

ADULT INSTITUTE OFFERS NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR '65 - 66 CLASSES TO BEGIN DURING WEEK OF OCTOBER 30th

The 1965-66 brochure of our Adult Institute will shortly reach you in the mail. In it are described the course offerings in our Institute for the Fall and Spring Semesters. We hope that all of the readers of the Bulletin will take advantage of the new and traditional offerings at our institute.

In the meantime, we would like to outline some of the courses and lectures planned for the Fall season.

REGULAR CLASSES

1. Sabbath Talmud Class

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein's Talmud Class has been rescheduled this year from its traditional Monday evening hour. It will meet instead on Sabbath afternoons, about an hour before Mincha, beginning on October 30th. The class will study the Seventh Chapter of the "Tractate, Berakhot", dealing with the laws and significances of the Grace After Meals. The class is open to men, women and children.

2. Advanced Hebrew

A course of long standing in our Adult Institute which has been conducted by Mrs. Alice Rothkowitz of the Park East Religious School for some seven years. The students are already fairly fluent in reading, writing, and speaking Hebrew. The aim of the course is to increase that fluency. New students are invited.

MONDAY MORNING CLASSES FOR WOMEN

1. Studies In Judaism

In place of the Women's Bible Class, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will give a course in "Judaism — Religion and Ethics", a survey of religious practice, philosophy and ethics from the point of view of Judaism. The class will use a special text in conjunction with the weekly lectures.

Hours: Mondays, 11 to 12 Noon

2. Hebrew For Beginners

A course which has already served the needs of some seventy men and women in the past seven years will be offered again this year. Its purpose is to prepare the student, at its completion, to follow a synagogue service competently, and to learn to read, write and speak simple Hebrew. The instructor is Mrs. Alice Rothkowitz.

Hours: Mondays 10 to 11 A.M.

3. Second Year Hebrew

A continuation by Mrs. Noam Shudofsky of her highly successful elementary course from last year. New students with an elementary knowledge of Hebrew are invited.

Hours: Mondays 10 to 11 A.M.

FALL SEMESTER COURSES

(These three courses will meet for 7 Wednesday evenings from 8 to 9 P.M. November 3, 10, 17 and December 1, 8, 15, 22)

1. Maimonides' Code of Law

A course dealing with Judaism's concept of repentance and its attitude toward idolatry which form part of the first volume of Maimonides' work. Selected portions of that work will be translated and distributed to the students for home study. This course, now in its third year, touches upon fundamental Jewish ethics and values.

Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

2. "Am I My Brother's Keeper?"

(A survey of Genesis)

This new offering will present a survey of the first Book of the Bible through the relationship between various sets of brothers described therein: Cain and Abel, the sons of Noah, Isaac and Ishmael, Jacob and Esau, and Joseph and his brothers. Through these relationships the instructor will demonstrate the essential themes and lessons of the Book.

Instructor: Rabbi Joshua Bakst (Instructor of Talmud and Bible,
Ramaz Upper School)

3. Modern Hebrew Literature

An opportunity will be given in this course to students who wish to study Hebrew literature on a college level to do so under the guidance of an experienced Israeli educator, who is on a one year mission in this country. Selections from modern Hebrew literature will be available to the students in paperback and will be treated from the point of view of literary analysis.

Instructor: Mr. Gad Cohen

LECTURE SERIES

This year's series of lectures will be divided into two parts. They will be given on the seven Wednesday evenings when the Fall Semester courses are given. The time will be 9 to 10 P.M.

The first part of the series will consist of four lectures by Dr. Irving Agus on various aspects of Modern Jewish History. We offer these lectures in tribute to an old friend of our Adult Institute upon the completion of his new two volume work, "Urban Civilization in Pre-Crusade Europe."
