#### THE FAST OF THE TENTH OF TEVET

On Tuesday, December 31st, we observe the Fast of the Tenth of Tevet, known as Asarah b'Tevet.

This fast day which is observed from before sunrise until after sunset, commemorates the beginning of the seige of Jerusalem by the Bablyonian armies in the year 586 B.C.E.

The seige lasted on and off for about six months until the seventeenth day of Tammuz on which the wall of Jerusalem was breached for the first time. It then took three weeks until the Temple was destroyed and resistance was broken on the ninth day of Av.

The fast of the tenth day of Tevet thus represents the beginning of the end for the first Jewish Commonwealth. In our day, it has additional meaning, because it is customarily the day devoted to remembering the decimation of six million Jews during the reign of Nazi terror in Europe.

At special services on Tuesday morning, December 31st, we will recite special prayers to remember the six million. The service begins at the regular time, 7:30.

## Hon. Pinchas Sapir Addresses Inspired Gathering at Service

One of the most memorable moments in the 97 year history of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun was observed last Saturday morning, December 14th, in our Main Synagogue. The occasion was a full dress, open appeal for Israel Bonds which was held following an informative and frank address by Hon. Pinchas Sapir, Cabinet Minister and Secretary General of the Labor Party in Israel.

In the absence of Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, who was ill with the flu, the appeal was made by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein. He stressed the deep concern of the government of Israel for the welfare, security and economic health of the Jewish State in the face of the unprecedented budgetary demands being made upon it as a result of the recent six-day war. Israeli leaders consider this crisis to be a more desperate one even than that of eighteen months ago.

At that time, Kehilath Jeshurun held a similar appeal with dramatic results. This time too, the response was most generous and heartwarming. In excess of \$400,000 was pledged by the worshippers. Many gave in a sacrificial way, reflecting their deep concern for Israel's welfare and recognizing that Israel Bonds are more than simply a good investment.

As an aftermath of the appeal in the synagogue, letters have been sent to the entire membership of the congregation requesting the participation of everyone in this appeal.

On page 3 of this Bulletin, you will find an excerpt from an Israeli magazine which depicts in frank style the role of Israelis in this crisis. It is a role of life and limb, of military service and great economic sacrifice.

Our role, on the other hand, is simply to make an investment in Israel's future by buying Bonds. There is no easier way to do a mitzvah. There is also no more important way at this very moment.

#### "Spirit Over Might"

When Joseph brought his two sons to Jacob to receive the grandfather's blessing, he placed them in the order of seniority, first Menasheh and then Ephraim. When Jacob blessed the boys, however, he "blessed Ephraim before Menasheh, saying: I know my son, I know (that their blessing is reversed); he also (Menasheh) will become a tribe and he too will become great. Nevertheless, his younger brother will be greater than he'."

Rashi comments that from the Tribe of Menasheh came the powerful warrior Gedeon; while from the tribe of Ephraim was descended the great spiritual leader Joshua. The difference between them is evident in the description of the Jewish People following the demise of each.

After the great victory of Gedeon over the enemies of Israel, we read in the Book of Judges that "the children of Israel returned to their worship of idols." After the demise of Joshua, however, we are told that Israel continued to worship God. This soldier of the spirit won not only the physical battle of the present, but the religious struggle for the future.

Samson Raphael Hirsch in his commentary on Genesis, points out that the preference for Ephraim over Menasheh was but one further example of ultimogeniture in the Bible; that is, the first-born is secondary to his younger sibling. Abel takes precedence over Cain, Abraham over his older brothers, Isaac over Ishmael, Jacob over Esau, Joseph over his elders and even David, the youngest, over his older brothers.

The older brother who gets a double inheritance from the father and who holds the reigns of rule in the family, represents might in the family structure. Where, however, the younger brother is more spiritually inclined, the Bible prefers him to the first-born. This is but another indication of the primacy which Judaism gives to right over might, to principles over power and to spirit over strength.

The power of the eldest may be supreme in the present, but the spiritual force of the youngest assures survival in the future.

## THAT NIGHT!

(The account below is excerpted and translated from a recent issue of Panim El Panim, an Israeli weekly magazine. It illustrates the role of the Israeli in the current crisis. On balance, it would seem that the role of the American Jew - to buy bonds - is a far easier one)

It could happen any minute and it might not happen for a week. That night at twelve o'clock midnight in Kibbutz Tirat Zvi in the Southern part of the Bet She'an valley, it happened! The sound of shells bursting throughout the valley awakened those whose ears were attuned to it. Others were roused from sleep by the shrill siren sounding the alarm. El Fatah marauders were in the neighborhood with mortars and bazookas.

The central power switch was shut off and the Kibbutz was enshrouded in darkness. Parents who were on duty that night roused the children and hastened them to the shelters. Some, half asleep, groping their way through the darkness, dragged their blankets with them — for warmth? for security? who really knows!

In the shelters for the little tots the parents placed the babies in three tiered steel bunks while the older children sat on wooden stools, playing quietly, coloring, jabbering away; some just nodding sleepily.

An hour and a half passed that way. The sound of guns became more distant and faint. And then — silence. Everything was quiet.

The phone rang in the central shelter. It was the advanced guard reporting that the marauders were dispersed. The siren sounded the all clear and the stream of Kibbutzniks, young and old, reversed from shelter to home.

The lights went on again; children were put back to bed and the adults who had lost two hours of sleep lay down again, to arise two hours later — this time for work.

## A LOOK AT OUR YOUTH ACTIVITIES PROGRAM

Now that just about four months of our program year have been completed, it is worthwhile to survey one area of congregational activity that receives the least amount of publicity, but that contains the greatest amount of activity. We refer to the youth activities department of Kehilath Jeshurun.

Under the capable leadership of Mr. Noam Shudofsky, our Director of Youth Activities, this department has continued to grow over the past few years and to change in accordance with the changing needs of the children.

Currently, the following activities are being conducted regularly:

**Shachar** — This is our teenage group, composed of boys and girls in high school. The membership now totals 94 teenagers.

This group has held one Sabbath luncheon. Another is planned for the first Sabbath in January. Shortly, Shachar will sponsor a Saturday evening social event.

The newest activity of the teenage group is the sponsorship of a dramatics club which plans to stage a full version of Gilbert and Sullivan's Mikado later in the spring.

**Boy Scouts** – Currently there are 41 scouts in Troop 613. They are organized into two groups, the eleven year olds and the thirteen year olds. The scoutmasters are Dr. Mortimer Blumenthal and Mr. Irving Heisler, two parents of boys in the troop.

**Cub Scouts** — These are also organized in age groups. The older age group contains twelve members in two dens. Mr. Norman Mosesson, a member of the congregation and a parent, serves as the cubmaster for that group. The third and fourth graders are arranged in another group numbering twenty-four members and four dens. Their activities are coordinated by Mrs. Doris Deutsch and Mrs. Michael Barany.

Junior Congregation – Currently holding a membership of fifty-three youngsters between the ages of seven and twelve, this group meets some fifty times during the program season under the leadership of Aaron Holzer. The children lead the service, host the kiddush and deliver sermonettes, besides serving in various official capacities.

Recently, the children themselves have been doing their own Torah reading, thus displacing the teenagers who used to perform that service for them.

**Pre-School Services** — Under the leadership of Marilyn Smilow and Naomi Markson this group now has an average of ten children, ages four through six. Because of the disparity of age, we have divided the groups into a younger group and an older group. They meet every Saturday and holiday morning at 11:00 o'clock.

The Father and Son Minyan – Not to be left out, this traditional activity of our congregation continues on a regular basis on Sunday mornings.

This year we have found a resurgence in attendance and interest in this particular activity, both in terms of better davening and better basketball.
