

"THE STORY OF BIBLE TRANSLATIONS"

The New Translation and its Critics

By this time, you have probably received your Adult Institute Brochure which announces the Adult Education Program of our Congregation for the 1962-63 season. This year for the first time, we will offer eight regular weekly courses throughout the season, courses which are designed to satisfy a variety of needs and tastes on the part of prospective students.

Regular features in addition to these courses are the series of brief lectures to be delivered by our Rabbis between mincha and ma'ariv on Saturday afternoons, an Am HaSefer program with two separate groups, each reading four books, a collegiate seminar, a selection of seasonal courses and our regular Adult Institute Open Lecture Series which this year will be given on the subject, "Four Jewish Communities and Their Leaders".

The first lecture of the year will be given by Professor Sidney B. Hoenig on Wednesday evening, November 7 on the subject "Philo and Alexandrian Jewry". Dr. Hoenig, Professor of Jewish History at Yeshiva University, will discuss the Alexandrian Jewish community of the First Century and its philosophic spokesman, Philo. Both the life of the Alexandrian Jew and the intellectual climate in which he lived bear striking similarities to our own day.

In his capacity as Director of the Yeshiva University Department of Adult Education, Dr. Hoenig will present Certificates of Achievement to three women who have amassed a total of more than eighty credits during the past four years, who have

THE WEEKLY PORTION "B'RESHITH"

A New Insight in a New Translation

The revised translation of the Bible which is currently the most celebrated project of the Jewish Publication Society, has drawn a variety of comments from a variety of quarters. This column is not the place in which to evaluate the translation or the comments thereon.

We should like to draw attention, however, to the new translation of the first verse of the bible. The traditional translation was, "In the beginning God created Heaven and Earth". The revised translation has it as "When God created Heaven and Earth . . ." There is little doubt that the revised translation is far more favorable not only to the intention of the text but to its grammar as well.

The word "B'reshith" does not mean "In the beginning"—which would be rendered rather 'Barishonah' — it means "in the beginning of". This, moreover, is the way in which Rashi translates the word. The revised translation of the Bible has merely taken the clumsy expression "In the beginning of the creation of Heaven and Earth" and changed it to the more readable "When God created Heaven and Earth".

The insight in accepting Rashi's interpretation is far more important even than the grammar. The new translation asserts implicitly that there was no intention on the part of the Torah to give the order of creation but rather merely to indicate that it is God who was responsible for creation. By beginning the Torah with this interpretation of Rashi, we are proclaiming in effect that the Torah is not a scientific book, nor is it a volume of history. It is a book reflecting God's will concerning man's actions. It is a book designed to lead man to ethical performance. In order to set the stage for the ethical imperatives in the Torah, God found it necessary to include an introductory section dealing with the general theme of his creation of the world and the creation of man in the image of God.

The new translation is happily not really new, but rather renewed. It is a renewal of the traditional outlook toward the Torah which seeks to find how the Bible envisions man's function in this world and what prescription God gives for man's conduct.

The highlight of the meeting was a talk by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein on the subject of anti-semitism as a manifestation of self-hatred on the part of the anti-semite. He showed how anti-semitism is not a rational phenomenon but is explainable rather only in understanding the irrational nature of man. When man or nation is confronted with failure or guilt, dissatisfaction or frustration, there is usually an irrational reponse of directing the hatred which one should have for one's self onto others who then assume the role of scapegoat.

The rabbi said that if there is no solution to anti-semitism just as there is no cure for fever, at least the Jew can fortify himself with a knowledge of himself and with a sense of self appraisal so that he is not floored by the irrational criticism of the anti-semite.
