THE WEEKLY PORTION

"Parents and Children -Reciprocal Respect"

"This is the story of Isaac, the son of Abraham; Abraham begat Isaac." The obvious question on this opening verse of our weekly portion is: why the repetition? Either "Isaac the son of Abraham", or Abraham begat Isaac" is superfluous.

According to one East European sage, neither is superfluous; both are necessary. Isaac, from his own point of view, was the son of Abraham. He considered this to be his great fortune. He was proud to announce to his friends that he was Abraham's son and that he carried on a heritage from his father.

In terms of his own self identification, he was rooted in a family. He saw himself as a representative of a noble tradition, not as someone who faced the world without roots, unfettered by a set of predetermined values. In everything he did and saw he was Isaac, son of Abraham.

Such an outlook did not develop by accident. It was a result of "Abraham begat Isaac". Abraham's central view of himself was that of a father — one who could pass on his life's work to a son. "What can you give me", he said to God," when I am childless?"

We can assume that Abraham's investment of time and effort in his son was considerable. No matter how many "souls" he "made", his son's development came first. His business affairs, his social relationships, his personal ambition were all secondary to his main concern – Isaac.

Our portion, then, presents the ideal parent — child relationships of mutual concern and reciprocal respect. It is beautiful to imagine such a relationship and depressing to notice its relative scarcity in our day. Parents and children ought to reflect on the attitudes and behavior of Abraham and Isaac so that of us, too, it might be said: "And the two of them walked together."

Our Associate Rabbi discussed, from a non partisan point of view, the dangers of political candidates' religious preachments. He indicated that such preachments tend to violate the traditional American values of the separation of Church and State. They also tend to secularize religious ideals by making them the servants for a particular political cause.

Such preachmetns, which must of necessity be non-denominational and extremely general, also serve to render religion in America increasingly superficial. Instead of people recognizing the uniqueness and depth of their own religious position, they are encouraged to pay formal lip service to vague concepts of God and morality.

As religious people, the Rabbi said, we ought to discourage politicians from assuming the role of "Spiritual Leaders." Such spiritual leadership tends to make of religion a tool of electioneering. It does a disservice to both religion and politics and contributes positively to neither.

JEWISH INTEREST

Inside and Outside Argentina

The Argentinian Minister of the Interior, Juan S. Palmero, representing President Illia, condemned last week the recent anti-semitic incitements in that country and excoriated those whom he accused of sowing "violence and mistrust."

At the same time, Juan Linaries, a Peronist member of the Chamber of Deputies and a leading Argentina antisemite, made public a letter purporting to be from Peron, in which the latter described Zionism as one of the "International"-dominating the world which all "really free men" must fight.

Israel Stamp Honors Mrs. Roosevelt

Last week, Ambassador Katriel Katz presented to Franklin Delano Roosevelt Jr. the first copy of an Israel postage stamp honoring the late Eleanor Roosevelt. The stamp is the first one ever issued by Israel bearing the portrait of a non-Jew.

Shazar's Brother Arrives in Israel from Russia

President Zalman Shazar of Israel was reunited last week with his seventy-one year old brother, Dr. Abraham Rubashov of the Soviet Union, when the latter was permitted to migrate to Israel.

Hon. Moshe Chaim Shapiro expressed the hope in London last weekend, that "The new government of the Soviet Union would show a better understanding of the problem of Soviet Jews and would feel the agony of the families torn apart, enabling such families to unite" with their relatives abroad.
