



WHAT YOU CAN DO

The present crisis in the Middle East is causing all of us a great deal of anguish. Anxiety and concern, however, are not enough. There is something that each and every one of us can do — indeed, must do — in order to help resolve the crisis.

We suggest that you make one or more of the following points:

1. The right of Israel to defend itself from Arab sponsored terrorism must be recognized by the nations of the world.

2. The indiscriminate murder of innocent civilians is an act without sanction in the accepted rules of war. It is surely to be deplored more than the destruction of inanimate aircraft.

3. The "even-handed" approach to the problems of the Middle East calls for the denunciation of the terrorist agitators. Only then can nations legitimately pass judgment on acts of reprisal.

Above all, let each and every one of us do something. The crisis demands it. Our moral conscience makes it essential. When we are asked by the Israelis: "What have you done for us?" Let each of us have an acceptable answer.

"Building for Leadership"

We are all familiar with the story of the birth of Moses which appears in this week's portion from the Torah. The child was brought up by his mother as the agent of the daughter of Pharaoh. We read in the Bible "And the child matured and she brought him to the daughter of Pharaoh and became her son . . . And it came to pass in those days that Moses matured and he went out among his brothers and he saw their travails."

Our sages remark that the child matured first in the home of his mother and then again in the home of Pharaoh's daughter. This would indicate that his early development was supervised by his mother. It comes, therefore, as no surprise that upon his complete maturity he went out among his brothers and "he saw their travails."

It would appear that the training which he received in his mother's home rendered him capable of feeling the anguish of the Children of Israel. It is by no means natural for a child to be sympathetic to the problems of others. This is an acquired characteristic. It must be learned by the child and it must, therefore, be taught by parents.

The ideal method for teaching such concern is for the parents themselves to show concern for others. This method was epitomized by Moses' mother who was, as we read in this week's portion, the mid-wife for the Jewish People at that time. It was she who saved countless children from being cast into the sea by the officers of Pharaoh.

Parents can learn from the example of Moses' mother. If in their discussions at home they evince concern for the welfare of the Jewish people, their children will catch their concern from them. If they support the United Jewish Appeal, the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, and other philanthropic organizations which help our fellow Jews, their children will develop a sense of the importance of charity and rendering help to those in need.

"And the woman took the child and she nursed him." From all that we know of Moses we must assume that he was nursed not only on the milk which sustains life but the milk of human kindness which makes life worthwhile.

Federation of Jewish Philanthropies Grants \$200,000 to

Burned out Yeshivot

Last week the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York announced a special emergency grant of \$200,000 to aid three Yeshivot in Brooklyn whose premises had been devastated by fires of suspicious origin. The schools to be assisted are: Yeshiva of Eastern Parkway, Achiezer Yeshiva and the Shaaray Zedek Hebrew Academy. They have a combined enrollment of almost two thousand children.

None of these institutions is a member agency of Federation. They turned, however, to Federation in their hour of crisis and Federation has generously answered the call. Initially, a grant of \$50,000 will be made available to help in the relocation of classes on a temporary basis. An additional \$150,000 will be provided for rebuilding, repairing or renovating the damaged facilities.

We are extremely gratified at this kind of action on the part of Federation. It marks just about the first example of direct assistance to Yeshivot whether on an emergency or an on-going basis. We feel this policy should

be expanded and carried out on a long term program.

Secondly, we are also gratified to learn that the major impetus for this emergency action by Federation came from the Department of Religious Affairs which is headed by an esteemed member of this congregation, Rabbi Isaac N. Trainin. Thank God for his impetus; and thank God for Federation's generous response.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

A recent publication of the Lubavitcher Movement calls our attention to advice once given by Rabbi Shmuel of Lubavitch, of sainted memory. He advised his followers to occupy their minds with Torah thoughts whenever they walked in the street.

One businessman is reputed to have asked the Rebbe in amazement how such a difficult thing was humanly possible. The Rebbe replied: "If it is possible to think business thoughts during "Shemoneh Esray" (the silent prayer) then it is surely possible to think about Torah and prayer while walking in the street."
