FREEDOM LIGHTS FOR SOVIET JEWRY

Twenty thousand Jews from the New York area gathered in Madison Square Garden last Monday night for what has to be considered an historic occasion in the annals of this community. The demonstration of support and concern for Soviet Jewry was without precedent or parallel.

Such a great occasion which we hope and pray will help our brothers and sisters in the Soviet Union in the weeks and months to come was the result of a combination of efforts on the part of many community organizations, spearheaded by the New York Conference on Soviet Jewry and the center for Soviet Jewry. We are happy and proud to note that Kehilath Jeshurun played a significant role as well.

Our greatest role was manifested through the exceptional work of Gilbert Kahn in behalf of this project. Gil, who is the co-Chairman of KJSJ, our own Soviet Jewry organization, undertook to sell 500 tickets through the Congregation and Ramaz for the Madison Square Garden rally. He accomplished almost the whole of this goal. He enjoyed the assistance of many Ramaz students and the help of Ephraim Buchwald of the Judaic Studies staff in the Upper School.

Beyond that, Gil was involved in every phase of the wider community effort. It probably could be said that Freedom Lights could not have been accomplished without his work.

LIGHTING IN THE FACE OF IMMINENT DARKNESS

An Answer to Noah Scheinfeld The question was asked by young

Noah Scheinfeld at this past Sunday's Father and Son Minyan in the presence of a packed congregation. Noah, a son of Mr. and Mrs. David Scheinfeld and a student in the third grade at Ramaz, asked as follows: "If the cruse of oil had enough to burn for one night and it lasted for eight nights then the miracle was only of seven days duration. Why do we light candles for eight days?"

It is not a new question, although it does not usually arise from one so young. This question has troubled many scholars over the centuries. There are, of course, many answers. Permit me to give one which derives from a Chassidic Rebbe.

The last seven nights of Chanukah reflect the miracle of the cruse of oil enduring an additional seven nights. On the first night we light for another miracle entirely: the miracle of faith demonstrated by the Maccabees of that day who lit the menorah on the first night although they knew the oil supply would not last and the menorah would go dark after one night.

One would have expected the Jews of that day to have waited until they were sure of the proper supply of oil. The fact that they lit in the face of imminent darkness, a darkness which they could not prevent and which they knew would be forthcoming, was a demonstration of their faith that if they kindled a light somehow it would survive.

This miracle of faith is symbolic of the history of the Jewish people. Wherever we went in exile we kindled the light of Judaism in the face of impending darkness.

We knew instinctively that Judaism could not survive in many of the lands of our sojourns. But we did not live in accordance with that instinctual knowledge. Instead we defied nature; we lit with no hope of endurance and, miraculously, the light did endure.

This was true also of the early Zionists who began a movement for the restoration of a Jewish national homeland in the face of impossible odds. They began it although they knew that failure was inevitable. And, miraculously, they succeeded.

This was also true of the early Orthodox pioneers in the late nineteenth century in this country. They dared to try to implant the tradition of Torah and piety in a land which was inhospitable to the full expression of Jewish tradition. And, miraculously they succeeded.

That same miraculous faith was responsible for the development of Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz. Who would have believed that one hundred steps east of Park Avenue it would be possible to establish an Orthodox synagogue in which the fullest expression of Jewish tradition could be found, in which youngsters could read the Torah flawlessly and enthusiastically, in which American-born Jews could take a tallis over their heads while davening, and in which Chassidic dance and song could find expression on Simchat Torah and at other times? Who would have believed it?

In fact, when my father first wanted to found Ramaz most observers considered the task to be unwise and unproductive, an exercise in futility. It was felt that this neighborhood could never be hospitable to a yeshiva. It was said that the members of this synagogue would contribute to yeshiva education but that they would never send their children to derive its benefits. Thank God that a candle was lit in the face of inevitable, impending darkness. And, miraculously, the light endured, the flame grew and the menorah that is KJ and Ramaz came into being.

It is for that reason, Noah, that we light a candle on the first night of Chanukah. In a sense, the fact that in 1971 you could ask such a question is indicative of the miracle of Jewish faith and optimism, a faith and an optimism that history has happily validated.
