Saturday night Service

Purim begins at nightfall on Saturday night, March 25th. Mincha services will be held in the main synagogue at 6:00 o'clock followed by a borief discourse on the laws of Purim to be delivered by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein.

Ma'ariv will begin at 7:00 o'clock. This will allow a brief period for those who live at a distance to travel to the synagogue.

The Megillah, which will follow Ma'ariv, will be read by a group of young adults from the congregational family. Some of these men are veterans of Ramaz services in years past; others were trained elsewhere.

"WHAT DO WE MEAN BY SACRIFICE?"

A PRE-PURIM MESSAGE

Purim is essentially a wonderful family occasion, one which is admirably suited to the needs of families in a community like ours. Particularly this year, with Purim falling on Saturday night and Sunday, an opportunity is presented to the families in the Kehilath Jeshurun community to make maximum use of the religious and social customs associated with Purim.

We need barely mention the actual synagogue services. If last year was any indication, we can expect almost a capacity congregation on Saturday night and Sunday morning. We hope that all will take advantage of both of these opportunities for young and old alike.

We would like to call your attention, however, to two beautiful customs of the holiday. The first is "Mishloach Manot" — the sending of gifts and food to friends and neighbors. One fulfills this requirement by sending two different types of ready-to-eat foods to at least one person.

In actuality, the project of "Mishloach Manot" can create a marvelous spirit in a family if the children are asked to help prepare little packages and to help deliver them from house to house. This has become a rather widespread custom in suburbia. In fact, it is even more necessary in the rather detached and isolated environment of the city.

Sunday, of course, affords all an excellent opportunity to prepare and to deliver personally these delightful gifts.

The second custom is the festive Purim meal which is served toward evening, beginning before sunset and lasting into the night. This should be a family occasion for as many generations as exist in the family, grandparents, parents, children and so on. The lovely Purim songs may be sung; the traditional Purim dishes and beverages should be served; and, of course, the special grace after meals with the Al ha-Nisim should be recited.

This year, Purim falls on what is normally a family day. Why not enrich your own experience by planning to observe it in all its joyous and happy details.

"ANTI-SEMITE" ADDRESSES K. J. YOUTH GROUP

Does the title shock you? If so, then you can imagine the reaction of the large group of teenagers at last Saturday's Cultural Luncheon program when the guest speaker opened his address by saying "I would like to explain to you in all candor and objectivity why I am an anti-semite."

The guest speaker then proceeded to detail, to the dismay of our teenagers — and to their outrage too — a list of reasons, intellectual and emotional for his dislike of Jews. He quoted from such diverse sources as the Talmud and the notorious "Protocols of the Elders of Zion." He cited the numerous despicable generalities about the alleged foibles of the middle class Jewish community in America.

Our youngsters, who were stunned by this outburst, reacted at first slowly and then strikingly to the message of the speaker. It was interesting to see their perplexity at being faced by such arguments and their gradual coming to grips with the falsehoods presented.

The entire program was, of course, another one of those ingenious psychodramas staged by Steven Lorch. The speaker turned out to be quite far from an anti-semite. As a matter of fact, he was a rabbinical student testing out this type of approach for the first time, an approach toward making young Jews aware of the extremes of anti-semitism which were once prevalent in this country and which from time to time still come to the surface.

It was with some relief that our teenagers learned that this was a "put up job." But they learned this only after having been put through an intellectual and emotional wringer which made them think about a problem which many of them had never faced before.
