TIKKUN LEIL SHAVUOTH

This year, again, we will conduct Tikkun Leil Shavuoth on the first evening of the Shavuoth festival. This program was begun several years ago and attracts more people each year.

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The custom of Tikkun is an ancient one. In days gone by, men would gather to read selections from the Books of the Torah and the Talmud in order to symbolize the importance of Jewish learning on the holiday which commemorates the giving of the Law. The session would last until early in the morning and, after reciting the morning prayers, the assembled would return home to sleep.

Our practice is a somewhat modified one. We begin our program at 10:30 P.M. and we conclude at midnight. We invite not only men but women too; not only the old but also the young.

At this year's Tikkun program, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will lead the group in the study of certain laws pertaining to prayer. For the last few weeks, a group has been meeting regularly on Saturday afternoons to study this subject. On Shavuoth night, this study will be brought to a partial completion.

Please come, therefore, on Thursday evening, May 22nd, at 10:30 o'clock, to participate in Tikkun Leil Shavuoth. Refreshments will be served as part of the evening's fare.

RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN "COMPLAINS" ABOUT "PORTNOY" AT CLOSING SISTERHOOD MEETING

Another successful season of the Kehilath Jeshurun Sisterhood has come and gone. It was brought to a rousing climax by a closing meeting in the Social Hall which saw a capacity crowd in attendance.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. Leon A. Feldman, the meeting was chaired by Mrs. Haskel Lookstein, first Vice President. She was re-elected to office together with Mrs. Eugene Hollander, second Vice President, Mrs. Leon Spilky, Corresponding Secretary and Mrs. Jack Lieberman, Treasurer.

Mrs. Meyer Texon, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, placed all the names in nomination and in addition, nominated Mrs. Benjamin Brown for the office of Recording Secretary to replace the retiring Mrs. Albert H. Bernstein. All the Officers were elected unanimously.

Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein, Chairman of the Membership Committee, inducted three new members into the Sisterhood: Mrs. Michael M. Barany, Mrs. Aaron G. Meislin and Mrs. David Weisselberger.

Philip Roth "Lets Go"

The highlight of the afternoon was an extended review by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein of Philip Roth's latest book, "Portnoy's Complaint." The Rabbi cited the fact that Roth's second major work of literature was entitled "Letting Go." In his most recent work, a semi-autobiographical novel about one Alexander Portnoy, Philip Roth has really "let go" with all the bitterness in a frustrated heart, the consummate skill in a talented pen, the forthright filth of a perverted mind, and the most indelicate dismemberment of the canons of taste, propriety and heretofore accepted literary forms.

Roth has consciously written what has been called a "desperately dirty novel." Moreover its very dirtiness may well constitute its organizing principle. He has also hit on a new medium for the revelation of all his feelings: the verbalization of his humor and hatred, his racey stories and his raging temper, his pious thoughts and his pornographic acts, his love and his lust before a silent, shadowy and professionally unjudging audience of one—an all accepting psycho-analyst for whom everything is grist for the mill.

A Double Reaction

The story of the Book of Ruth is that of a righteous convert who, after the passing of her husband, follows her bereaved mother-in-law into a life of poverty and forsakes her homeland and "a people whom she knew not heretofore."

In the new land she gleans in the fields to support herself and her distressed mother-in-law. Her modest behavior and sincerity attract the notice of the aristocratic Boaz, a kinsman of her former husband who decides to maintain the family name by taking this poor woman as his wife. From the union of Boaz and Ruth comes the ancestry of King David.

levels; that of a reader of literature and that of a Jew reading a book about Jews written by a Jew. The two levels will result in different — though not necessarily opposing — judgments.

As a literary work, it has as perhaps its sole recommendation the fact that it is terribly funny in parts. Roth has the capacity to describe life situations with such precision, imagery and humor as to provoke in most readers outbursts of laughter.

As literature too, the book represents the most unfettered freedom of expression ever included in a serious literary work. Every facet of sex is discussed with brutal frankness. Every curse word and filthy slang term is slung around with reckless abandon.

Perhaps this is symptomatic of the times in which we live. Perhaps it is a further manifestation of the breakdown of middle class values and restraints which are in evidence in the long hair of boys and the short skirts of girls, the unrestrained behavior of young people before marriage and the general way of life characterized by the hippie existence.

Perhaps this is also a further manifestation of the decline of Jewish discipline. Portnoy himself indicates that one of his most grotesque exhibitions of immoral behavior took place immediately after he ate lobster for the first time in his life. He connects the breakdown of the religious taboo with the breakdown in his moral restraints. To Portnoy this is a good thing; to us it is a tragedy.

This book is a further symbol of a trend in the arts toward the kind of total frankness that really constitutes vulgar exhibitionism. Our movies, our plays, our paintings and now our books are hard to distinguish from what used to be called hard core pornography.

Kashrut at home and in life

But, in addition to viewing this as a literary work, we have a right – indeed an obligation — to evaluate this book from our own Jewish perspective. As such, there is at least one constructive service that Roth performs. He highlights some of the widely prevalent mistakes of Jewish parents. He indicts them for smothering their children rather than simply rearing them. He exposes their hypocrisy in keeping kosher at home and demanding the same of their children, while being prepared to eat anything and everything in the Chinese restaurant away from home.

On the whole, however, the Jewish reader cannot come to praise Roth, but

must rather come to condemn him. Rarely has self hatred been more evident in any art form. The Jewish names that Roth deftly chooses are of the most grotesque variety and clearly manifest his own hopeless image of himself.

The horror experienced by Portnoy with his Jewish nose as opposed to the "goyishe" nose which he so admires on Gentile girls is further evidence of his poor self image.

His self hatred is nowhere more manifest than in his tendency to caricature Jewish types rather than develop characterization in his novel. The mother comes forth as a comic strip figure of illiberty. The father emerges as the caricature of nebishhood. The sister is drawn as a fat, graceless, "non-shiksa". Portnoy himself is a monomaniacal pervert.

Why, we may ask, must Roth write this way about Jews - especially today, twenty-five years after Auschwitz, and just shortly after the emergence of Black Anti-Semitism? Why? Why does Saul Bellow write about Herzog and Malamud about the Fixer, describing the plight of the Jewish intellectual and moralist, while Roth spreads only filth about his people? And if Roth does feel this way, why must he wash out his own dirty laundry on the best seller list? Not every self hating thought deserves to be written down and not every written word must be published.

There is one further indictment of which the Rabbi spoke. What will the non-Jewish world think of this book? We are not concerned here with what they will think of the disgraceful picture of Jewish life. That is bad enough, but we can survive that. What will they think, however, of his disclosure and exaggeration of the maligning of goyim that goes on in Jewish society. There is a tendency on the part of Jews to speak and think ill of some non-Jews. Our history of two thousand years of persecution at the hands of world Christendom and, most recently, the holocaust in Europe, have given us ample reason for suspicion and mistrust. But, again, we can keep it to ourselves. There is no need to splash it over the printed page and have it read on the best seller list in every language.

There are some statements in the book about non-Jewish people and particularly about the "savior" whom Christians worship that can only be calculated to bring upon the Jewish people the hatred and the scorn of any sensitive Christian. Our only hope in this respect is that the non-Jewish reader will see this author as so sick,

as not to put any credence in his kind of reportage.

In summary, the Rabbi said, Portnoy's Complaint is by far overshadowed by our complaints about Portnoy. A funny book to be sure, it is also grotesque. And its stilted caricatures paint a false picture of the results of a Jewish upbringing, even of the type described by Roth.

A Postscript

In the Yiddish Press recently, a mother who lived on the same block with the Roths in Newark, reported that from the eighteen Jewish families on the block there came six doctors, three lawyers, two druggists, four high school teachers, and three architects. Somebody must have been doing something right on that block, Roth to the contrary, notwithstanding.

But, perhaps the best commentary on Portnoy and his author was offered by the mother of Rabbi Herbert Tarr ("Heaven Help Us"). She asked her son what the book was all about. Tarr told her: "It's about a thirty-three year old Jewish bachelor who savagely condemns his parents for ruining his life." Whereupon Tarr's mother said: "He was a fool for letting them do it."
