THE WEEKLY PORTION LECH LECHA

"On Going It Alone"

When God commanded Abraham to leave his land, his birthplace and his father's house, he was in effect ordering the father of the Jewish People to "go it alone". Abraham's existence was to be a lonely one. His only companions in the worship of the One God would be those souls which he and Sara would attract to that worship. He would have no support from the outside. As a matter of fact, he might even be placed in danger of his very life in trying to live by the principles which he cherished.

In emulating the first patriarch, the Jewish People has consistently shown an ability to stand in the heroic posture and to "go it alone". As a matter of fact, it has often seemed as if the periods of greatest religiosity and piety have occurred when the conditions were most unfavorable for such behavior.

There is an important view of Jewish history which states that the greater the degree of anti-semitism, the greater the loyalty of the Jew to his tradition. On the other hand, when the anti-semite is lax; when conditions are favorable for the practice of religion; then the majority of the Jewish People finds it difficult to practice our tradition faithfully.

Certainly, the period of the Maccabees is documentary evidence to this point of view. As long as Antiochus left the Jewish People alone, the rate of assimilation continued to rise. The Jewish People was rapidly becoming Hellenized in its outlook and in its behavior. It was only when the Greek tyrant tried to hurry the process by placing restrictions on public worship, by desecrating the Temple and by persecuting the pious, that the Jewish People rose in revolt and defeated not only the Greek armies but also the Hellenistic way of life. It might be said that the rededication of the Temple was a reaction to the obstacles placed in our people's path in its pursuit of our chosen way of life. One hesitates to guess what would have been the result for Judaism and for all mankind had the Greek tyrant not tried to hurry history.

The lesson to be derived from this is clear. The first Jew was commanded to go it alone – if necessary. If it is not necessary, the command is superfluous. We must be prepared to follow our tradition, if the circumstances are unfavorable or if every opportunity is



given to us to practice our faith. For the American Jew, living in a country which not only allows the free observance of all religions but which also encourages it, this lesson is most significant.

We need not wait for the privilege of the free exercise of religion to be denied us, before exerting ourselves to live as pious Jews. We need not wait for restrictions to be placed on kosher slaughtering before being scrupulous about the observance of the dietary laws.We need not wait for the law of the land to prohibit public worship before being concerned about participating personally in such worship. We need not wait for a regime to outlaw the study of Torah and the pursuit of Jewish education - for children and for adults - before availing ourselves of the ample opportunities granted to us as young people and as mature men and women to study our heritage and to learn the fundamentals of our tradition.

If we are capable of "going it alone", we should certainly be ready to "go it together".

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ADULT EDUCATION WEEK TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 2-9

The week of November 2nd, has been declared as Adult Education week in our congregation. During the course of that week, all the regular courses, as well as the semester courses, in our Adult Institute will begin their sessions for the 1963-64 academic year. On this page you will find a synopsis of our Adult Education program for the year. We invite your interest and your participation.

REGULAR COURSES

These classes will meet regularly from the week of November 2nd through the middle of March.

COMMANDMENTS OF JUDAISM

This course will be composed of a series of brief talks on individual "mitzvoth" as they appear in the weekly portions. The talks will be held on Saturday afternoons between Mincha and Ma'ariv, beginning on Saturday, November 2nd.

STUDIES IN THE BIBLE (A Class for Women)

Meeting for the third consecutive year on Monday mornings, except those Mondays on which a Sisterhood meeting is held, this class will discuss the Book of Exodus during the current year. The course will cover such subjects as the birth and leadership of Moses, the Ten Commandments, the na-

ture of Jewish Civil Law, the sin of the golden calf and the place of the tabernacle and the sacrificial ritual in Judaism.

Hours – Mondays: 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 Instructor – Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

TALMUD CLASS

(Evening session)

A class open to students with a fair degree of fluency in reading Hebrew, this course will begin with the concluding portion of the fifth chapter of the Tractate "Beizah". After the observance of a "Siyum", a new Tractate will be begun.

Hours – Mondays, 8-9 P. M. Instructor – Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

TALMUD CLASS

(Morning session)

A class similar to the one above, except on a somewhat more elementary level, this course will study the tractate "Berachoth". Each session will be followed by a light breakfast served in the social hall.

Hours – Tuesdays, 8:05-8:50 A.M. Instructor – Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

ADVANCED HEBREW

A class for students who possess some fluency in reading, writing and speaking Hebrew, this course will aim to increase that fluency and to encourage the study of modern Hebrew literature.

Hours – Mondays 8-9 P. M. Instructor – Mrs. Alice Rothkowitz

SEMESTER COURSES

Each of these courses will meet for twelve sessions in two semesters of six Wednesday evenings each. The fall semester will meet on Wednesdays, November 6, 13, 20, December 4, 11, 18. The spring semester will meet on Wednesdays, February 5, 12, 19, March 4, 11, 18.

HEBREW FOR BEGINNERS

(Rapid Course)

The purpose of this course is to enable students with no prior knowledge of Hebrew, to read, write and speak simple Hebrew. The student should be able, at the completion of the course, to follow the services in the Synagogue.

Hours - 12 Wednesdays - 8-9 P. M.

(This course will hold additional sessions on Mondays November 11, 18, 25, in order to give the students the basic skills necessary for reading Hebrew.

Instructor – Mrs. Charles Cohen

THE SABBATH PRAYER BOOK

Designed for students with an elementary reading knowledge of Hebrew, this course will survey the main prayers recited in the synagogue on Sabbath mornings. Attention will be given to an analysis of the prayers and to practice in reading and singing them. A review of the Kiddush and the Grace after Meals will be included in this course.

Hours – 12 Wednesdays, 8-9 P.M. Instructor – Mrs. Haskel Lookstein

CANTILLATION - A CLASS FOR MEN

This course will teach the student how to chant the Haftorah and how to serve as cantor at the Daily Services. Tho course requires a reasonable reading knowledge of Hebrew and a capacity for learning and reproducing musical sounds with accuracy.

Hours – 12 Wednesdays 8-9 P. M. Instructor – Israel D. Rosenberg

MAIMONIDES' CODE OF LAW

This course will study the first section (Sefer haMada) of Maimonides' Code of Jewish Law. Among the subjects covered will be: Fundamentals of Belief, Repentance, Torah Study, Jewish Ethics, and Idolatry. Portions of Maimonides' work will be translated and distributed to the students.

Hours – 12 Wednesdays, 8-9 P.M. Instructor – Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

JEWISH HISTORY

Fall: The Biblical Period

Spring: The Second Jewish Commonwealth

Dr. Irving Agus, Professor of Jewish History at Yeshiva University, will discuss theories and analyses of the periods cited above to present the student with a mature understanding of these periods and their relationship to Judaism today.
