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TEENAGERS TO HOLD SHABBATON ON WEEKEND OF MAY 4-6



WHY DIDN'T THEY FIGHT BACK? A Thought for Holocaust Day

In a recently published book, "Forged in Fury", Michael Elkins deals with the oft-asked question "Why did the six million not resist the attempt of Nazi Germany to effect a final solution of the Jewish problem at their expense?" His answers — though not complete — are worth pondering as we commemorate the murder of the six million and the torture and dehumanization of countless thousands of others on Saturday night, April 28 and Sunday, April 29.

1. The Old and the Young

Of the six million victims, nearly two million would not have been able to fight back had they wished to do so. Many of these were too old to fight or too young to understand what was happening. Still others were blind, crippled, mentally ill or physically diseased.

In addition, several hundred thousand of the victims were Hassidim who believed that man cannot interfere with God's design for the world. Death and torture are a punishment. One must wait for the Messiah to bring deliverance from man's inhumanity to man. Many of these people went to their deaths literally "al kiddush ha-shem", in sanctification of God's name. They did not know how to resist physically, nor were they attuned to resistance intellectually.

2. Reprisals Against The Non-Resister

Those few who decided to resist the brutality of the Nazis faced a terrible dilemma. On the one hand they understood what was happening, at least in part, and they realized that no recourse was left to them but resistance. On the other hand, the mass of Jews did not understand the reality and was not ready for resistance. The enemy was merciless in carrying out reprisals for every act of resistance. An assault upon a Nazi trooper would bring death to 100 Jews. The hundred who died were not necessarily among the resisters, but their death was a direct consequence of the act of resistance.

The Jewish fighter, then, not only had to weigh the consequences of his actions for himself. He also had to realize that by his act of resistance he was implicating those who did not share his decision and who, in fact, generally opposed it.

3. No Support From The Outside

There were undergrounds of every kind during the Nazi occupation of Europe. There were partisans in the forests and in the towns. All of them were supported by arms, airlifted from the outside and by the readiness of the indigenous population to help them in their resistance against the enemy. There was one exception to that help: the Jewish freedom fighter.

Jews had no help whatsoever from the allies, despite their repeated calls for assistance. Moreover, when they did go out into the countryside they were frequently betrayed, hunted and destroyed not only by the Nazis but by the anti-semitic population of Poland, Hungary, Lithuania and other Eastern European countries.

With no moral or physical help, the Jews were left completely to their own devices against an enemy that was armed to the teeth.

4. The Lack of Arms

The resistance fighters also faced almost total impoverishment in terms of arms. Against tanks they had a few guns and some homemade explosives. Arms had to be imported from outside the ghettos at great risk and with the greatest difficulty. With no help from the outside and with no arms from the inside, how could they have resisted?

5. They Didn't Know

The greatest deterrent to resistance was ignorance. The masses of the Jewish people simply did not know of the existence of a final solution to the Jewish problem. The Nazis cleverly masked their most heinous intentions. The Jews, on the other hand, being an optimistic people by nature, saw in every movement of the enemy a possibility for the betterment of their lives. When they were told they were being taken to a work camp in which they would work and find housing, they believed it, for they knew nothing different. When scattered reports came back of gas chambers, of mass murders and of crematoria, the Jews considered these reports to be groundless rumors, the ravings of people who had gone mad under the oppression of a brutal enemy.

These, then are some of the reasons for the poverty of Jewish resistance.

Solidarity Day — May 6

The Jewish community of New York has declared Sunday, May 6 as Solidarity Day for Soviet Jewry. On that day, we will display our concern for Soviet Jewry in general and our support for congressional legislation in particular which will force the Soviet Union to grant opportunities for exit to those Soviet Jews who want to leave the country.

The major effort will consist of a massive march down Fifth Avenue, similar to the one that was held last year. As we did last year, the Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz community will assemble in front of the Synagogue House at 11:00 A.M. on Sunday. From there we will march down Park Avenue in concert to join the line of March in our designated area. Those who joined us last year know the great feeling which we gained for ourselves and demonstrated to others on that march down Park Ave. and then in the mass march in which we joined our fellow Jews of the metropolitan area.

This event is sponsored in our community by Kehilath Jeshurun for Soviet Jewry. Please join us at 11:00 o'clock in front of the Synagogue House, Sunday morning, May 6th.

Millions could not resist because of their physical and spiritual makeup. There was no support for resistance from the outside. There were no arms inside. Knowledge of the truth was almost non-existent in the ghettos of Eastern Europe. Finally, those who did resist realized that when they did so, they were not only risking their own lives but the lives of hundreds who did not share their decision.

In the face of this analysis by Michael Elkins, it is no wonder that millions went to their deaths without resistance. Rather it is a wonder that thousands upon thousands did fight the Nazi brutes and did exact their own heavy penalty of an eye for an eye, and a life for a life. Many of those resisters died in their battle. Some have survived and are living a new life in Israel. A few are still engaged in the campaign of resistance against those Nazis who have not yet been punished. The eye for an eye is still being taken.
