The Annual Dinner of the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club was held on Thursday, May 2nd. Over 100 members of the Men's Club were present for this gala occasion, which also marked the Twentieth Anniversary of the Independence of the State of Israel.

William Lebowitz, a former President of the Club, presided as Chairman of the Dinner. The highlights of the evening were a brief address by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, a moving moment of prayer for the State of Israel, appropriate entertainment by comedian, Lou Mason, and the election of officers for the coming year.

THE WEEKLY PORTION EMOR

"Man's Role in God's Festivals"

A major part of this week's portion from the Torah deals with the specific requirements of all the major religious festivals on the Jewish calendar, with the obvious exception of Chanukah and Purim. The introductory verse for this discussion reads: "These are the appointed seasons of the Lord, holy convocations; you shall proclaim them in their proper season."

One sage in the Jerusalem Talmud comments that from this verse we understand God to say to the Jewish people: "If you proclaim them, then they will be My festivals; if not, they will not be My festivals."

Most observers view this comment as another expression of the idea that the festivals, excluding the Sabbath, depend upon the lunar calendar and the lunar calendar depends upon the decision of men — whether by mathematical calculation or actual observation of the "new moon" — to determine when each month begins. The festivals, therefore, depend upon man's proclamation.

Without disputing this Halachic interpretation, the expression of the Jerusalem Talmud is, in addition, open to a more direct ethical application. The Torah exposition of the major festivals is not unlike the modern idea of "enabling legislation." The Torah gives us permission to proclaim festivals; it is up to us to proclaim them.

The fact that the 15th day of Nisan arrives does not make for Passover. A family's proclamation based upon eagerness and readiness, preparatory efforts and a sense of anticipation, special ceremonies and unique observances, makes for Passover. The same is true of the Sabbath which does not begin — except legally — merely because the sun sets on Friday. It begins when Kiddush is recited and a total mood of sanctification is ushered in by concrete and well planned measures.

All of us would do well to reflect upon our observance of the Sabbath and festivals out of a conscious realization that: "If you proclaim them, then they will be My festivals; if not, then they will not be My festivals."
