The closing meeting of the Kehilath Jeshurun Sisterhood for the 1963-64 season was held on Monday, May 11th, in the social hall of the synagogue house. A fine gathering of ladies turned out for this luncheon meeting which featured elections, the induction of new members, a review of the year, and a closing talk by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein.

Mrs. Reuben N. Popkin, the retiring President, opened the meeting by thanking the Hospitality Committee, consisting of Mrs. Bertha Witkin, Chairman, Mrs. David Pik, Mrs. Frank Roth and Mrs. Erwin Linden, and the special hostesses for this meeting Mrs. I. B. Jacobs and Mrs. Sam Goodman.

Mrs. Samuel Gross, Co-chairman of the Donor Luncheon, reported on the splendid results of this major activity and cited for special plaudits Mrs. William Lebowitz and Mrs. Meyer Texon. Mrs. Jack Lieberman, Treasurer, delivered a financial report in which she detailed the generous contributions which the Sisterhood made during the course of the past season to the scholarship funds of Ramaz School and the Park East Religious School, to a number of "neediest cases", to scholarship funds for summer camp and to the Yeshiva University Torah Leadership Seminars.

THE WEEKLY PORTION BEHAALOTECHA

"Be Exceedingly Modest"

Maimonides, in that part of his code of law dealing with the Laws of Ethics, indicates that Judaism requires of man a median existence in terms of ethical qualities. For example, the two extremes of the spendthrift and the abstemious person should be shunned in favor of the middle way-generosity in accordance with one's means. The extremes of the levantine and the ascetic should be avoided in favor of the middle way of happiness. The extremes of stubbornness and indecisiveness should be eschewed in favor of the middle way of persistence combined with flexibility.

While we all recognize this admonition as conforming to the principle of the Aristotelian mean, Maimonides, who was greatly influenced by this Greek philosopher, nevertheless bases his conclusion upon Scripture and Talmud. He considers life conducted in such a median manner to be a fulfillment of the Torah's command, "And thou shall walk in His ways."

There are, however, certain ethical qualities concerning which Maimonides advocates a position of extremism. One of these is the tendency to become angry. Maimonides cautions against resorting to anger except in the most unusual circumstances. Another quality which should be adopted in the extreme is that of modesty. It is not enough for a man to be modest; he must also be self-effacing and selfsacrificing.

The source for this last conclusion is in our portion for this week where the Bible says of Moses, "The man Moses was extremely modest; more so than any other man on the face of the earth." We are bidden to follow the ways of the righteous which the Talmud describes as follows: "They suffer shame but do not embarrass others; they listen to abuse without returning it . . ." It is upon such a man that the Talmud says God's spirit rests. He must be heroic, of substance, and wise; but, in addition, he must also be exceedingly modest.

This is why the sin of gossip perpetrated by Miriam in speaking disparagingly of Moses' wife was so serious. She was taking advantage of a man who, because of ethical principles, could not fight back against this slander. On the contrary, it was Moses who prayed for forgiveness for

port. Retiring from the Presidency after three years gave her an opportunity, she said, to look back with satisfaction over her tenure in office. In her own characteristically modest fashion, the President said, "The Sisterhood has given me more than I have given to it," a noble sentiment from a most dedicated and creative leader.

Mrs. Meyer Texon, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented to the outgoing President a beautiful silver bowl as a token of the esteem, affection and gratitude of the Sisterhood.

Mrs. Texon, speaking for herself and for Mrs. Kirshon and Mrs. Silberman, Co-chairmen of the Nominating Committee, then nominated Mrs. Jack Lieberman and Mrs. Haskel Lookstein for a second term as Tresurer and Secretary, respectively. Both ladies were warmly received by the members.

Mrs. Texon then nominated for the office of Vice-President, Mrs. George Postel, a lady of exceptional talent and ability, who no doubt will contribute much to the program of the Sisterhood in the years to come. She, too, was enthusiastically received by the members.

Mrs. Texon then placed in nomination the name of Mrs. William Lebowitz, past Vice-President of the Sisterhood, as the new President for 1964-65. Mrs. Lebowitz, who has won the admiration of all the members for her organizational ability, progressive ideas and general competence, was elected by acclamation.

The new President spoke briefly about being catapulted into the driver's seat in "Hertz-like" fashion to steer the Sisterhood for the coming year. She expressed the collective hope of all the officers that they would lead the organization to new heights of achievement. We might add, parenthetically, that we expect greater cooperation than usual between the Men's Club and the Sisterhood next year inasmuch as the offices of President and Treasurer in both groups are shared by the wife

Miriam, and healing for her disease, despite her act of indiscretion.

This is a supreme standard for human behavior. It may be well beyond our reach but there is nothing to be lost in striving to attain it and much to be gained by approaching it.

and husband of the Lebowitz family and the Lieberman family. Truly, we can look forward, as never before, to the utmost in togetherness between these two congregational affiliates.

The highlight of the program was Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein's talk on the general subject "Talking to One's Self." He was introduced with particular eloquence by the Program Chairman, Mrs. Seppy I. Silberman, who quoted from Ecclesiastes to indicate that "there is a season for everything under the heavens." In the case of the Rabbi and the Sisterhood, the season has always been the first meeting of the year and the closing one. Continuing with her Biblical theme, Mrs. Silberman quoted as follows: " 'There is a time for silence and a time to speak.' Considering the difficulty in properly introducing the Rabbi, it would appear that it is my time to be silent and the Rabbi's to speak."

After recovering from this exceptional introduction, the Rabbi spoke of people who speak cynically to themselves, saying, in effect, "What's the use?" or "Everything is finished." Such talk, he said, is worse than physical suicide. It is mental suicide and there are many such people who walk this earth while mentally deceased.

On the other hand, he continued, there is the talk to one's self that is healthy. There is the internal persuasion of a Helen Keller, or of a Beethoven who, after being afflicted with deafness, said to himself: "I'll seize faith by the throat." There is the courage and fortitude exhibited by an F.D.R. who, after paralysis, talked himself into the leadership of a nation in its most perilous hour

The Rabbi wished the ladies of the Sisterhood well for the summer season and he advised them to begin the practice of periodically having a healthy and hearty talk with themselves whenever necessary.
