OVER ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY ATTEND MEN'S CLUB MEETING AND FATHER AND SON MINYAN

Victor Geller Thrills Audience with Outstanding Address

It was a heartwarming sight when one looked in upon the Chapel on Sunday morning, December 17th. The Chapel was filled literally to overflowing, as members of the Men's Club, their sons and friends together with the Cub Scouts and their fathers participated in the morning service.

The young cantors who officiated were evidently moved by the large and impressive attendance. They outdid themselves in leading a beautiful and inspiring service of worship. David Kahn, the assistant Director of the Father and Son Minyan should be commended for a wonderful service.

Following the conclusion of the service, the participants were treated to a communal breakfast where, in addition to the delicious food, a spirit of comradery and friendship was the fare of the morning.

After reciting grace, the youth contingent of the Father and Son Minyan retired to the gymnasium for an invigorating session of basketball, the Cub Scouts and their fathers moved to the auditorium for a wolf pack assembly and the members of the Men's Club were treated to an enlightening and outstanding talk by Mr. Victor Geller.

This portion of the morning program was chaired by Mr. Abraham R. Kishon, President of the Men's Club. Mr. Geller, who is the Director of

Yavneh, the Orthodox Jewish Intercollegiate Organization, spoke on the topic, "Jewish Family Life — A Youth's Eye View." He depicted in splendid fashion how our college youth look upon family life through their home and through their environment.

"The father's chair at the table was always a respected and honored seat, and the Jewish mother was always the queen in the Jewish household," said Mr. Geller. These symbols of respect and honor in the Jewish home were the guiding spirit for the young man and woman who was attaining maturity. What the young person gained at his parents' table would be carried with him throughout his lifetime.

Unfortunately, in recent years, some of the traditional practices of the Jewish household have diminished. With that there has been an increase in the straying of the collegiate youth from the traditional ways. It is important that we educate the youngsters to return to the "old time practice" of respect to parents, rabbis, scholars, teachers and leaders. With that return, there will certainly be a return to the strong family ties and warm religious practices.

A round of applause followed the address by Mr. Geller, and with this a very enjoyable three-part program, from which young and old received benefit, came to a close.

Brotherhood**

Around this time of the year, as we complete the reading of the story of Joseph and his brothers in Egypt, we cannot help asking ourselves how Joseph "the righteous" was also to make his brothers so uncomfortable before him. Why was he not more forgiving immediately?

It is no doubt difficult to answer this particular question but, actually, there is another question which logically precedes it. After what the brothers had done to Joseph, when he was a lad of only 17 years of age, the question ought properly to be: How could Joseph ever forgive them for their maltreatment of him?

It is interesting to note in this week's portion the extent of Joseph's forgiving nature. When he first reveals himself to his brothers he says the following: "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" The Bible then tells us that his brothers could not answer him because of their fright . . . Joseph then continues: "I am Joseph your brother whom you sold into slavery in Egypt."

Commenting on this expression, the K'sav Sofer points out that Joseph was in effect saying to his brothers that in spite of the fact that they sold him into slavery, he was still "Joseph your brother."

This is the true dimension of Joseph's greatness. He was probably the most important man in Egypt at that time, certainly at least the second most important. His brothers had been guilty of the most heinous sort of crime for which almost no punishment would have been too severe. Nevertheless, Joseph remembers that he is their "brother" and, having at least punished them by making them worried and harried, he forgives them their indiscretion.

Furthermore, he even makes them feel comfortable by rationalizing their act in saying that this was, in effect, God's way of providing for the security of the brothers and the father. Joseph sees himself, therefore, as not having been sold to Egypt as much as

sent to Egypt to provide for the future welfare of the family.

In this sense Joseph displays the noble qualities of forgiveness and humility which every Jew is called upon to emulate. We are supposed to be capable of being shamed without shaming, of being insulted without insulting, of being mistreated without being vengeful.

Perhaps the reason for this forgiving nature is that we must always consider ourselves as "brothers." In a family it is always possible that one member may hurt another.

The aggrieved party, however, is expected to understand the hurt without wanting to retaliate. This was the example set for us by "Joseph the Righteous."

OF COMMUNITY INTEREST

Opportunities in Israel —

We are pleased to notify our readers of the following programs that are available for work in Israel through the American Zionist Youth Foundation:

1. Volunteers in Israel Program — VIP —

A program for 18-30 year olds to work for a minimum of six months (some draft boards have given permission for a one-semester leave of absence from college). Work areas include establishing new border settlements, strengthening existing kibbutzim and special development projects. Cost: \$535.00.

2. Sherut La'Am —

A one-year service program which provides young men and women, ages 18 to 30 an opportunity (a) to serve Israel in a professional capacity, especially in development areas, in the fields of education, health and welfare; and (b) to experience a year of com-

munal living in kibbutzim. Next departures July and September. Cost: \$670.00.

3. Summer-in-Kibbutz —

A 10-week program of living and working on a kibbutz with 10 days of group travel to major sites and 10 days free time. For 18-25 year olds. Departures end of June. Cost: \$695.00.

4. Israel Summer Institutes —

We highly recommend the Institutes conducted by Yeshiva University which provide for an extended program of touring, working and studying in Israel in addition to a brief European visit. For further information on this, please contact the Youth Bureau at Yeshiva University, LO 8-8400.

AN EVERLASTING MEMORIAL

We bring to the attention of our members and worshippers that in our Main Synagogue there are Memorial Tablets upon which may be inscribed the names of dear departed ones.

On these Tablets, each name is inscribed on an individual plaque which bears the name of the deceased and the date of the yahrzeit in Hebrew and in English. Memorial lights are located on either side of the individual plaque. These lights are kindled on the yahr-

zeit and at every memorial service. On these occasions memorial prayers are recited for all those whose names are inscribed on the Tablets.

The dedication of a plaque in the House of God is a beautiful and appropriate memorial for a departed loved one.

Our Ritual Director, Israel D. Rosenberg, will furnish you with any information you may require in connection with ordering such a plaque.
