NOTES ON PURIM SERVICES Saturday Evening

1. Purim will be ushered in on Saturday evening. Mincha will begin at 6:00 o'clock. The service will be held in the Main Synagogue and will be followed by a short talk on the laws and significance of Purim.

2. Youngsters will assemble at 6:30 o'clock in the Chapel. They will be brought to their assigned places in the Synagogue by supervisors.

3. Ma'ariv will begin at 7:00 o'clock and will be followed by the reading of the Megillah.

Sunday Morning

4. The Sunday service will start promptly at 9:15 A.M. The reading of the Megillah will take place at 10:00 o'clock. Uniform prayer books and Taleisim will be provided. The youngsters are asked to bring their own prayer books. The men are urged to bring their own Tephilin.

5. Students of the Park East Religious School will meet at 9:00 o'clock in the third floor lunchroom from where they will be brought to the synagogue. Ramaz children and all other youngsters will assemble in the synagogue chapel at 8:45. They will be escorted to the synagogue from there.

6. All children will receive noisemakers at their places of assembly. Please be sure, therefore, to bring your children to the proper place at the right time so that the necessary arrangements may be made for them.

7. All worshippers are invited to be the guests of the Sisterhood and Men's Club at a light snack which will be served in the auditorium following the service. The snack for the children will be served in the third floor lunchroom.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

Remember Don't Forget . . .!

As a special addendum to our Weekly Portion this Sabbath, we will read Parshat Zachor, that passage in the Fifth Book of the Bible which requires us to remember the infamy practiced at our expense by Amalek, the tribe from whom the arch tyrant, Haman, was descended.

As if to emphasize the gravity of the injunction, the Torah compounds the mitzvah by enjoining us both to remember and not to forget. Thus, if we forget what Amalek did and, more importantly, what Amalek means, we are violating both a positive and a negative commandment of the Torah.

Throughout most of our long history it did not require much concentration to remember the anti-Semitism which Amalek and Haman symbolized. The plague of anti-Semitism was widespread and omnipresent. In recent years, however, particularly in our blessed land of America, the specter of anti-Semitism has hardly reared its head and, to all intents and purposes, it seems to have disappeared altogether. A young generation is growing up in this land which, to paraphrase the Bible, remembers not Pharaoh (although it is growing increasingly aware of Joseph and his heritage).

That such complacency is not altogether warranted has become manifest in the past few weeks. First, we saw the bold stance of the anti-Semite revealed in the Board of Education elections in Wayne County, New Jersey. The largely assimilated Jewish population of Wayne County was rudely awakened by the strident voices of a community in strife, roused by deepseated hatred for and fear of the Jewish segment of the population.

Second, only last week we saw the first of what, no doubt, will be a series of advertisements which struck at the core of Jewish religious practice under the guise of benevolent friendship toward animals. After a recent sermon of mine on the subject of humane slaughter legislation, I received a lengthy letter from the prime mover in the organization which sponsored that advertisement rudely objecting to my alleged description of that organization as anti-Semitic. In retrospect, I can only regret that I made only an oblique allegation and not a clear and forthright charge.

Finally, just last week the newspapers carried a lengthy goodwill statement by a major church in America apologizing for past crimes,

When you sit down at the Seder table this year, the opening statement of the Haggadah will have added meaning for you when you realize that your contribution helped others who might not ordinarily come to your attention.

regretting historical inhumanities toward the Jewish people and offering to make amends by initiating a series of dialogues in depth in which two religions could study together, pray together and explore their common idealogical backgrounds. The apology and the regret are commendable if somewhat belated; the offer for dialogues — even with overt proselytization excluded — carries with it certain perils of which we ought to be aware.

In short, the commandment to remember Amalek and not to forget the dangers of anti-Semitism is quite relevant for our day. Shabbat Zachor, the Sabbath of Remembrance, in 1967 has special contemporary meaning for every Jew. Let us hope that in 1968 the commandment to remember overt and covert anti-Semitism will have only remote historical significance.

RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN TO DELIVER CLOSING LECTURE OF ADULT INSTITUTE SEASON WEDNESDAY NIGHT, APRIL 5

The formal season of classes for the Kehilath Jeshurun Adult Institute will officially come to a close on Wednesday night, April 5th. The closing ceremonies will be marked by a special open public lecture to be delivered by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein.

This lecture will conclude a fourpart series on the general theme: "Traditional Judaism Confronts Contemporary Issues." The title of our Associate Rabbi's address will be: "Issues of Religion and State in Israel."

It is well-known that in Israel, state and religion are not separated as they are, theoretically, in America. It is also known that the close association between the Jewish religion and the Jewish state has led to many sticky political and social problems.

The Rabbi will discuss the status quo as it exists today in Israel. He will try to outline some of the problems and deal constructively with some of the issues. He will also relate the nonseparation of religion and state in Israel to the changing pattern of church and state in America today.

A cordial invitation is extended to the entire congregational family to attend this closing lecture of the season on Wednesday, April 5th, at 9:00 o'clock. The lecture will be followed by a question and answer period. A light collation will be served at the conclusion of the program.
