This year, then, Purim will be a double-barreled Yom Tov with an opportunity for young and old to enjoy the spirit of the festival and to hear the Megillah read beautifully and inspiringly both at night and in the morning. It should be a lot of fun and a delightful occasion. You are all welcome.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

More on Rabbi Goren

In the last several weeks, clear statements of support for Rabbi Shlomo Goren's ruling in the Langer case and his position in general as Chief Rabbi, have been issued by Rabbi Yosef Henkin and Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik. Rabbi Soloveitchik's strong endorsement of the Chief Rabbi was given directly to President Zalman Shazar with a request that the President quote him clearly on the matter.

The newspapers also carried recently word of Rabbi Goren's plan to set up a World Rabbinical Council in Jerusalem to deal with Halakhic problems arising in Israel and the Diaspora. Rabbi Goren's criteria for membership in the World Rabbinical Council do not exclude non-orthodox rabbis, providing that they accept "the Shulchan Arukh and are totally committed to Halakha."

Nixon, Shazar and the Shabbat

President Nixon and President Shazar held a warm conference during the latter's brief visit here recently. A strange scene was part of their farewell. Following a warm handshake, Shazar entered his car and Nixon went up the steps to the White House.

Suddenly Nixon turned around and ran back to Shazar's car calling something to the driver. When asked what it was that Nixon had said, Shazar told a reporter that the President urged the driver who was leading the procession to move quickly and get Shazar to the airport with all speed so that the Israeli President should reach New York before the Sabbath began. The meeting of the two Presidents had taken place on an early Friday and their leave-taking had occurred during the afternoon. (reported in **Panim el Panim**)

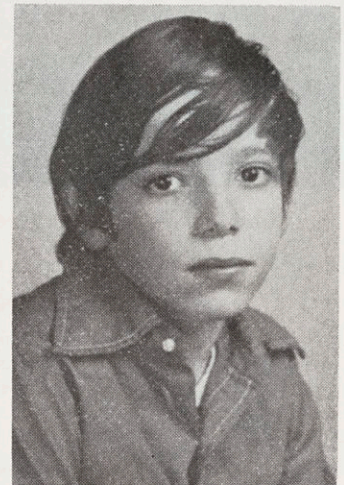
Academic Advancement—

KJSJ Telegram Bank Activated For Juli Tartakovsky

He is 26 years old, a research worker at the head Institute of Oil and Chemistry. He is an engineer of head physics. His name is Juli Tartakovsky.

Juli applied three months ago for a visa to go to Israel after having struggled for several months to collect the necessary documents for himself, his mother and his sister. In September he was imprisoned for fifteen days for having taken part in a Memorial Ceremony at Babi Yar in memory of the athletes massacred at Munich.

Juli, who had already served in the army and was discharged because of illness, was notified that he must take a new physical examination in preparation for army duty. Such duty lasts from two to three years after which one is prohibited from leaving the Soviet Union for five years on the grounds of knowing military secrets.

Several telegrams every two or three days are being sent through the KJSJ TELEGRAM BANK to try to forestall Juli's induction into the army. At present, he has gone into hiding. We are appealing for his freedom — and that of his mother and sister — to go to Israel.

Have you joined the Bank?

The response to our letter appeal for participation in the KJSJ TELEGRAM BANK has been nothing short of phenomenal. Cards continue to come in daily authorizing KJSJ to send out telegrams as necessary in the name of the card sender and to have his telephone bill charged directly. It looks like we will have several hundred members in this bank, each of whom will be authorizing telegrams to be sent up to the amount of \$15.00 during year 1973.

Will you please join us in this sacred effort? Your telegram may prove the difference between freedom for a Soviet Jew and continued detention. **Send no money;** merely send us the necessary authorization through the form provided in this Bulletin.

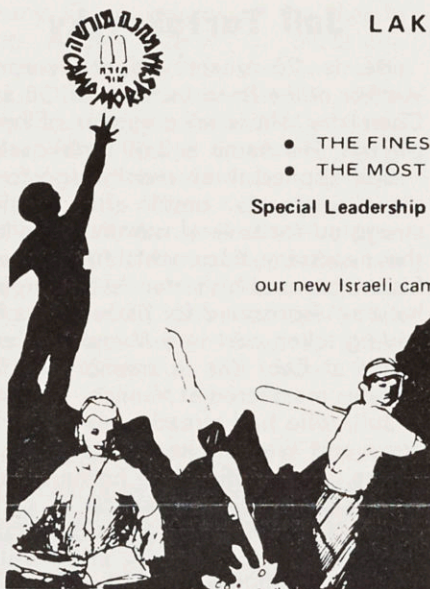
