THE WEEKLY PORTION YITHRO

"By Choice or by Compulsion?"

Our sages, viewing the Divine Revelation and the enunciation of the Ten Commandments which occur in this week's portion, visualize two contradicting situations which accompanied this revelation.

One group of sages sees God as a sort of Divine travelling salesman offering his ethical wares to a variety of peoples. Each nation of that era rejected the Ten Commandments for one reason or another because they would impinge upon their normal course of life. One objected to the banning of life by the sword; another could not accept the faithfulness of the marital bond; while a third could not tolerate the abolition of theft. Only the Jewish People answered God's offer with the statement "we shall do and we shall obey." It appears from this view that the acceptance of the Torah on the part of our people was a voluntary one, based upon our appreciation of the Lawgiver and the contents of his Law.

Another view visualizes the Jewish People standing at Sinai while God raised the mountain over their heads and said in effect "if you will accept the Torah, fine; if not, this site will mark your collective grave." According to this view, the acceptance of the Torah on the part of our people was compulsory; an acceptance of God's power and a commitment to God's Law, which came without understanding and without voluntary acquiescence.

It would appear, that both views are essential for the religious experience. In every generation, man accepts the Torah as a matter of choice and as a matter of compulsion. Much of religion seems to us to be not only understandable but also desirable and helpful. Many of the statutes quite obviously contribute to the wholesomeness of life. Indeed, they make life itself worthwhile.

On the other hand, there are facets to Jewish Law which are not comprehensible to us. There are many laws which are in the category of "chukim", whose reason escapes us. There are many institutions in Jewish life which, while we understand them in their totality, we frequently cannot fathom the reasons for the minutiae of those institutions. Thus, there are few among us who cannot see the value of the Sabbath; but there are

many who find it difficult to accept the many rules which govern our conduct on the Sabbath.

Those parts of our Tradition, which we understand fully, and to which our religious consciousness reacts instinctively in a favorable manner, can be said to be acceptable to us on a voluntary basis. The cornerstone of Traditional Judaism, however, consists in our readiness to accept also those parts of the tradition which do not on the surface seem understandable to us and whose performance may sometimes be a chore. We accept them because they are a matter of law. We try to comprehend their significance but, when we fail, we accept them nonetheless and we endeavor to practice them fully. In this sense we are accepting God's Law and the traditions of Judaism as something compelling rather than voluntary; as an obligation rather than as an obvious opportunity.

It is this latter dimension of religion which the Talmud describes when it speaks of the Jews' acceptance of the Torah as "the acceptance of the yoke of God's Kingdom". It might properly be said that in order for religion to constitute an opportunity and a privilege it must also be acceptable as a yoke and an obligation.

Winter Torah Leadership Seminar A Fantabulous Success

A full report of 'Seminar Doings' was given at the last Cultural luncheon, by our KJ delegation. Six teenagers shared this rich and varied experience. It was interesting to note that no two youth members said the same thing. Each participant came away from the Seminar with his own treasure.

One remembers the Seminar when . . . we listened in awe to a gifted Rabbi's interpretation of the Torah . . . the spontaneous chassidic dancing, that lasted three hours . . . a discussion on Halacha at five in the morning . . . waking up during vacation time to attend Shacharit services at seven in the morning . . . the flame of a twisted candle illuminating a Havdallah service before hundreds . . . a good contata delivered badly at 1 AM, on January 1, 1964 . . . and a bus pulling away from 'a friend' who was nameless but six days ago.

Each of us, upon returning from Seminar, can use descriptive phrases to outline various anecdotes and incidents, which might illustrate a part of the Seminar experience. Yet, there is a certain "ruach" which defies communication in the spoken word.

AM HASEFER GROUP DISCUSSES "AS A DRIVEN LEAF"

A stimulating evening was spent by the members of Am haSefer Group II, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hostyk, last week. The group met to discuss, "As A Driven Leaf", by the late Rabbi Milton Steinberg. The book is a fictionalized account of the life of Alisha ben Abuyah, a heretic sage from the second century of the C.E. He was a contemporary of Rabbi Akibah and a colleague of many great talmudic sages before he spiritually and intellectually left the fold of Traditional Judaism.

The discussion which was led by one of the members of the group, Lawrence A. Kobrin, brought out the fact that the book deals with an historical figure in terms of the intellectual crisis which grips many in our own day. In the case of the protagonist of the book, the intellectual crisis was never resolved and Alisha remained, to the end, a disoriented and unrequited soul.

The members of the group found the book and the discussion interesting although they understood that the historisity of the volume is not at all accurate, as the author himself indicates. The book is recommended for all adult readers who may find this type of subject material interesting.

The next meeting of Group II, will be held on Thursday evening, March 5th. At that time, the book under discussion will be "The United States and Israel", by Nadav Safran. This book was described in a review in the New York Times, as "the finest book yet about Israel". Members are urged to complete their reading in time for the meeting.
