They will receive the traditional noisemakers with which to greet the reading of Haman's name, and they will be presented with special holiday sweets at the conclusion of the service.

The Schedule

The following is the schedule for services on Purim eve. Mincha services will be held in the Chapel at 5:30. Children in elementary school are asked to assemble in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House at 5:15. They should not be brought much earlier than that because a long wait will make them unnecessarily restive. Teachers and counsellors from our teen-age group will be on hand to supervise them and to distribute the noisemakers to them.

The children will be ushered into the main synagogue where Ma'ariv services will begin at 6:00. Ma'ariv will be followed by the reading of the Megillah. The service will conclude at a reasonable hour.

SPECIAL MEGILLAH READING FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN PURIM MORNING TUESDAY, MARCH 4th

It is not commonly known that the main obligation to hear the reading of the Megillah is on Purim morning. For sociological reasons only, the emphasis in America has been on the evening reading.

The reading of the Megillah, moreover, is as incumbent upon women as upon men, for Esther was the heroine of the miraculous deliverance of the Jews from the hand of Haman. Most women, however, find it difficult to attend the 7:00 A.M. services on Purim Day.

This year, therefore, we are continuing a practice which we began a few years ago. A special reading of the Megillah for women and children will be held on Tuesday morning, March 4th, from 10:30 to 12:00, in the synagogue chapel. The children are invited to bring their noisemakers and to finish off Haman for good at that time.

The reading of the Megillah will be done by a group of Ramaz students who serve as alternates for the Monday evening reading. They are:

IN ADVANCE OF PURIM A Note Especially to Parents

Purim is essentially a wonderful family festival, one which is admirably suited to the needs of families in a community like ours. There are a number of customs associated with Purim – actually they are laws – which will lend a great deal of meaning to the holiday. But they need some advance preparation.

The first custom is "Mishloach Manot" — the sending of gifts of food to friends and neighbors. One fulfills this requirement by sending two different types of ready-to-eat foods to at least one person.

For purely competitive reasons, the practice of gift giving has been associated with Chanukah rather than with Purim. Actually, it is germane to Purim and the reason for it is that we are happiest when we share our happiness with others and celebrate our good fortune with family and friends.

If there are children in the family, they should be involved in making up the lists of people to whom food gifts will be sent. They should help to prepare the simple baskets in which the goodies are sent. Ideally, they should be the actual conveyers of these gifts to friends and to family. In this way, they joyfully participate in the festival.

A second practice is the festive Purim meal which is served toward evening on the day of Purim, beginning before sunset and lasting into the night. This should be a family occasion for as many generations as exist in the family, grandparents, parents, children and so on. The lovely Purim songs which the children learn in school may be sung; the traditional Purim dishes — and, of course, beverages — should be served; and the special Grace after Meals with the Al Hanissim should be recited.

I write this column well in advance of Purim to encourage all of our readers to prepare for this joyous festival. If you observe it with all of its practices, you too will ask in the accents of the traditional children's song: "Why can't Purim fall twice a week?"

A MOST MEMORABLE SABBATH IN TWO INSTALLMENTS

The Sabbath last week at Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun was a doubly impressive one. In the morning a number of new features were introduced in the service in our Main Synagogue. In the afternoon, an overflow crowd attended a special Seudah Shelishith program.

In the morning, Cantor Cohen introduced several new melodies into the repertoire of our congregation both during the Shacharith service and the Musaf service. These melodies were an outgrowth of hard work on the part of our Cantor and a special group of congregants.

During the preceding week, some fifteen worshippers of the congregation assembled with the Cantor to learn new congregational melidoes. The members of this group then served as support for the Cantor as he introduced those melodies to the congregation on the Sabbath.

In addition, the congregation resumed an old practice at Kehilath Jeshurun by singing some of the traditional hymns in a responsive fashion. The entire experience highlighted the musical aspect of prayer and gave new life and spirit to the congregational singing in our Main Synagogue.

Three Lecture-Sermons

Continuing our emphasis on prayer, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein delivered the second in a series of three lecturesermons on prayer. The general theme is "Prayer As Judaism Sees It." The topic of his address last week was "The What and How of Prayer."

During the course of the lecture sermon, the Rabbi explained why we pray in so formal a manner, why we use the Hebrew language and, specifically, the language of the Bible. He discussed the problem of how formal prayer and a highly structured service must nevertheless become a personal experience which expresses the needs of the individual.

Our Associate Rabbi will complete this series during the sermon period this coming Saturday morning. His subject will be: "What Man Gets from Prayer."

Rabbi Avraham Piatelli Greeted

by Two Hundred Guests

The culmination of a beautiful sabbath came on Saturday afternoon when close to two hundred men and women jammed the chapel for Mincha and then filled the social hall for a special Seudah Shelishith Program sponsored by the Men's Club of the congregation. The occasion, of course, was the appearance in our synagogue of the Chief Rabbi of Venice, Rabbi Avraham Piatelli.

The young Rabbi is the spiritual leader of an ancient Jewish community which has historic roots in the Jewish past and which served for many years as the center of printing for Jewish scholarly volumes.

Martin R. Rochlin, the President of the Men's Club, introduced the entire program. Rabbi Haskel Lookstein introduced the Chief Rabbi and his lovely Rebbetzin to the gathering.

Rabbi Piatelli spoke about some of the personalities who highlighted the history of the Jewish community of Venice. He told of the state of the Jewish community today, a community which prays in rotation in five ancient synagogues of the old Jewish ghetto, in order to keep each one of them functioning.

The Rabbi also spoke of the relationship of the Italian Jewish community to the papacy. He recalled with great fondness the significant contributions made by the late Pope John XXIII toward understanding between Italian Catholics and Jews. His voice changed appreciably when he spoke with some sadness about the successor to Pope John and of the feeling that the newest Pope does not reflect quite the same humanitarian spirit that was manifested by his predecessor.

Rabbi Piatelli was most impressed by this tremendous gathering which obviously came to honor him and to give him inspiration and strength as he faces his rather lonely task of leading the Jewish community of Venice. It is fitting that we gave him strength because those who have seen him in action in Venice know that he provides, vigor and inspiration for that remnant of what was once a great Jewish community.

The entire day was a very special one in this year of special events in the life of Kehilath Jeshurun.
