Three outstanding sons of Kehilath Jeshurun who distinguished themselves as leaders of our building project, were singled out by the Officers of the congregation for the highest Torah Honors of the year.

Mr. Samuel Singer, was designated as Chasan Torah, Mr. Elgin Shulsky will be Chasan Bereshith and Mr. Joseph S. Gershman will be Chasan Maftir.

Through strength of character and perseverance, Samuel Singer reached the very heights of his chosen profession. He is the President of Mars Associates and of the Normel Construction Corporation.

He is a graduate of Cooper Union, with the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering. His organization built many of the Public Schools of our city and many structures for the New York Housing Authority. Some of the finest libraries and Municipal Hospitals were built under his leadership.

Associated with him are his son Martin, his two sons-in-law and daughter, all of them holding Degrees in Civil Engineering. A second daughter is a school teacher.


did household. Much of it is due to Sam's remarkable life's companion, Florence, who is a source of inspiration and an example of selfless devotion.

## "A SUXKOTH MESSAGE"

"And you shall take for yourselves on the first day, the fruit of a fine tree (Ethrog), a date palm (Lulav) a myrtle branch (Hadassim) and willows (Aravoth)." This is the Commandment to take the four species on Sukkoth, as it appears in the Torah. As is evident from the words "the first day", the Torah requirement is for one day only. On the remaining days of the festival the taking of the four species is a rabbinic rule to remind us of the Temple in which the four species were used on all seven days.

One sage, however, taking note of the words "the first day" interpreted them homiletically. He said "the first day" is the first day of the year for sins. This interpretation contains the essence of an important Jewish attitude.

It is relatively easy to be pious, God fearing and moral during the awesome and religiously moving period of the HIGH HOLY DAYS. The prayers, the fasting, the sermons, and the entire mood help to make us confront ourselves sincerely and face the crucial issues of life, health, and ethical living.

But this period is a mere oasis in the desert of practical everyday life. Immediately following the High Holy Days comes the sumptuous harvest of Sukkoth with the mood of happiness, and self satisfaction — punctured only partially by the frail and temporary abode in which we reside during the festival.

In such a mood we are open to the sins of excessive indulgence, coarseness, vulgarity and pride. The first day of Sukkoth, then, can very well be "the first day of the year for sins."

What is Judaism's attitude toward the reality of life's cycle? On this first day fulfill a mitzvah. Take the Lulav, Ethrog, Hadassim and Aravoth which symbolize the senses and capacities of man and turn them to the service of God. Enjoy the harvest, but dedicate your wealth to human welfare. Be happy, but let your happiness be a dimension of worship — "serve the Lord in gladness."

Then this "first day" becomes a first day for the coportunity to translate the spiritual results of the High Holy Days into the mundane activities of real life.

## HAKAFOTH AT KEHILATH JESHURUN

On Monday night, October 18, we will begin the celebration of the completion of the Torah – Simchath Torah. From year to year, the congregation which assembles in the evening and in the morning grows in numbers, increases in enjoyment, and expands in merry-making. Chassidic spirit is a rare phenomenon in Yorkville but on Simchath Torah it is experienced in full in our synagogue.

The singing and the dancing contribute to the gaiety. The marching of Junior Marshalls before each Torah procession compounds the joy. The impromptu choir of young people, which supports the Cantor as he incorporates a medley of congregational melodies into the prayers, furthers the atmosphere of merriment. It is a wonderful evening and day for the whole family, with the children serving as the guests of honor.

In order to highlight the children and to increase their participation in the gaiety, we will set aside several sections of the Main Synagogue for them. A group of our older teenagers will be on hand to assist Mr. Shudofsky in caring for their needs.

## Schedule for Simchath Torah Monday Evening, October 18

1. Please bring the children on Monday evening to the Synagogue Chapel between 5:15 to 5:30. Please do not bring them later than 5:30; please do not bring them before 5:15. A long wait will only make them restless.

2. Please refrain from bringing children under the age of six to the Chapel. Younger children should best remain with their parents. Experience has shown us that their limited attention span works a hardship upon older children and prevents enjoyment of the festivities.

3. Once having left the children in the Chapel please leave their care to us. They will be escorted to the Main Synagogue and returned to the Chapel after the service where they will receive the special sweets without which Simchath Torah would be incomplete. You may meet them after the service in the downstairs lobby of the main Synagogue.

Remember the schedule: Children between 5:15 to 5:30; Minchah for the adults at 5:30 in the Main Synagogue; Ma'ariv and Hakafoth will follow.

We extend to the three Torah "Grooms" the congratulations of the entire congregation and to them and their families we express the blessings of the House of God.

In keeping with the usual practice, the "grooms of the law" will be inducted into office at the Musaf Service on Shemini Atzeret. They will be escorted to the seats of honor reserved for them alongside the Holy Ark.
