RESERVE NOW FOR GALA CHANUKAH PARTY



VAYETZE 1 8 18 × 3

"Fair Weather Religionists"

"And Jacob made the following vow: if God will be with me and will watch over me on my present journey and will give me bread to eat and raiment to wear, and if he will enable me to return to my father's house in peace, then will the LORD be my GOD."

On the surface, this appears to be a conditional acceptance of God. Many are prepared to worship God if advantages accrue to them. These we may classify as "fair weather religionists". As long as they are amply rewarded for their service, they will maintain their faith and their traditions.

Acually, one commentary understands this passage to indicate that Jacob here pledges exactly the opposite. Some sentences before, God had promised to watch over Jacob and to protect him.

The promise that Jacob subsequently makes does not represent his part of the bargain, namely, that if God fulfills his promise, then Jacob will be a faithful servant to him. What Jacob is saying is that if God fulfills this pledge, then Jacob will serve Him, not because of the rewards but despite them. The rewards will have no bearing on his religiosity. He has faith today while sleeping on the ground alone in the wilderness; he will have the same unconditional faith even if God bestows upon him wealth, good fortune, family and health.

The careful reader will note that in the beginning of his pledge, Jacob speaks of GOD - E-lokim. This name refers to God's quality of justice and carries the connotation of reward to the righteous and punishment to the wicked. He who worships God, preoccupied with this aspect of the Divinity, expects a return for his investmen.

At the conclusion of this pledge, however, Jacob speaks of the LORD -HASHEM - which in Hebrew carries the connotation of God who is worshipped out of love and out of a deep conviction that man must serve his Creator regardless of the blessings which God bestows upon him.

The implication from Jacob's pledge is that all of the rewards will not make his faith conditional, dependent on his continuing to receive God's blessings. Jacob will always continue to worship out of love; his faith will be unconditional; his committment, uncompromising. H. L.

The program was extremely well received by the group. Many excellent questions were asked of the members of the panel and a lively discussion ensued. One positive result of the program was that information on a little known subject was gained by our members. Another important result was that a subject which is usually overlooked and often considered to be undiscussable, was rendered meaningful and relevant by this program.

An indication of the wide interest in the discussion was evident when the discussion continued informally in small groups throughout the "social hour" which followed the formal program. The Young Marrieds wish to thank the members of the panel and our hosts of the evening for providing an opportunity for such a stimulating evening.

The next function of the Young Marrieds Group will be its participation in the Chanukah Party on Saturday night, December 14th. The regular meeting of the group will be held on Saturday evening, January 18th, at which time we will discuss the subject: "Rearing A Child In A Warm and Inspiring Jewish Home". Inasmuch as Chanukah is a holiday of the spirit, marking the triumph of the People of the Book over the People of the Sword, the people which idealized the spirit over the people which idolized the body, the most appropriate gift for the festival is a book or a set of books. For your information and convenience, we list below a number of suggested titles.

SUBSCRIPTION TO TRADITION—The magazine published by the Rabbinical Council of America comes in two issues a year. The subscription price is \$2.50 for one year and \$4.00 for two.

SUBSCRIPTION TO THE JEWISH PUB-LICATION SOCIETY OF AMERICA — Subscriptions are available in denominations of \$6.00, \$12.50, \$25.00 and up. Depending upon the amount of the subscription, the recipient can make his own choice of two, five or more books each year.

HERTZ PENTATEUCH — The classic edition of the Torah in one or two volumes with the popular commentary of the late Chief Rabbi of England.

HIRSCH PENTATEUCH – A new edition of the Torah, in six volumes, with the scholarly and homoletical commentaries of Samson Raphael Hirsch.

BIBLE WITH TRANSLATION OF RA-SHI — The edition of Silverman is recommended as an excellent translation of the words and ideas of the fundamental Jewish commentary to the Bible. This edition is now available in five volumes at a reasonable price.

SONCINO BIBLE – An edition of the entire Bible in 14 volumes. The commentary consists of excerpts from the various medieval commentators. These volumes may be ordered as a set or individually.

THE GRAPHIC HISTORY OF THE JEWISH HERITAGE – A new edition, covering the Biblical period, the book

The first and third works are available in paperbacks.

IN HIS IMAGE – The celebrated volume by Dr. Samuel Belkin propounding the Jewish philosophy of man as derived from Jewish Law.

HOREB — A new two volume edition of a classic work by Samson Raphael Hirsch which is a storehouse of information on Jewish Law, customs, ceremonies and practice.


