THE WEEKLY PORTION YITHRO

"The Revelation at Sinai"

The revelation at Mt. Sinai marks the formal acceptance of an incorporeal God by the Jewish People. This idea of incorporeality was as strange to the world as was the message which was revealed to the Jewish people at Sinai.

The idolators knew of gods only as providers. In cafeteria-like style the idolators sought from their gods economic plenty, fruitfulness, rain, sun, victory and the like. They could never conceive of God in a non-physical sense — as a teacher.

As a direct challenge to this view, the Ten Commandments begins: "I am the Lord thy God who took you out of the Land of Egypt . . ." If that were the end, then Judaism would have merely become another idolator's cult, worshipping a god of war, a splitter of seas and a miraculous redeemer. God reveals himself at Mt. Sinai, however, as a spiritual teacher who cares enough to teach his people how to live: keep the Sabbath; honor parents; do not murder.

In the year 1300 B.C.E. these were not the kind of commands which might have been expected from God. What might have been expected would be commandments to offer incense, to bring sacrifices and to build a sumptuous temple. These were the traditional "commands" from corporeal deities.

What the Torah presents in the initial message of revelation is of an entirely different character. God requires conformity to a holy and moral way of life. Recite the Kiddush; do not steal; do not be unfaithful in matrimony. This is far more than the gift of life from a fertility deity. This is a gift which teaches us how to use life, how to fulfill life and how to ennoble life.

This is the spiritual message from the incorporeal Father and Teacher of mankind.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

We have been requested by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to bring to the attention of our readers, poignant information concerning Social Security and Medicare benefits. We will publish this information as a public service from time to time.

Your-1965-Social Security Questions and Answers

Q. I am over sixty-five and eligible for social security; however, I do not intend to retire. Am I included under "MEDICARE?"

A. Yes, you are eligible for "MEDI-CARE" coverage, but it will be necessary for you to file an application at your Social Security office. You should do this at once.

Q. I am over sixty-five and getting social security. My wife is sixty-two. Will both of us be eligible for "MEDICARE?"

A. You will be eligible for protection under the hospital insurance plan and you can enroll for extended "MEDI-CARE" at a cost of \$3.00 per month. Your wife will not be eligible until she reaches age sixty-five.
