Our Cantor, accompanied by the famous choir of Oscar Julius, has prepared a fine repertory of liturgical music. The occasion, therefore, will be marked by songs of praise, thanksgiving and joy.

## Rabbis will Conduct the Service

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will lead the service, for which special prayers have been prepared and appropriate responsive reading arranged. The dedication address will be delivered by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein. Mr. Max J. Etra, President of the Congregation, and Mr. A. Phillip Goldsmith, Chairman of the Board of Ramaz School, will speak and offer greetings. Mr. Etra will also announce testimonials and awards for generous donors to the Building Fund. Indeed, all who shared in the project will be remembered appropriately.

### Two Tablets to be Unveiled

As part of the ceremonies, a tablet of the early Officers, Trustees and Building Committee will be unveiled. The tablet will be erected in one of the main lobbies of our new building. Those inscribed on that tablet were responsible for the construction of our present main Synagogue.

In addition, a tablet bearing the names of the Rabbis, Officers and Trustees currently serving the Congregation will also be unveiled. It is under the leadership of those inscribed on that tablet that the entire building enterprise was made possible and brought to a successful culmination.

### Admission by Card Only

The numbers that can be accommodated in the main Synagogue are limited. Appropriate seating for men and women has to be arranged well in advance of the dedication. That is why it is urgent that those of the Synagogue and Ramaz family who received invitations should respond immediately on the special response card provided. They will then receive admission cards. For reasons of safety and comfort, no one will be admitted without such an admission card.

### **A Special Request**

Please do not bring children to the dedication. The space is needed for adults. A special dedication service is planned for the youth of the Congregation and for the students of Ramaz.

### As Modest As Sinai

Our portion for this week which opens with a discussion of the laws of sh'mita — the Sabbatical year during which the land could not be worked — begins with the words: "And God spoke to Moses on Mount Sinai . . ." Rashi asks the well-known question: "What has Sinai to do with sh'mita?"

In answer to this question the Chatam Sofer offers an interesting view. The Torah was given in three separate places: on Mt. Sinai, in the Tabernacle, and at Arvot Moab — just prior to entering the Promised Land. The implication is that the ideal and whole man should possess the modesty of Sinai — a low and unimposing mountain; the passion for study symbolized by the Ohel Mo'ed; and the involvement with his fellowman — "Arvot" has in it the word "arov," meaning enmeshed, absorbed or involved.

Of these three qualities the most crucial is modesty and self-effacement – implied by the choice of Sinai as the locus for the giving of the Torah. The commandment of sh'mita, of course, also symbolizes self-effacement and abnegation. Through its observance we recognize that "the earth is the Lord's" and we are but its custodians. During the sabbatical year we are forbidden to exercise ownership over the land. Whatever it produces is free for all. We may not harvest its crop and store the produce in our own granaries.

It would appear, therefore, that the mention of the Sinai source in connection with sh'mita is redundant, superfluous. But this, says the Chatam Sofer, is precisely the lesson intended, and quoted by Rashi. "Just as the laws of sh'mita (symbolizing man's humble posture) are derived from Sinai (symbolizing humility and modesty) so are all the mitzvot derived from Sinai."

Modesty is the most noble quality of man. The lower we are - in our own eyes - the higher we are - in God's judgment.
