

ENTHUSIASTIC AUDIENCE AT MEN'S CLUB MEETING HEARS PINCHAS PELI EVALUATE CURRENT ISRAEL SCENE

A gathering of over 160 men and women heard the celebrated Israeli journalist and literary figure, Pinchas Peli, describe anew the events of the past six months in Israel, and project a number of thoughts for the future. The occasion was the first forum meeting of the Men's Club of the season. Abraham R. Kirshon, President of the Club, presided.

Professor Peli described in his own sensitive fashion some of the moving moments of the past months. He spoke of the tears of joy wich flowed from an entire nation when, on Wednesday morning, June 7th, a news broadcast on the Israel radio was interrupted with a statement from the Psalms: "Our feet were standing within thy gates, O' Jerusalem." In this way, the restoration of the old City to Jewish hands for the first time in over 2,000 years was announced to the Israel populace.

He reported on the Simchat Torah celebration in Jerusalem where 100,000 people marched with 2,000 Torahs around the walls of the old Citl. He quoted a letter from his own father who participated in this celebration and who said: "I do not know what more we can expect when the Messiah will come."

Achievements and Problems -

Noting that Jewish history is replete with victories and consequent problems, Professor Peli called attention to the fact that in Hallel, immediately after reciting the verse, "This is the day the Lord has assigned, let us be glad and joyous on it," we turn to God in an entirely different posture and we say: "Please God save us now."

Many young lives were lost and are still being lost. In a small country like Israel the statement in Exodus is



prophetically and pathetically appropriate: "There is no household which has not experienced death." The political battles will still have to be fought and the struggle to hold the territory now in our hands will have to be maintained.

Militarily, the country is in its best position since 1948. The Golan Heights in Syria no longer look out threateningly over Israel settlements in the valley. On the contrary, they now look out over Syria itself. No home in Israel is exposed to hostile guns any more.

The problem of how to capitalize on the new spirit of solidarity is a serious one. When a member of Parliament in Great Britain admits to taking sides in the Middle East, "because my people are fighting," we must conclude that the millennium has arrived in part, at least. How to maintain that part and expand it is another question. How can we maintain the new heightened interest in Israel which was exhibited during the six day war? Must we live from crisis to crisis? Is it possible to avoid in the future two types of Jews; one who fights and the other who sits back passively and watches the fight on T.V.?

Our lecturer indicated that the Israel Armed Forces is always prepared for any conceivable eventuality. Every Arab reaction is planned for and the military commander merely has to open the right drawer and take out the plan of defense.

Unfortunately, in religious, cultural and national problems, no such drawers exist. Our ability to create the necessary plans in these areas will determine the nature of Jewish life in Israel and abroad during the foreseeable future.

THE WEEKLY PORTION VAYERA

"The Extent of our 'Chesed' "

Of all the religious implications which might be derived from this week's Portion, one is of special significance. Implicit in the entire Portion is the dimension of *Chesed* (literally, loving kindness, but actually untranslatable into English) which Abraham personifies in our Tradition.

What is *Chesed*? It is a manifestation of love for human beings that surpasses the bounds of reason. It is not only a response to human need this in itself is a majestic trait. *Chesed*, however, is more than that. It involves *searching* for an opportunity to display goodness.

Thus, the Psalmist tells us that God created the world out of *Chesed*. There was no need for a world but God, as it were had a need to shower love upon something and someone; to give, to bestow, to bless, to grant.

This, on a human level was the distinguishing characteristic of Abraham. At the opening of this week's Portion, we find him sitting in front of his tent, on an oppressively hot day, scanning the horizon in search of weary travelers, while he, himself, the Talmud tells us, was recovering from surgery.

He had every reason to remain indoors nursing his wounds. Instead of that he sits before his tent in a state of depression, his innate drive for *Chesed* frustrated, until he spots three travelers and runs enthusiastically to invite them to accept his hospitality.

His greatest *Chesed*, however, was exhibited in the argument for the saving of Sodom. It is one thing to love and help a stranger. It is quite another to love and help even your enemy.

Sodom represented the very antithesis of Abraham's way of life: crass materialism; doors barred before the stranger; and the furnishing of the houses with Procrustean beds. In the face of this we should have expected Abraham to plead for the total destruction of this Citadel of iniquity and to call for a step-up in military preparedness to fight this creeping giant which would inevitably subvert the surrounding states.

Quite the contrary is the case: Abraham does not want to see people destroyed. He desires the elimination of Sodomism, but the survival of Sodomites.

To be able to have this kind of benevolent attitude toward people who personify all that we disagree with is to be capable of the highest expression of *Chesed*. Such an expression may exceed the boundaries of reason. But such was God's *Chesed* when he created our world. H.L.

Reunion with Families from Russia

Positive steps may NOW be taken to further the reunion of Soviet Jewish families with their relatives in the United States and other countries.

While false hopes must not be raised, a significant number of Jews continue to leave the Soviet Union. United Hias Service, the worldwide Jewish migration agency, through its professional services, is prepared to advise on the specialized procedures to facilitate reunion of families.

Jews in this country must take the initiative in extending an invitation to their relatives in the Soviet Union to join them. Unless such an invitation is extended, their relatives cannot request exit documents from the Soviet Government.

In many instances American Jews may have lost contact with their relatives in the USSR. United Hias Service is in a position to assist families in locating their relatives in the Soviet Union.


