## THE WEEKLY PORTION

B'HAR — BEHUKOTAI Conditions For Freedom

Our portion for this week opens with the laws of sh'mitah — the seventh year when the land was not to be cultivated — and the laws of "yoveil" — the Jubilee year which came in the 50th year following seven full cycles of seven year periods. It is in this portion, in connection with the Jubilee year, that the Torah provides the statement engraved on the Liberty Bell: "And proclaim liberty throughout the land to all the inhabitants thereof."

The first obvious condition which must be satisfied if national liberty is to be a reality is that the liberty must be a universal privilege. It may be true that a nation cannot long exist half-slave and half-free. It is certainly true that liberty does not exist in a nation where there is even one slave. Liberty in a land must be accorded "to all the inhabitants."

The twentieth century has discovered that liberty is not simply the absence of chains. The man who has no property, no job, no means of support, no security and no hope for alleviating his economic misery, is hardly to be considered as free. He must sell himself as a slave to any man who guarantees to feed him and his family. This is true for millions of Americans and it has become public policy for the government to find a way to render these people free by giving them some form of economic security.

The concept of economic sufficiency as a sine qua non of liberty is, however, not a twentieth century discovery. It is a Torah pronouncement. The Jubilee year, which reestablished liberty in Israel, was marked by the mandatory return of all land sold during the previous fifty years, to its original owners. Debts were cancelled; slave terms were concluded; and each individual, no matter how hard pressed he had been, was restored to economic solvency. "And each man shall return to his rightful inheritance".

In this way liberty was made a reality rather than a mere pious slogan in the land — a reality which was enjoyed by "all the inhabitants."

During the course of the coming months the Bulletin will carry further news of what promises to be a stimulating season for the Men's Club.


#### YOUTH CORNER
