### YESHIVA UNIVERSITY TO OPERATE A SUMMER CAMP IN 1964

This week, an historic letter was sent to the more than 900 members of the Yeshiva University Rabbinic Alumni announcing that a camp was purchased by the Metropolitan New York Commission on Talmud Torah Education. This announcement represents the successful culmination of four years of intensive planning toward the establishment of a camp to be owned by the Commission, and operated and serviced by the Community Service Division of Yeshiva University.

### Camp Morasha

The camp occupies a 450 acre site in Lake Como, Pennsylvania, at the top of the Poconos. It will be ready for operation in the Summer of 1964. The name of the new camp will be CAMP MORASHA. As you know, Morasha means "Heritage", the tradition of the past transmitted as the inheritance of the present for the betterment of the future.

The camp includes a 3/4 mile long private lake, abundant athletic facilities of all varieties, boating and water skiing equipment and the usual complement of large public buildings for dining, recreation, arts and crafts, etc. A bonus feature is a beautiful 9 hole golf course on camp property.

Yeshiva University will bring to this magnificent physical plant an educational camping program designed to meet the needs of boys and girls, 8 through 16. The camp will offer an eight week experience in Jewish liv-

### THE WEEKLY PORTION TOLEDOT

"Father and Son — Teacher and Student"

Our portion for this week opens with the verse "This is the story of Isaac, son of Abraham; Abraham begot Isaac." The traditional question asked about this verse concerns the repetition by the Bible of a fact which should be perfectly obvious. If Isaac is the son of Abraham then it is superfluous for the Bible to add that Abraham begot Isaac. An interesting answer to this question is offered by the rabbinic scholar, S. J. Zevin.

There are two functions which a father must serve if he is to carry out his role properly. The first is that of progenitor of his child in a physical sense. The second is that of teacher of his child, transmitting to the offspring the tradition which the father has received from his forebears. Abraham was, of course, well aware of both of these functions. Of him we read "he will command his children and his household after him to observe the way of the Lord and to practice righteousness and justice." He was more than a physical procreator; he was a spiritual guide.

There is, however, another side to this relationship. A son also has two functions. The one is to be the physical child of his parents; the second is to be their spiritual heir as well. In the case of Abraham there were two physical children, but only one spiritual heir. Ishmael went astray. It is of Isaac, therefore, that the Bible can say "Isaac the son of Abraham, Abraham begot Isaac." Isaac was the child in both senses.

The experience in the life of Abraham was repeated in the life of his son. Isaac also had two physical children, but only one spiritual heir. Apparently, this was prophesied when God said to Abraham "For in Isaac will your descendents be found".

In this case, it was Esau who went astray and Jacob, who was not only the physical offspring of Isaac, but also his spiritual heir.

The implication of all this is that the proper role of the father is that of teacher and guide in addition to guardian and provider of security. The proper role of children, on the other hand, is that of recipients of a tradition and sensitive students of a heritage, rather than merely beneficiaries of comforts, luxuries and excessive indulgence. ### ADULT INSTITUTE OPENS WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT

We are happy to announce that the Kehilath Jeshurun Adult Institute opened its 1963 – 64 academic year last week with an unprecendented record enrollment of students. In a year in which we reorganized the Adult Education Program, eliminated all educational gimmicks and concentrated on a variety of serious courses of study, we have received a most gratifying and thrilling response from our congregational family.

### Vistal Statistics -

A few statistics will serve to illustrate the extent of this response. The Bible Class for Women, which meets on Monday mornings, now has an enrollment of over forty women. The Monday evening classes in Talmud and Advanced Hebrew have close to twenty five students together.

Our semester courses are meeting with a similar response. At the present time, there are over twenty five enrolled in the Maimonides Course, close to twenty enrolled in Mrs. Lookstein's Prayer Class, ten men studying Cantillation with Mr. Rosenberg and eight registrants for Elementary Hebrew under Mrs. Cohen's tutelage.

The most gratifying response of all was manifested toward our most gratifying offering of all – Dr. Agus' course in Biblical Jewish History, for which close to ninety students are already enrolled. Like all semester courses, Dr. Agus' class is not a one night lecture but a six session class with an opportunity for six more sessions in the spring. To watch the 70 odd students who trooped into his class out of a pouring rain during the first session was a heartwarming experlence.

### "Never too Late" -

There are some things for which it is "Never Too Late". One of those things is attending an Adult Education Class. If for some reason you have not as yet enrolled for this year, give the matter serious consideration and come to the class or classes of your choice.
