# RABBI MARTIN GORDON TO DISCUSS "AN AUTHORITARIAN ETHIC IN AN ANTI-AUTHORITARIAN AGE" AT SECOND ADULT INSTITUTE LECTURE

The second Adult Institute lecture on the general theme "Contemporary Challenges to the Halakhic Way of Life" will be presented on Wednesday evening, November 19th, at 9:00 o'clock in the Social Hall of the Synagogue House. The speaker will be Rabbi Martin Gordon, instructor of Bible and Jewish Philosophy at the Stern College for Women. His subject will be "An Authoritarian Ethic in an Anti-Authoritarian Age."

Rabbi Gordon's subject could not be more timely. The libertarian spirit which has long been an integral part of the American way of life has blossomed in our day into a veritable revolution against authority. It is as if every individual citizen were publishing his own Declaration of Independence, whether the locality be Congress, the church or the university.

James Reston, last summer, observed this mood and commented as follows: "Everywhere, authority is being questioned and even challenged and defied. Presidents and priests, party leaders and chairmen of the board, city bosses, pompous editors, headmasters and all other Establishment characters are in trouble.

What shall be the reaction of Jewish tradition to such an anti-authoritarian mood. Essentially, Judaism is an authoritarian system. Can it survive in an age when control, discipline, rules and regulations are anathema to much of the population?

Rabbi Gordon, one of the most brilliant young Rabbis to be ordained by Yeshiva University, will address himself to this problem. He has lectured widely on this subject before many distinguished audiences.

#### "Stop! It's Time for Mincha"

Shacharith is a logical prayer. One rises in the morning in anxious expectation of the day's opportunities and problems and one prays for God's help. Ma'ariv is similarly reasonable. We have survived the day — if not triumphant, at least unbowed — and we thank God for his generous assistance even as we pray for the safekeeping of body and soul through the long night ahead.

But Mincha! what a strange prayer! It comes smack in the middle of the day; it breaks up our routine; it disrupts our sense of continuity. It is short, to be sure; but there is still not enough time for it. It is difficult to hearken to that spiritual alarm clock that rings out in the midst of our busy schedule and says to us: "Stop! It's time for Mincha."

The source for Mincha is in this week's portion. "And Isaac went out to meditate in the field." Our sages tell us that right there our forefather established the ritual of Mincha. They understood this from the fact that this prayer comes in the middle of Isaac's pre-occupation with meeting his future bride. At the moment of greatest anticipation when he did not know whether his dreams were about to be fulfilled or dashed, when he was not sure whether his future was to be secured or destroyed, at that very moment before meeting the bride who was chosen for him, Isaac stops to daven Mincha.

There is a great deal implicit in this inference of our sages. Mincha, apparently, represents a fundamental attitude of the Jew. It tells us, first of all, that although we are deeply involved in our activities, and although we may not feel the need to pray at the moment, we must pray. Mincha is a service that does not derive from a need, but rather from an obligation. As such, it has wide ramifications in Jewish practice.

Secondly, Mincha represents the religious influence in the middle of our daily activities. Religion, according to the Jew, is not something with which one begins and ends the day while he does whatever he pleases in the interim. Religion must influence life; it must determine one's daily be-

havior; it must dominate one's business practices; it must prevade one's relationship with his fellow man.

Finally, Mincha represents our consciousness of God's continuous providence. As we put it in the Modim prayer, we are grateful for "Thy miracles and goodness which come at all times: evening, morning and noon. In a sense, it is Mincha, the midday prayer, that makes the Psalmist's assertion meaningful and capable of fulfillment: "I place God before me always."

It is perhaps not surprising that our sages make a statement about Mincha which they make about no other service: "Let a man always be scrupulous about the Mincha prayer." Such scrupulousness is necessary not only because Mincha is easily forgotten, but also because of what Mincha represents.

#### HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

#### Interpreting the Elections in Israel

Most Israeli political commentators disagree with the interpretation of the recent election which was given by the New York Times last week in an editorial. The Times found that Golda Meir had "lost ground to proponents of a harder line. The vote reflects an ominous shift in Israeli public opinion toward the minority who favor outright annexation of occupied territories."

This interpretation has been challenged by commentators in Israel. It is based essentially, they say, on a false premise: that the decline in the Labor vote was reflected in the gain by Gahal. It is Gahal which favors permanent annexation and settlement of the occupied areas.

In fact, however, the electorate actually voted for continuity in the existing division of power. While the Labor alignment lost its absolute majority of sixty-three seats and now holds only fifty-eight, two of those seats were lost to David Ben Gurion's state list made up largely of dissidents from labor's own camp. Moreover, while Gahal gained five seats, three of these were drawn from its own dissident Free Center faction for whom the election proved a devastating blow. Thus any actual shift between Labor and Gahal may involve only two seats at most.

This analysis was presented in an editorial in the Jerusalem Post (a prolabor newspaper). The analysis was corroborated by most political commentators in Israel. They feel that the seventh Kenesset does not reflect a shift to the right toward a hard line on the question of the future of the occupied territories.

A second interpretation which has received wide support was offered by the independent newspaper, Ha'aretz. According to its editorial, the loss of seats on the part of the labor alignment was a result of fear by the public that this alignment might constitute an overpowering force which would subjugate the country. It is this group that has been in power over the past two and a half years and that has been

identified with Israel's accomplishments, political and military, during this period.

It is noteworthy that Gahal which won twenty-seven seats, where it held only twenty-two seats in the sixth Kenesset, originally had won twentysix seats in that Kenesset. Four of its seats were lost when the Free Center Party was formed from dissidents from Gahal. In last week's vote, the Free Center list lost three out of its four seats. On the other hand, Ben Gurion's State List which held one seat in the last Kenesset will end up with either three or four in the new Kenesset. The National Religious Party remains with eleven seats, the same number that it held in the last Kenesset.
