FATHER AND SON MINYAN TO RESUME NEXT SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 27th

After an interruption of more than a season and a half, necessitated by the building construction program, the Father and Son Minyan will return to its regular Sunday morning place in our program on Sunday, February 27th, at 9:30 in the chapel of the synagogue.

The Father and Son Minyan is open to boys and men of all ages, and features a three-part program of religion, nourishment and athletics.

The first part of the program is a regular morning service which lasts a bit under an hour. During the course of the service, certain prayers are recited aloud; others are said responsively in order to enhance the educational experience of worship. In addition, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein offers interpolations on the meanings of some of the prayers and the rules concerning public worship.

The congregation then adjourns to the social hall where a community breakfast is served to the men and the boys.

At 11:00 o'clock the boys go to our reconstructed and refurbished gymnasium for an extended period of basketball and related activities. This part of the program is designed, particularly, for boys of junior high school and high school age. The entire program continues under the sponsorship of the Men's Club of the congregation, which founded this program eighteen years ago.

A cordial invitation is extended to men and boys, fathers and sons, uncles and nephews, and all unaffiliates, to come down to the first Father and Son Minyan of the year, next Sunday, February 27th, at 9:30.

MISHPATIM "And These Are The Laws"

The most important word in this week's portion is only a letter in the Hebrew language — the letter "vav." The translation is "and" but it appears at the beginning of the portion in the following sentence: "And these are the laws which you shall place before them."

According to rabbinic commentaries, this word "and" is the link between the Ten Commandments of Mt. Sinai and the complete range of Jewish life, between the broad ethical and religious principles of divine revelation and the minute and detailed laws which make those principles operative in society.

This word "and" is an important contribution of Judaism to the world. Not only are faith and dogma revealed by God, deed and action are too. Ethical principles emanate from Sinai; so does ethical behaviour. Any "sermon on the mount" would be so many wasted words — even though the mount were Sinai and the preacher God himself — were it not for the intricate and specific laws which translate words into deeds, thought into action and principle into conduct.

It is noteworthy that the first laws revealed after Sinai deal with slavery, torts and murder. This is civil rights and social justice translated from ethical dreams into social reality.

From Sinai we heard "Thou shalt not kidnap." (This is the Talmud's interpretation of "Thou shalt not steal.") In this week's portion, we learn the rules which prohibit forced and extended servitude. From Sinai we heard "Thou shalt not covet." From Sinai we also learn the myriad of laws which enforce respect for the rights and property of others.

In the midst of the brotherhood season corresponding to the birthday anniversaries of two of the greatest Americans in history, let us remember the Judaic contribution to brotherhood. To be sure, this contribution is extensive in the philosophy of human brotherhood and in the love of one's fellowman. But, we must consider that at this point at least most decent people accept the philosophy of brotherhood fully.

KASHRUTH NOTE

We have been informed that there is currently on the market meat products sold by Swift and Co. of Chicago III, under the brand name Circle-U. A symbol carried on the label of that product resembles the ① seal — the kashruth symbol of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America.

The products above mentioned are **NOT** kosher. The similar-appearing emblem is **NOT** meant to indicate that these products are kosher.

New Products under Supervision of U

The following products have recently been added to the list of the kosher products under the rabbinical supervision of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America: Beech-Nut Natural Orange Gel baby food; Serv-A-Gravy Mixes of the following varieties: instant brown gravy mix, instant imitation chicken gravy mix, instant brown gravy mix with mushrooms. All of the above are kosher and pareve.

AN EVERLASTING MEMORIAL The Dedication of a Yahrzeit Plaque

We bring to the attention of our members and worshippers that in our Main Synagogue there are Memorial Tablets upon which may be inscribed the names of dear departed ones.

On these Tablets, each name is inscribed on an individual plaque which bears the name of the deceased and the date of the yahrzeit in Hebrew and in English. Memorial lights are located on either side of the individual plaque. These lights are kindled on the yahrzeit and at every memorial service. On those occasions memorial prayers are recited for all those whose names are inscribed on the Tablets.

RABBI LEVERTOV OF BLESSED MEMORY

Rabbi Menashe Levertov, supervisor for the Park East Kashruth Board, met sudden and tragic death last Friday night on his way home from the Synagogue. He was struck down by an automobile and died shortly after the accident.

Rabbi Levertov was one of the most colorful Rabbinic personalities of our day. After World War II he presided as Chief Rabbi of Cracow. There he distinguished himself, not alone as the Rabbi of that famed city, but also as the guardian and protector of the survivors of the holocaust.

He came to America and here he immediately won recognition and honor in the American Rabbinate. He served as consultant to the Material Claims Conference for German reparations and helped to make funds available to refugee Rabbis in this country. May his memory be blessed.
