Commemorative Program on Holocaust

Saturday Night, April 28

This year, Holocaust Day, set aside by the Jewish community all over the world to remember the murder of six million Jews, begins on Saturday night, April 28. Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun is inviting the community to a special program that evening to commemorate this important day and to stress its meaning for our generation.

At 9:00 o'clock, we will gather in the Kamber Auditorium for a brief program. Our esteemed Trustee, Eugene Hollander, will speak to us on some of his personal memories of life in several concentration camps. Following his talk, a group of students from the Ramaz Upper School will offer a dramatic presentation in dialogue and artistic form portraying the meaning of the holocaust. It promises to be a very moving program.

We plan to end the evening early. May we urge the entire community to assemble for this occasion. We suggest that children over the age of 10 might profitably be brought to this program so that they, too, can understand the Holocaust and its past and present consequences.

Ramaz Teacher To Be Honored As "Teacher of the Year"

We are proud to announce that Mrs. Rochelle Zupnick, instructor of Judaic Studies in Grade 3 of Ramaz School, will be honored by the Teachers Institute for Women of Yeshiva University as "Teacher of the Year." The honor is a significant one in that Mrs. Zupnick has been chosen from more than 360 graduates of the Teachers Institute who are currently teaching in day schools.

This is the third time in five years that a Ramaz teacher has been so honored. In recent years, Miss Elaine Linzer, instructor of Grade 2 and Miss Esther Kourkes, our former instructor in Grade 1, were similarly honored.

PREPARING FOR PASSOVER? TRY THESE PROGRAMS

1. "Seder-in":

On Monday, April 9 at 11:00 A.M., Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will conduct a "Seder-in" for all women in the KJ — and Ramaz family. He will discuss some of the laws of Passover, products which require supervision and those which don't, preparations for the Seder and ideas concerning the Hagaddah and the program on the Seder night.

In addition, we would like to have an exchange of Passover recipes for distribution to those who will attend this session. Women who have recipes which they would like to share with others, are asked to send them to Rabbi Haskel Lookstein at the synagogue office and we will make them available at the "Seder-in".

2. "Kasher-in":

On Thursday evening, April 12 at 7 o'clock, in the catering kitchen, we

will hold a "kasher-in" under the sponsorship of the Couples Club of the congregation. Families are invited to bring their silverware, serving trays and metal pots to the synagogue that evening for kashering.

The following provisions should be exercised with everything that is brought: The item must be cleaned thoroughly (in the case of silver, it should be polished) and stored away in some kind of wrapping at least 24 hours prior to the "kasher-in".

We extend a special invitation to families to bring their children so that they, too, might participate in this interesting religious occasion in preparation for Passover.

If you expect to attend this "Kasher-in", please inform the synagogue office.

The Role of Women Subject of Shabbat Hagadol Discourse

The Annual Halakhic discourse on Shabbat Hagadol will be delivered by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein on Saturday, April 14 at 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon. His subject will be "Women According to Jewish Law — Their Status, Their Rights and Their Obligations."

As the title indicates, the Rabbi will discuss the role of women in Judaism as defined by Jewish law and as developed in Talmudic and Midrashic literature. He will endeavor to explain some of the anomalies of the position of women in Judaism as well as to present some of the reactions of Judaism to the new struggle for women's rights in our day.

An invitation is extended to all members to attend this lecture which will be held in the synagogue chapel.

Mincha services will follow the discourse at 5:45.

Two Radio Programs Sponsored by Joseph Schlang

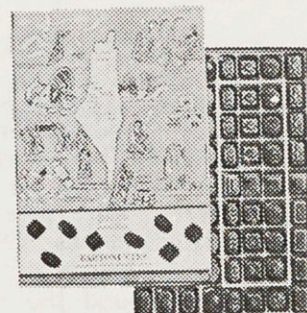

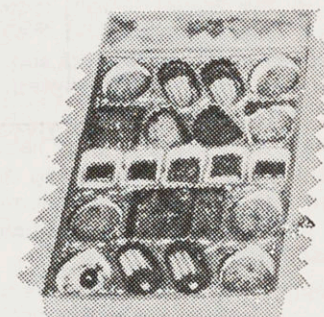
BELATED CONGRATULATIONS

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IT'S KOSHER FOR PASSOVER.

A Holiday Message

In the adjoining column there appears a special formula which is to be recited immediately prior to the asking of the Four Questions on both nights at the Seder table. The formula is recited while holding in one hand the fourth matzah on the table, a matzah which we do not eat and which remains on our table as a symbol of hope for three million Jews in the Soviet Union, as well as all persecuted Jews around this troubled world.

It need not be stressed that every household ought to observe this ritual scrupulously. Says Raban Gamliel — as quoted in our Haggadah — whoever does not understand the ritual of matzah has not fulfilled the obligation of telling the story of the Exodus. What Raban Gamliel is saying is that it is not only important for us to **eat** matzah on Passover night but to **understand** its message: a message of bondage and freedom, of persecution and deliverance.

This dual, conflicting symbolism of the matzah is strange. It is at once **lechem oni**, the bread of affliction and, at the same time, the thin wafer that our forefathers ate on their way out of Egypt because they could not tarry in their quest for freedom. It is thus a symbol of depression as well as hope.

As we recline around the seder table this year — whether in our homes or in the mountains, or even on a cruise — let us reflect about this two-fold symbolism, both historically and currently. Particularly, let us remember and pray for our brothers and sisters in the Soviet Union, recognizing their imprisonment and their life of affliction on the one hand and their indomitable hope of redemption and Aliyah on the other.

May the beginning of their redemption which we are witnessing today blossom into a large scale redemptive Aliyah for Soviet Jews and for all our oppressed brethren.

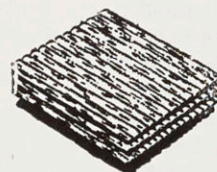

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein Returns From California

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein spent six days in Los Angeles and San Francisco in the interests of the campaign in behalf of Soviet Jewry. The Rabbi preached on Saturday in one of the leading synagogues of Los Angeles and met with the leaders of the Welfare Fund of that city during the course of his visit. He was also received by the Rabbinical Council of San Francisco.

At the Seder table one should have four matzot, the three traditional ones and an additional Matzah, which will not be eaten and which symbolizes the plight of our brethren in the Soviet Union, many of whom are unable to obtain Matzah for Passover.

Just prior to the reciting of the four questions, the reader of the Seder should lift this extra Matzah and read the following proclamation:



THIS IS THE MATZAH OF HOPE

This matzah, which we set aside as a symbol of hope for the three and a half million Jews of the Soviet Union, reminds us of the indestructible links that exist between us.

As we observe this festival of freedom, we know that Soviet Jews are not free — not free to leave, not free to learn of their Jewish past or to hand it down to their children. They cannot learn the languages of their fathers. They cannot teach their children to be the teachers, and the rabbis of future generations.

As their voices rise in Jewish affirmation and protest, we add our voices to theirs, and we shall be joined by all whose consciences are aroused by the wrongs inflicted on Soviet Jews. Thus shall they know that they have not been forgotten and they shall yet emerge into the light of freedom.

Bedikat Chametz

One of the most beautiful and meaningful ceremonies associated with Passover is "bedikat chametz" — the search for chametz. The ceremony is composed of three parts.

1. Reciting a special blessing over the mitzvah of the removal of chametz.
2. The search of the house by the light of a candle to find vestiges of chametz.
3. The reciting of the formula of nullification of chametz.

The ceremony this year will be observed on Sunday night, April 15th. Children especially will be impressed by the ceremony. It should, therefore, be performed with enthusiasm and dedication.

The children should be asked to place the pieces of chametz in the various rooms — a practice which ensures that the search will not be in vain. They can hold the candle and the feather; they should examine their own possessions, dressers and desks, for long forgotten relics of chametz.

Passover is a beautiful festival. It is a serious one too. Both these aspects can be captured twenty-four hours in advance of the festival by a careful observance of the ritual of bedikat chametz.

Disposal of Chametz

No chametz may be eaten on Monday morning, April 16th after 9:30 A.M. All chametz must be completely disposed of by 10:30 A.M.

Sale of Chametz

The ritual sale of chametz must be completed by early Monday morning, April 16th. There are those who prefer to perform this ritual in person. The Rabbis and the Ritual Director are available for that purpose. For those who cannot attend to this matter in person, there is a form provided on this page which authorizes Rabbi Lookstein to sell your chametz. This form should be returned to the synagogue by Monday morning, April 16th, not later than 8:30 o'clock.

Services for First Born

Passover Eve is a traditional fast for first born. It is obligatory upon every first born who cannot observe the fast on Wednesday to attend the special service on that day and to participate at its conclusion in the light collation that is served. The service for the first born (Siyum Bechorim) will be held in the chapel on Monday, April 16th, as part of the regular morning service which begins at 7:30.
