EIGHTEENTH ANNIVERSARY OF ISRAEL INDEPENDENCE MARKED BY MEN'S CLUB GATHERING

A fine gathering of men and women attended a program sponsored by the Men's Club of the congregation on Monday evening, April 25, in honor of the eighteenth anniversary of Israel Independence.

The program, which was conducted by Abraham R. Kirshon, President of the Club, featured special prayers in celebration of this great milestone in modern Jewish history. Cantor A. Joseph Cohen and Rabbi Haskel Lookstein led the audience in the singing and reading of several passages from the Psalms and from Hallel.

The feature of the program was a moving address by Rabbi Herschel Schacter, spiritual leader of the Mosholu Park Jewish Center, and

Chairman of the Presidium of the Religious Zionists of America. Rabbi Schacter spoke about some of the tasks which were left undone during the first eighteen years of the Jewish State's existence. He expressed the hope that these tasks would find fulfillment and accomplishment during the next eighteen years.

The program came to a solemn conclusion as the entire audience rose to recite together the prayer for the State of Israel. The evening was concluded with a fine collation.

For those who were present, the celebration of Israel's independence in our congregation was inspiring and was filled with religious - as well as educational - significance.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY SABBATH OBSERVED AT KEHILATH JESHURUN

KEDOSHIM

"And The Rest . . . Learn"

We are all familiar with the request made by the heathen to Hillel to teach him the Torah while he stood on one foot. The answer of Hillel was in the form of a verse from this week's portion: "Love thy neighbor as thyself;" plus, the addendum "and the rest go and learn."

Hillel's answer can thus be divided into two parts. The first part is what Hillel considers to be the unifying principle of the Torah, namely, that man should be as concerned with the welfare of his fellowman as he is with his own welfare. We can subsume under this unifying principle all of the laws between man and his fellow. Certainly, if one is as conscious of the needs of others as he is aware of his own needs, there is present a pre-disposition toward proper human relations and there is also present a stimulus for the reverence for God in whose image man is made and because of whose creation man is deserving of proper respect.

More important than the unifying principle, however, is the means for putting that principle to practice. This was the addendum that Hillel attached to the biblical command, "and the rest go and learn." The "rest" refers to the detailed requirements of the law regarding fair treatment of people and touching on the problems of charity, payment of debts, remuneration for services, jealousy, vengence and other related questions.

Life is not lived on the plane of general principles but rather on the level of detailed and mundane acts. If these acts follow the prescriptions of the Torah, then the general principal of "Love thy neighbor as thyself" will constitute a meaningful reality; otherwise, it is possible to preach love of fellow and, at the same time, to practice crusades, to conduct inquisitions and to operate extermination camps.

Perhaps we ought to reverse the statement of Hillel in view of the misplaced emphasis of our world. Perhaps the statement ought to read, for our benefit, "The rest go and learn so that you will love thy neighbor as thyself." H.L.

Talmud Class

YOUTH SALUTE TO ISRAEL ON SUNDAY, MAY 8th

A colorful "Youth Salute To Israel" in which more than 10,000 young people will participate in a parade on Fifth Avenue in New York City, will be held this year on Sunday, May 8, Lag B'Omer. This is a community-wide celebration to commemorate Israel's 18th anniversary.

The participating youth will be students from Hebrew Day and Afternoon Schools, Zionist youth movements, Jewish youth organizations, Hebrew High Schools, Yiddish folk schools and Jewish Community Centers.

The parade will begin at 11:00 A.M. at Fifth Avenue and 62nd Street and proceed north to 72nd Street. At noon an Israel Independence Day Service and cultural program will be held at the Central Park Mall featuring a dance pageant, exchange of greetings between high ranking officials from America and Israel, and outstanding musical artists.

Rabbi Isaac N. Trainin Addresses Young Marrieds On Matter of Great Concern

An explosive meeting of our Young Marrieds group was held last week in the home of the Chairman of the group, Albert H. Bernstein and Mrs. Bernstein. The graciousness of the Bernstein hospitality could not quite neutralize the tension from a vital subject which was discussed by a vital speaker, Rabbi Isaac N. Trainin, Director of the Department of Religious Affairs for the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.

Rabbi Trainin discussed the growing problem presented by the Negro-Jewish community of New York. There are a number of aspects to this problem. All of them touch upon the fact that many members of that community are undoubtedly Jewish but they are also undoubtedly members of a racial minority. The white Jewish community of this city has not as yet faced the consequences of this reality.

One of the most serious aspects of the problem has been brought to light recently by the Commission on Synagogue Relations of Federation. There are in New York City at present a constantly increasing number of babies who are born to white Jewish mothers from non-white fathers. There is no doubt that the religion of these babies is Jewish. The Louise Wise Agency, the primary agency concerned with the placement of Jewish children in adoptive homes, has tried unsuccessfully to place these children in Jewish homes.

At present, almost all of these children who are adopted, are adopted by non-Jewish parents. This has to be considered as a matter of the utmost urgency for the Jewish community. We have, in the past, given our lives rather than relinquish a Jewish child to another religion.

Rabbi Trainin acquainted the group with a recent appeal issued through the New York Board of Rabbis asking white Jewish families to consider these racially mixed babies as children of God. That appeal stated that: "Every member of the community is urged to search his heart for the positive response which will prevent the permanent loss to the Jewish community of these children, who are Jewish by birth."

A heated discussion followed Rabbi Trainin's presentation, as the reader can well imagine. The practical realities which pertain to inter-racial placements were contrasted with the moral and religious issues that are involved.

We are indebted to Rabbi Trainin for bringing to our attention a matter of the utmost urgency to us all. Anyone who is interested in knowing more about the adoption of these children may contact the rabbi or Federation directly.
