

MEN'S CLUB HEARS RABBI TRAININ ON JEWISH SOCIAL ILLS

A large gathering of men and women filled the social hall last Tuesday evening to hear Rabbi Isaac N. Trainin discuss the rising social problems of the American Jewish Community. The occasion was the first Open Meeting of the year for the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club. This meeting inaugurated the 25th Anniversary Season of the Mey's Club.

The audience sat in rapt attention as Rabbi Trainin spoke of the "Anglo-Saxonization" of the American Jewish Community. "More and more," he said, "we are becoming like all segments of the American population as far as our social problems are concerned."

For the first time, we are confronted with serious problems of juvenile delinquency, narcotics addiction, an alarming divorce rate, a most disturbing rise in the number of unwed mothers and other similar problems which twenty or thirty years ago were scarcely felt by the American Jewish Community.

In the bulletin, we cannot record some of the disturbing statistics cited by Rabbi Trainin, who is keenly aware of these problems by virtue of his position as the Director of the Religious Affairs Department of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York. Suffice it to say, that those who came to hear of a problem, left with a more sober understanding of the stark realities of American Jewish life in the sixties.

THE WEEKLY PORTION HAYA SARAH

"What Is Everything"

"And God blessed Abraham with everything." Our sages are troubled by the use of the word "everything" with respect to God's blessings. What does the Torah have in mind when it describes Abraham as being so perfectly blessed? In general, their solutions to this problem center on the birth of children or, perhaps more properly, the problem of parenthood.

One answer is that "everything" means a son. As a matter of fact, the numerical value of the letters in the word "Bakol" (everything) equals the numerical value in the word "Bein" (son). "Everything", therefore, means a son.

To Abraham, the prospect of living his life without an heir was an intolerable one. The possibility that there might be no one to carry on the monotheistic tradition which he had himself discovered, was painful to consider. When Sarah bore him a son, one who could carry on this tradition, it was Abraham who then felt that he was blessed with "everything".

Another sage considers the blessing of "everything" to mean that Abraham did not have a daughter. On the surface, such an interpretation is quite surprising, especially in that part of the Bible which deals with the greatness of Rebecca. On closer examination, however, we can agree with Samson Raphael Hirsch who explains that in the society of that day a daughter would have presented Abraham with a painful problem.

While a son could be expected to bring his bride into the family tradition; a daughter would, of necessity, be taken from the family tradition to that of her husband. In the time of Abraham, a foreign tradition meant the idolatry of Canaan, Aram or any of the neighboring countries. To bear a child, to rear her in the Jewish tradition and then to see her absorbed into a society which represents the antithesis of Judaism, would indeed have been a terrible curse. To be without a daughter, then, was, in such a society, the blessing of "everything".

A third sage takes a more optimistic view of the era of Abraham and a more complimentary view of the strength of Abraham's personality and the influence of his home. He says that the blessing of "everything"

The common denominator which all these interpretations possess is the belief that the blessing of "everything" exists when a man and woman have children who carry on the traditions of the home. Of course, in order to have such a blessing, there must be a home and the home must have a tradition. When these two qualities exist and when the children are strengthened by them, then the blessing of "everything" is no less desirable in our day than it was four thousand years ago.

IN TIME OF BEREAVEMENT

In the Torah portion which we will read in the synagogue this week, the death and burial of the first Jewish Matriarch, Sarah, is described. It is appropriate therefore to discuss in this issue of the bulletin a subject which is not fully understood, namely, the character of a traditional Jewish funeral.

In a time of personal bereavement, it is sometimes difficult to describe to the bereaved family, the proper method for conducting such a funeral. In order to make available clear information on a subject concerning which there are many misunderstandings, we present the following abstract from a circular prepared jointly by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America and its Rabbinic arm, the Rabbinical Council of America.

A General Word

A Jewish funeral is divided into two parts. The first part consists of the service at the funeral chapel, the main portion of which is devoted to a eulogy — "Hesped" — which fulfills our obligation' to honor the personality and the life of one who was called to his eternal reward. The second part is the interment, the responsibility to see that the deceased is buried properly and in a dignified manner. For this reason, the brief service at the graveside is not conducted until the grave is fully filled in. Only then, are the Kaddish and memorial prayers recited.

Traditional Practices Attending the Funeral

1. The deceased is washed and purified ritually — "Taharah" — by religious and competent Jews in accordance with special regulations.

2. Until the members of the family assemble for the funeral service, a pious Jew or Jewess is assigned as a guard for the deceased. It is customary for the guard to read passages from the Psalms while engaged in the "watch".

3. The deceased is dressed in "Tachrichin" — the traditional white burial shroud — in order to symbolize that all men are equal before their Creator and that they meet their Creator without thought of earthly status.

4. The deceased is placed in a wooden casket, in keeping with the Biblical dictum that man comes from earth and returns to earth. The simplicity of the casket further symbolizes our nonconcern with earthly symbols of material wealth and social status.

5. The members of the immediate

family, rend their outer garments as a symbol of their anguish and grief. The substitution of a black ribbon for this custom has no foundation in Jewish law or lore and does not, in any case, take the place of "k'reeah" — the ritual rending of a garment.

6. After the grave has been filled in, the "Tsidduk ha-Din" is recited. This statement testifies to the mourners' belief that God's judgment and conduct of his world, however incomprehensible and painful to us, is just and righteous. Following this statement, the "Kaddish", which conveys similar sentiments, is recited by the mourners.

For Further Information

Naturally, the paragraphs above only touch in a surface fashion upon the salient features of a traditional Jewish funeral. Those who have questions about the above or who desire further information, may address their inquiries to the rabbis.
