NADJARI AND THE BERNSTEINS TO HEADLINE MEN'S CLUB-RAMAZ PARENTS COUNCIL GATHERING, OCTOBER 21

The Men's Club of the congregation, in cooperation with the Ramaz School Parents Council, will present a very significant evening on the subject of Soviet Jewry on Monday, October 21, at 8:00 o'clock in the Kamber Auditorium. On that occasion, Maurice Nadjari, Special Prosecutor, will join with Ricki and David Bernstein — our Youth Directors — in a program entitled: **"INTERVENTION IN THE SOVIET UNION; Prosecutor to Prosecutor, Person to Person."**

Mr. Nadjari visited the Soviet Union last May in a special effort in behalf of Jewish Prisoners of Conscience. His experiences were very significant and the results of his trip most productive.

Ricki and David Bernstein have just

returned from the Soviet Union. During the Yom Kippur and Sukkoth period they were in Vilna, Riga, Talin, Minsk and Moscow, where they brought encouragement and strength to Soviet Jews who need such support from American Jewry. They have returned with an incredible story of experiences and personalities encountered during a three-week stay. They expect to illustrate their story with films which they brought back from their trip.

We urge all members of the KJ-Ramaz community to be present on Monday night, October 21 for what promises to be an unforgettable evening. May we advise you to come early in order to be sure of a seat.

PRESIDENT OF COLPA TO ADDRESS OPENING COUPLES CLUB MEETING AT THE LOOKSTEINS

The first meeting of the year for the Couples Club of the Congregation will be held at the home of Rabbi and Mrs. Haskel Lookstein on Saturday night, October 26 at 8:30. The guest speaker that evening will be Howard I. Rhine, President of the National Jewish Commission on Law and Public Affairs (COLPA). Mr. Rhine, a graduate of the Yeshiva of Flatbush, Yeshiva University and NYU Law School, heads an organization of Orthodox attorneys and social scientists which has assumed the responsibility for representing the Orthodox Jewish community in the legal sphere. COLPA submits legal briefs in courts on every level throughout the United States concerning issues affecting the interests

and rights of the Orthodox Jewish community.

In addition, COLPA assists in the drafting of legislation and administrative rulings throughout the country on matters which touch upon the rights of observant Jews. COLPA has also been involved in the issue of aid to parochial schools, poverty programs and adoption services.

Mr. Rhine will discuss the subject: "Civil Rights of the Religious Jew." Members of the Couples Club have already received an invitation to attend this meeting. TALMUD II

A Sunday Morning Study Group

This class will continue the study of chapter one of Berakhot, using the El Am Talmud, an edition of the Talmud which comes with an excellent English translation and illuminating notes on the text. We urge students to begin the program by coming to the minyan on Sunday morning at 8:30, following which a light breakfast will be served and the study session begun. The class normally meets from 9:30 until 10:30.

TALMUD III

A Midtown, Midweek, Midday, Study Group

This course will meet every other Tuesday from 12:15 until 1:30 in a midtown office of one of the students. A light luncheon will be served at the beginning of the session. The group will study the Tractate Kiddushin, dealing with the rules of marriage and other related subjects. The El Am edition of the Talmud (see Talmud 365) will be used in order to make the course useful for beginners as well as for advanced students. The course is designed for men and women who are willing to set aside an hour and a quarter every other week for the study of Talmud in a location and setting convenient to their place of work.

TALMUD IV

A Midweek, Midday, Study Group for Women

For the first time, the K. J. Adult Institute will conduct a Talmud Class specifically designed to meet the needs of women in the community. The class will meet every Tuesday morning from 10:00 until 11:00 in the Synagogue Library. It will study the Tractate of Kiddushin (See Talmud 613) from the El Am edition. The class is open to women who have had previous experience with Talmud as well as to the larger number of women who, through no fault of their own, have been deprived of Talmud study until now.

It is our feeling that studying the oral tradition contained in the Talmud is as essential for women as it is for men. We feel that this course presents a unique opportunity and challenge which we hope will be accepted and enjoyed by women in the K. J.-Ramaz community and throughout the neighborhood.

HEBREW TO READ SIDDUR BY

KEHILATH JESHURUN—RAMAZ COMMUNITY LEADS NEW YORK CONFERENCE RALLY FOR SOVIET JEWRY

One of the greatest days in the history of this congregation and the school which it sponsors, was experienced on Sunday, Chol Hamoed Sukkoth, October 6, when more than 1,000 people gathered in front of our synagogue to march with a Torah donated by the congregation to a rally of 20,000 New Yorkers in behalf of Soviet Jewry. The rally was held at Gracie Mansion Park, East End Avenue and 84th Street.

Accompanied by Governor Wilson, Attorney General Lefkowitz, Bronx Borough President Robert Abrams, Senator Javits, District Attorney Kuh and other dignitaries, the marchers brought our Torah to Gracie Mansion Park where, before a packed throng, Eugene Hollander presented the Torah in behalf of the congregation to Elie Wiesel, who accepted it in behalf of the Jews of Khust.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein's Address

Theodore Bikel, Master of Ceremonies at the Rally, asked our Rabbi to explain the significance of this gift. Rabbi Haskel Lookstein told the rally that this Torah, which was itself saved from the Holocaust in Hungary and given as a gift to our congregation, was now being given by the congregation to the Jews of Khust, a city in Russia near the Hungarian border. In that city, a suspicious fire had destroyed the synagogue which the workers of the city had wanted to turn into a sports palace. The Jews were still davening in the synagogue, but without a Torah. The Rabbi told the cheering gathering that this Torah would be brought to Khust and "the Jews there will read from it as we read from ours; They will dance with the Torah as we dance with ours; they will study this Torah as we study ours."

The Rabbi then called upon the throng to join him in the Simchat Torah theme song of Moscow Jewry: Havah Nagila. The response was enthusiastic. New York Jews sang Moscow Jewry's song, perhaps even loud enough for the echoes to be heard in the capital of the Soviet Union.
