Of Community Interest

(We reprint below a statement issued by the Religious Zionists of America because it summarizes the mood and analysis which were conveyed in the recent series of three sermons delivered by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein. We feel, therefore, that the statement might be of special interest to our readers. Ed.)

The Religious Zionists of America once again confirm their commitment to support and uphold the dignity and authority of the Chief Rabbis of Israel, particularly do they salute Chief Rabbi Goren for his courageous resolution of a most distressing problem which he faced together with all Jews in Israel and throughout the world. Furthermore, they note with great delight and enthusiasm the support and concurrence he has received from his colleagues in Israel, especially the saintly Rabbi Zvi Yehuda Hacohen Kook, the Council of the Chief Rabbinate, and the Association of Rabbis affiliated with the Religious Zionist party in Israel.

They regret and deplore the hasty and intemperate attacks made upon him by some rabbis whom they implore to cease and desist from their continuing incriminations which serve only to undermine respect for the religious heritage of our people and especially the Halacha. They respectfully urge these rabbis to give another look at the facts and the law of the case which precipitated their outbursts, and to conduct whatever dialogue they seek where it properly belongs, in the form of halachic interchange, and not in forms which exacerbate sensationalism and strife, with the resulting loss of popular respect for the rabbis themselves and for the Torah and tradition they honor.

THE SYNAGOGUE AS AN INSTITUTION AND AN IDEA

(Part Three of the Resume of Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik's Centennial Lecture)

Man is homeless, frightened, insecure and vulnerable. Even man at his greatest is homeless out of restlessness and boredom. In that state of homelessness, man must pray; he must turn homeward to the House of Prayer.

"When you are in pain and in trouble and when all of these difficulties affect you . . . then shall you return unto the Lord your God." (Deuteronomy 4:30). In exile we search for God who represents home. In this search small and frightened man finds security while great and restless man finds peace. Modern man, unfortunately, does not know how to pray and hence he has lost the feeling of being at home in shul. He does not know how to experience the closeness with God and the dependence upon him that represent the essence of prayer. Naturally, then, he does not find security and warmth in the syna-

The Eastern European Jew two generations ago knew that coming to shull meant coming home. He would enter his shteeble on Friday night, rub his hands together warmly and recite a yehi ratzon which was a prayer to God who brought him home. "... May you grant me a Sabbath of holiness . . . and may there be no worry, trouble or sadness on the day of our rest . . . During the week I have been in exile. Tonight I am home.

The Character of a Shul

Why do we need a synagogue at all? Why not pray in a field? The Jew does not need a house in which to pray. He does not even need a minyan for prayer. We need a structure not for its architectual value but for its psychological effect. We do not need a house; we need a home. The synagogue should be called not the House of God but rather the Home of God or, more accurately, the home of man.

The synagogue exists as an institution and as an idea. As an institution it is and does many things. As an idea, as a representation of an ideal in the Jewish religion, the synagogue is the home of man, man's refuge from the insecurity and vulnerability of exile.

This portrait of the character of the synagogue is a very old one. It comes from the first synagogue in Jewish life, the Temple of Solomon. The synagogue as an idea is clearly defined by King Solomon in his prayer at the dedication of the Temple (Kings I 8:22-53).

"For will God in truth dwell on the earth? Behold the heaven and the heaven of heavens cannot contain You; how much less this house that I have built. Yet will You turn toward the prayer of Your servant and to his supplication . . . and Your eyes will be open toward this house night and day . . . and You will listen to the prayer which Your servant will pray in this place . . .

"When a man will sin against his neighbor . . . he will come and pledge before Your altar in this house; and You will listen . . . when Your people Israel will be smitten down before the enemy . . . if they turn again to thee and recognize Your name and pray . . . in this house, then You will hear in heaven . . . and bring them back unto the land which You gave to their fathers.

When the heaven is shut and there is no rain by virtue of their sins, then they will pray in this place . . . and You will hear them in heaven and You will cause the rain to fall upon the land which You have given to your people. If there be famine in the land or pestilence, destruction of crops, locusts or caterpillar; if the enemy besiege them in the land or if there be plague or sickness, Your people will pray . . . and stretch out their hands toward this house. You will then hear in Your abode in heaven . . .

When Your people will go out to war against their enemies . . . then they will pray to God in the city which You have chosen and in the house which I have built for Your name. And You will hear their prayer in heaven.

The synagogue as an idea represents man's home on earth. "And they shall build for me a sanctuary and I shall dwell in their midst." (Exodus, 25:8). The synagogue is God's home because it is man's home."

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
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
