An article by this young scholar appeared in the summer issue of the magazine Judaism. Among his many fine attributes is the fact that he is a graduate of the Ramaz School.

We welcome Rabbi Helfand to the congregation for the High Holy Day season.

We are happy to congratulate our Associate Rabbi, Haskel Lookstein, upon his election as Principal of the Ramaz School at the June meeting of the Board of Trustees of Ramaz. Rabbi Haskel Lookstein has served the school during the past eighteen years as teacher, Coordinator of Jewish Studies, Associate Principal and Acting Principal. We are confident that he will maintain the standards of excellence for which Ramaz has been noted and that he will advance the record and prestige of the school in the years to come.

The congregation congratulates its family member, Ramaz, on an excellent choice and extends its heartiest mazel tov to Rabbi Haskel Lookstein and his family on this significant promotion.

Please note that the "Midnight Snack" will be held at 9:15. We welcome all worshippers of all ages to the service and to the gathering beforehand.

# WEEKLY PORTION \_ Ki Teze \_\_\_

#### "Wayward Children . . . and their Parents"

One of the most fascinating case studies in Biblical literature concerns the ben sorer u'moreh — the wayward and rebellious son. He is described by our sages as an inconoclast and nonconformist on the one hand and a dissenter from the values of the older generation on the other. Surely his case is a relevant one for both sides of the generation gap today.

Our sages describe this young man as a thief, a glutton and a lush. They indicate that if all of the procedures are carried out and all of the requirements are met - a highly improbable occurence — then the young man must first be flogged and, if there is no improvement, he is executed not so much for what he has done but rather for the danger which he will yet present to society.

As if the entire law is not strange enough, Rabbi Simeon in the Talmud adds a final footnote: "Such a rebellious son never existed nor will one ever exist. Why then was his case recorded by the Torah? So that we might learn the facts and derive the lesson."

There are, it seems to me, three pertinent lessons to be derived from this case. Briefly they are the following:

1. Some youthful acts of dissent and non-conformity may be so dangerous in their implications for the future that they should be dealt with more harshly than the objective act would normally deserve. As a matter of theory, that ugly phrase "shoot the looters" has a certain logic behind it.

2. The second lesson is, paradoxically, that if one acts in accordance with the theoretical conclusion of the first lesson, then one is a barbarian. Over reacting to the rebellion of youth may seem plausible logically, but it should never be countenanced practically. You cannot bludgeon the dissenter, the rebel or the protestor - however grotesque his behavior may be without some of his blood soiling your soul indelibly. The looter in a riot must be apprehended; but you cannot

shoot him without your becoming a murderer.

In short, if one reacts to the act of dissent and iconoclasm not in terms of the act but out of fear for future implications, one is bringing about a present that is intolerably worse than any future could be. Out of fear for the safety of society one dare not introduce into society the norms of the jungle.

3. Finally, Rashi points out that the rebellious son is not a creature of his own making. The passage dealing with his case follows two other paragraphs: one dealing with war and the other with marital discord. These three passages are linked causally according to Jewish tradition.

Out of the turbulence and turmoil of a world of strife and enmity and out of the increasing manifestation of domestic discord, distrust and disarray there develops a climate which nurtures non-conformist youth, rebellious sons, alienation, anomie and the now cliched generation gap.

Perhaps the natural reaction of v'yisru oto - "beat the nonsense out of them" - serves no practical purpose and makes a brute out of the beater. Perhaps a more felicitous approach is found in the Targum's translation of v'yisru oto - u'malfin yatai -"teach them what is right." The best approach to the young iconoclast is for the old to serve as teacher — not alone in words but more often in example, in personal standards and in a serious commitment to what is right and what is good.

It might help us to know that even God had to learn to tolerate rebellion and dissent. In the concluding verses of this week's prophetic portion, we read: "Even as I have promised never again to bring the floods of Noah upon the earth, so shall I refrain from anger and resentment against you. For the mountains will move and the valleys will totter; but my love for you will not be moved and my covenant of peace with you will not totter. Thus sayeth the merciful God."
