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"Jacob's Call for Peace"

According to our sages, Jacob called his sons together before his death and warned them as follows: "Come together, because a household in which there is strife ultimately meets with destruction."

In our day, the house is no longer merely a home, a city, or a nation, but a world. "A house divided against itself cannot stand" applies not only to civil war at home but even to a war fought in the far off reaches of Southeast Asia.

The descendants of Jacob ought to be gratified, therefore, when the President of the United States sends emissaries of peace - including among them the illustrious peace maker, Arthur Goldberg - to impress upon the world that we are prepared to negotiate all differences at any time, in any place, with anyone and under any conditions.

Unity and peace among men and among nations is predicated upon a respect for all human beings. Respect requires us to listen to those with whom we disagree even as we listen to our ideological friends. Respect, as a human quality, transcends even love. We need not love every individual at all times. Peace and unity, however, require constant respect for all people.

The roots of such respect are in the God-man relationship. We respect man because he is a creature of God. Thus, when we speak of "kavod ha-briyot" we are literally respecting "created beings." It is sometimes difficult to think of an enemy, a tyrant, a war monger etc. as a created being of God, but if the house of mankind is to stand, it must rest upon the unity of mankind which means respect for every human being.

Respect does not mean surrender. It means a willingness to try to understand differences and reach amicable understandings. Such an understanding may be unattainable in our day, but the effort to achieve it ought to be expended, encouraged, and appreciated.

"When the righteous are about to pass from this world," say our sages in reference to Jacob, "they do not will their descendants property or possessions; they rather instruct them in reverence for God." Reverence for God is the foundation for respect toward man. Let us guard that respect; let us hope that our adversaries will prove deserving of that respect; and let us hope that mutual respect will bring unity and peace to our world.

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STUDY GROUPS IN COMPARATIVE LAW AND THE **KUZARI TO BEGIN JANUARY 24 AND 31**

The special spring offerings of our Adult Institute will be in the form of two study groups which will meet for five sessions each, on alternate Monday evenings during late January, February and March.

Comparative Law

This group will study methods of jurisprudence in the Talmud as they relate to general principles in modern constitutional law and common law. The members of the group will receive materials which they will be able to review in preparation for each session.

The discussion leader will be our own member, Lawrence A. Kobrin, a graduate of Ramaz, Columbia College, Columbia Law School, a former Notes Editor of the Columbia Law Review and a past Managing Editor of Tradition.
