini Atzereth. On that occasion they will be escorted to the seats of honor alongside the Holy Ark. They will preside as officers of the congregation during the rest of the festival. The congregation is urged to attend the induction service and in that way pay tribute to these deserving gentlemen.

MEN'S CLUB TO LAUNCH SEASON AT FATHER AND SON MINYAN ANNIVERSARY

The opening meeting of the year for the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club will be held on Sunday morning, October 28. The meeting has been specially arranged to coincide with the opening of the 15th Anniversary season of the Father and Son Minyan.

For the past decade and a half, the Men's Club has been sponsoring this regular activity of the Congregation. During this period a generation of young men was trained in the knowledge of the prayers, in the conduct of the weekday service and in the appreciation of the importance of regular worship. From year to year this wonderful activity draws ever increasing numbers of teen-agers each Sunday morning from just after Sukkoth until shortly before Passover.

The program of the Minyan is a well planned one. It begins with a regular morning service at 9:30, conducted by the young people themselves. It continues at 10:30 with a community breakfast in the social hall and it concludes with a spirited session of basketball in the gymnasium.

An Annual Event

Continuing a practice started three years ago, the Men's Club is devoting its first meeting of the year to a combined program with the Father and Son Minyan. The men will participate in the service and in the breakfast. After the children have gone to the gymnasium, Abraham Stern, the Director of the Youth Bureau of Yeshiva University's Community Serv-

ice Division, will address the Club on the subject, "Reaching the Unreached Jewish Youth."

Mr. Stern, a graduate of Yeshiva University's Teachers Institute and College of Liberal Arts, holds a Master of Science Degree in Social Group Work. He is at present writing his dissertation for the Ph.D. degree at the Graduate School of Public Administration at New York University.

Although young in years, Mr. Stern has already become one of the foremost authorities on Jewish youth in the United States. Formerly the Executive Director of Mizrachi Hatzair, he came to the Youth Bureau in 1954 and has been instrumental in organizing, among other things, the celebrated Torah Leadership Seminar Program and the Yeshiva University Summer Institute.

He is familiar with the problems of Jewish youth in metropolitan areas and in suburbia, and he will no doubt have much to contribute in connection with the subject which he has chosen.

We are inviting to this special Anniversary program, a group of the "alumni" of the Minyan, many of whom have, by this time, been graduated from college and have taken their places in the community. A special invitation is extended to all members of the Men's Club to come to this meeting, to see the dividends on their investment and to hear an important message from a leading expert on youth.

The singing and the dancing contribute to the gaiety. The marching of Junior Marshals before each Torah procession compounds the joy. The impromptu choir of young people, which supports the Cantor as he incorporates a medley of congregational melodies into the prayers, furthers the atmosphere of merriment. It is a wonderful evening and day for the whole family, with the children serving as the guests of honor.

In order to enable the evening services to run smoothly we should like to call your attention to the following matters:

- 1. Come with your families but please refrain from bringing children under 4 years of age to the synagogue. Experience has shown that their limited attention span works a hardship upon the children themselves and upon the adults who would like to enjoy the proceedings.
- 2. Please bring the children to the synagogue chapel on time no later than 5:45. Please also be good enough not to bring them before 5:30 because a long wait will only make them restless.
- Paraphrasing a well known commercial statement, "Don't make a fuss; leave their care to us." Competent leaders will be in charge of the children and are equipped to deal with all their needs.

After the benediction, you may meet your children in the main synagogue lobby (downstairs) where they will receive the special sweets which constitute so vital a part of the Simchath Torah tradition.

Remember the schedule: Mincha at 5:50 - children not before 5:30 and not after 5:45. Come and participate in the festivities.
