Preparing For Passover

One of the most beautiful and meaningful ceremonies associated with Passover is Bedikat Chametz — the search for chametz. The ceremony is composed of three parts:

- The reciting of a special blessing over the mitzvah of the removal of chametz.
- 2. The search of the house by the light of a candle to find vestiges of chametz.
- The reciting of the formula of nullification whereby the searcher renounces possession over any chametz that he may not have seen and of which he is not aware.

The fact that this ceremony will be observed this year on a Sunday night, April 23rd, gives us a splendid opportunity to experience the full impact of this religious observance.

Children, especially, will be impressed by the ceremony if it is performed with enthusiasm and dedication and not merely "gone through" formally and perfunctorily.

The children, of course, ought to place the pieces of chametz in the various rooms — a practice which ensures that the search will not be in vain.

The children can hold the candle and the feather; they can and should examine their own possessions, dressers and desks, for long forgotten relics of chametz.

Passover is not only a beautiful festival. It is a serious one too. Both the beauty and the seriousness can be captured twenty-four hours in advance by a careful observance of Bedikat Chametz.

ANTI-SEMITISM — HOW VALID IS IT?''

IN ANTICIPATION OF PASSOVER — AN ETHICAL LESSON

The Festival of Passover is replete with explicit and implicit ethical lessons. One such lesson is the message emphasized by the Seder that, however glorious our victory over the Egyptians may have been, we are left saddened by the realization that it was achieved through the loss of human life.

This is one of the main reasons for the tradition of eating an egg at the Seder table. The egg is a sign of mourning and indicates our appreciation of the value of human life — even when that life is that of the oppressor. It is for a similar reason that, when we recite the ten plagues with which God afflicted the Egyptians, we drop some wine from our cups for each of the plagues. When a people suffers — even a cruel and oppressive people — our cup of joy can never be complete.

For much the same reason, we do not recite the full Hallel during the last six days of Passover. At the season of the year when God's creatures are drowning in the sea, the song of praise and victory must be somewhat muted. The victory had to be won; freedom had to be achieved; but human beings must not lose their compassion.

On the contrary, the Bible warns us: "You may not hate the Egyptian." The reason that the Bible gives for this injunction is that we were once strangers in the Land of Egypt. There was a time during the period of Abraham and Jacob when famine struck the Land of Canaan and when Egypt received our forefathers graciously and magnanimously.

The fact that "a new king arose in Egypt", new in his attitude and new in his decrees, does not change our feeling of gratitude toward a people which helped us when we were in distress. Even the brutal decree to cast every male child into the sea may not flood our emotions with hate and venom so that we forget a former act of kindness.

Far from being a vengeful people and far from being the servants of a vengeful God, we are a loving people who follow a gracious God. Justice must be done; wrongs must be righted; but the sanctity of human life and the worthiness of a gracious act must remain supreme in our minds and in our hearts.

May this season of Passover see the beginning of a new period of redemption for all mankind in which acts of love and kindness will predominate in the world and in which the sanctity of every human life, fashioned in God's image, will be understood. H. L.
