

34 RAMAZ STUDENTS WIN REGENTS SCHOLARSHIPS

Once again, this year, the Senior Class of Ramaz High School has achieved what we understand is the highest record of any senior class in New York State in the competition for Regents Scholarships. Out of 46 students who took the scholarship examination - 2 students were ineligible because they live out of state - 26 were announced last week as winners, while an additional 8 were declared to be alternates, - high on the list. Past experience has shown that the alternates eventually earn a State Scholarship if they choose to attend a college in the State of New York. Among the 34 winners are 4 junior members of our congregation: Harriet Garfinkel, Steven Gross, Vivian Pik and Sue Shapiro. Our special congratulations to these young people and to their parents.

The achievements of the senior class this year are a credit to the academic ability of the students themselves and constitute a ringing endorsement of the Ramaz education which they have received. Particularly deserving of praise are the dedicated teachers who have brought this class to this remarkable stage in its development and the members of the supervisory staff and the administration who make possible such achievements.

Although it is statistically impossible for every student in the class to win a State Scholarship, the entire class is deserving of praise for maintaining an academic standard sufficiently high to enable such a large percentage of its members to win such honors.

BUILDING CONTRACT AWARDEDConstruction to Begin This Week

We are happy to announce that as this Bulletin goes to press the contract for the new Ramaz School Building and Synagogue House has just been awarded. The firm which will handle the construction of this new facility for Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz School, is the Gotham Construction Corp., a firm with many years of experience in large construction projects.

Construction is scheduled to begin during the coming week and current plans call for the completion of the new addition before the end of next year. If all goes well, then, we should be able to use the new building during the Spring of 1965.

Our readers will recall that this expansion of the facilities of the congregation and Ramaz calls for the erection of an eight story building on the site alongside the existing Synagogue House. An additional story will be added to the present Synagogue House. Both structures will be merged so that they will constitute one spacious school building occupying a frontage of eighty feet.

Besides the many facilities which will be provided for Ramaz School, including a magnificent library, a large dining hall, an enlarged gymnasium and new science laboratories, the expansion will serve the needs of Kehilath Jeshurun directly. The new Synagogue House will serve as an educational, recreational and social center for the congregation.

New office suites for the Synagogue are planned, as is also an impressive Board Room, an attractive bridal room and expanded checking facilities.

Our auditorium will be completely redecorated so that it will serve the

needs of the members of the congregation and the community at large for social functions of a religious nature. The expansion plans also call for the remodeling of the social hall, chapel and for the air-conditioning of our beautiful main synagogue.

This project has been in the planning stage for almost three years. We are happy that it is about to move from the drawing board to the construction phase itself. We are confident that sometime late next year we will see this structure as a magnificent reality in which we can all take pride and from which we will derive immense satisfaction.

WITH THE RABBI IN ISRAEL

We are happy to inform you that Rabbi and Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein have arrived in Israel and that all is well with them.

We have already received a flood of press clippings from the Israel Press which covered the Rabbi's arrival and extensive conferences which he held at Bar Ilan University. The Rabbi's announcement that the University, which recently received a Charter from the New York State Board of Regents, is entitled to grant B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Jewish Studies, aroused a great deal of interest in Israel.

Before long the Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein will be returning home. We anticipate hearing, at that time, a full report on the latest events and trends in the Jewish State.

"The Yoke of Freedom"

"The Revelation at Sinai and the gift of the Torah after the deliverance from bondage has a very special meaning: this meaning is the definition of freedom itself. History does not lack oppressed peoples who have been liberated from their oppressors and granted independence. This sudden relief from pressure generally brings reactions of violence and pride in the course of which the former slaves become oppressors in their turn.

"Liberation and freedom mean that one exchanges the unjust yoke of oppression for the yoke of the law, that is, the moral law. Man cannot live in freedom without submitting to a law, for without it he falls under the yoke of his own pride and evil instincts and becomes both wicked and unhappy. He who rejects the yoke of the Torah, says the Pirke Abot, receives upon himself the yoke of worldly care.

"Freedom implies even more duties than oppression but they are duties that are accepted willingly and subject to a just law. These very heavy duties are especially heavy for the people who have received the law. It becomes a duty to cling to the Torah and apply it; for if the people refuse to submit to the just law which has been given to them, they will be scattered and subjected to the unjust law of the nations which will oppress and persecute them until they in their turn are punished."

The above is an excerpt from a pamphlet entitled "Hebraic Civilization and the Science of Man," written by Dr. Henri Baruk, Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Paris. The most direct source for Dr Baruk's remarks is contained in a Talmudic interpretation of a verse from this week's portion.

In describing the two tablets brought by Moses from Mt. Sinai, the Torah says: "the script was God's script, engraved upon the tablets." Say our sages, "the word should not be read 'charut' — engraved, but 'cheirut' freedom, for the man who is truly free is he who lives by the laws of the Torah."

"THE DEED" DISCUSSED

One of the most facinating Am haSefer meetings in a long time was held recently at the new home of the Feinberg Twins. In an artistic atmosphere, with the Twins' creative work forming a most inspiring background, Group I, of our Am haSefer Program, discussed Gerold Frank's "The Deed" the story of the assasination of Lord Moyne.

During the discussion, many reactions to the book were expressed. From the vantage point of twenty years of hindsight, the general conclusion of our group was that "The Deed", while not justified, was at least explainable. The feeling of the group was that "The Deed" was not murder but rather an act of war. It was difficult to arrive at

a consensus concerning the advisability of such acts in the future.

Inevitably, comparison to the recent brutal assassination of President Kennedy was on the minds of the participants. The general view was that the two incidents are hardly compatible. One was the work of a murdererperhaps a sick one-the other was the work of two freedom fighters who committed an act and who refused to plead insanity because they wanted to bring the reasons for that act on the forum of world opinion.

The next meeting of Group I of Am haSefer will be held on April 7th. At that time the book under discussion will be, "Europe and the Jews," by Malcolm Hay.
