# RABBI HERSCHEL SCHACTER TO ADDRESS ISRAEL INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION OF MEN'S CLUB

On Monday night, April 25th, the Men's Club will sponsor a special program commemorating the eighteenth anniversary of the establishment of the State of Israel. The feature of the program will be an address by Rabbi Herschel Schacter, Chairman of the Presidium of the Religious Zionists of America.

Rabbi Schacter, ordained by Yeshiva University, is one of the outstanding speakers in the rabbinate and in Zionist circles. The spiritual leader of the Mosholu Jewish Center, he has made an international reputation as one of the leaders of religious Jewry in America and the Zionist movement here and in Israel.

His topic will be: "Israel — Eighteen Years From Now." He will endeavor to explain some of the present trends projected for the future, concerning political, economic and religious life in Israel.

In addition to the main address, the assemblage will join in special prayers which have come to be associated with Israel Independence Day. A special collation will follow the meeting.

A cordial invitation is extended to men and women to attend this important evening on our religious, social and cultural calendar. It will be an evening to remember.

# SHEMINI

#### "Barbaric Generosity"

In this week's portion, the Torah presents a list of birds and fowl which are "unclean", or, in modern parlance, "unkosher." Among the birds so disqualified is one which is familiar to us in its symbolic sense — the stork. However blessed the symbol of the stork may be, its flesh is not fit for consumption according to Jewish Law.

The Hebrew term in the Bible for the stork is a rather strange one. It is called a "Chasida." Rashi, commenting on the name, indicated that it derives from the generosity of that bird in providing food for its friends. The word, according to this commentator, is derived from the Hebrew "Chesed," which means "overflowing," over-abundant, or over-generous.

The Torah gives no reasons for the disqualification of certain birds and the validation of others. Nevertheless, rabbis through the ages have questioned, at least in a spiritual sense, the disqualification of a bird like the "Chasida," which is known for its generosity. The question is particularly urgent, because Nachmanides cites the reason for the disqualification of birds as coming from their barbarity. All the birds which are disqualified are birds of prey. Those which are acceptable are not carnivorous but rather herbivorous. Why, then, is the stork a generous and friendly bird disqualified?

One "Chasidic" sage, Rabbi Yitzchok Meyer of Ger, explained the reason for the disqualification. He notes that Rashi describes the bird's generosity with its friends only. Rabbi Meyer says that anyone who is generous only with his friends is in truth to be considered disqualified.

While this may be facetious logic with regard to the "kashruth" of birds, it is an urgent ethical lesson for human beings. It is hardly admirable when one is generous to his friend. Such generosity is mutually rewarding. If nothing else, it begets friendship and

loyalty from the beneficiary to the benefactor. It is not indicative of a genuine love for human beings but rather of the strength of a relationship between two people. Friendship means the readiness for sacrifice. Its essence entails generosity between the two partners.

To restrict one's generosity to one's friends, however, is an indication of barbarity. This was the practice of the ancient peoples and the more modern barbarians of the middle ages. Generosity was limited to one's family, perhaps to one's closest associates, perhaps to those who lived within one's city. To practice generosity beyond those limits, however, was most unusual. That is why, despite the growth of society and the development of social institutions during the middle ages, the Europeans of that day would still be considered as barbaric in character today.

A truly "kosher" human being is one who is solicitous of all human beings. His generosity is unlimited by national and geographic boundaries. His concern for the welfare of mankind is universal.
