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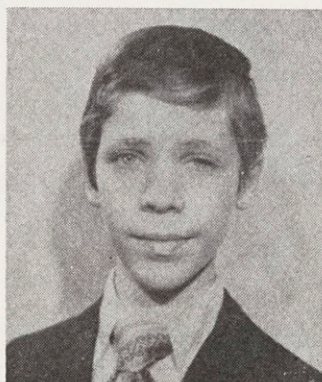

## A RELIGIOUS RESPONSE TO THE YOM KIPPUR WAR

(A summary of a recently delivered sermon by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein)

There have been many responses to the Yom Kippur War and its tragic aftermath. Jews have risen to the defense of the State of Israel in perhaps unprecedented fashion, economically, politically, emotionally and morally. One response, however, has been notable by its absence: the religious response.

To be sure, many prayers have been offered in behalf of Israel and its citizens. Memorial prayers have been offered to the fallen; mishebeirachs have been uttered for the wounded; psalms have been said for everyone. There is, however, a further response that is necessary from the religious point of view: repentance. This has always been the traditional response in crisis. We repent and we try to do good deeds.

The Talmud advises that when a man feels pain afflicting him and crisis enveloping him, he should examine his deeds. Maimonides in the beginning of Hilkhot Ta'anit indicates that fasting and repentance are a proper response to communal tragedy and personal difficulty.

This response, of course, has serious theological implications. It affirms that in some way God is involved in the crisis. Our "tsoros" did not simply come by coincidence. In some fashion our behavior made the problem possible, perhaps even necessary. Jud-

alism's concern, however, is not to cast around for the guilty parties. It is not our task to ferret out the sinners in our midst or even to determine which sins have precipitated the crisis. This would be an act of terrible arrogance on our part, one which is specifically forbidden by the Talmud in Baba Metzia (58B). It would constitute a violation of the Biblical command: "Do not wrong your neighbor" — including even wronging him with words.

The thrust of the religious response is not to cast blame on others but rather to search for ways of improving ourselves and society. By doing this, we believe we may be relieving the cause — still unknown — of the crisis for which we accept, tacitly a measure of responsibility.

Furthermore, the path of repentance has another religious purpose. It is a form of appealing to God for a change in our situation. It is surprising how many people believe in prayer as a method of appeal, while they ignore teshuva as another form of statement to God. If we have faith that God will hear our prayers (although He may not answer them fully in accordance with our wishes) should we not have at least as much faith in our ability to appeal to Him through religious moral and ethical behavior?

Surely the religious personality believes that repentance and good

deeds, as much as prayer, influence the judgment of the Almighty. We are all familiar with the famous liturgical poem of Rabbi Amnon, recited by us on the day the Yom Kippur War broke out, in which we say that "prayer, penitence and righteousness will avert the evil decree."

Perhaps, then, along with contributions to the U.J.A., the purchase of Israel Bonds, attendance at protest rallies, and the dispatching of telegrams and letters to public officials, we ought to embark also upon a religious campaign in an effort to improve the desperate situation in which Israel and world Jewry find themselves at present. We have much to do in the realm of repentance. We might try to avoid arrogance; we might endeavor to reduce anger among people, to practice love and kindness towards fellow human beings, to pray more regularly and more fervently, to study Torah, to keep the Sabbath and to give tzedakah to deserving institutions on the home front which are currently starving because of the necessary contributions to Israel's survival.

It is perhaps characteristic of the way of Lubavitch that the great Rebbe of Lubavitch wrote a letter to the American Jewish community recently in which he called for a similar effort. He reminds us of the prophetic promise that "Zion shall be redeemed through law and its returnees through righteousness." Is it too simplistic and naive to believe that God is waiting for the full response of His people?
