## A CHANUKAH MESSAGE The Ups and Downs of Jewish History

During this season of the year, when we recite Hallel every morning, two adjacent verses that seem to contradict each other attract our attention. The first verse states: "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be happy on it." The second verse, following immediately after it, states: "Please God, save us."

How strange that these two verses, the one expressing joy, happiness and achievement, and the other, expressing anxiety, fear and insecurity, should come together in the book of Psalms and in our prayers. How are these two opposite moods to be reconciled?

In fact, these two verses reflect the ups and downs of Jewish history. It has been the lot of the Jew to go from the dizzying heights of achievement, security and bliss to the depths of insecurity, fear and trembling. Just when we think we have arrived, we find out that we have barely started out on our road to the Promised Land.

In our own day, we have seen this clearly and decisively in the rapid changes which have overtaken the Jewish people during the last 28 years. The glorious euphoria that attended the United Nations vote in November of 1947 was shattered by the brutal assault upon Israel staged by all of its Arab neighbors. The great feelings of exhilaration brought about by the swift and successful Sinai campaign in 1956 were reversed by the forced retreat of Israel from the Sinai under the administration of the late and eminently forgettable John Foster Dulles.

More recently, the feeling of triumph and a dream fulfilled which attended the great victory in the Six Day War was dispelled by the new and difficult problems which arose in the wake of the Yom Kippur War. Shavuot of 1967 was "the day the Lord has chosen for gladness and joy." Yom Kippur 1973 was the day on which we began to say: "Please God, save us."

This Chanukah season of the year 5736 is not entirely a happy one. The oil that flows in our menorahs cannot completely supersede the oil that flows from Arab wells. The heroism of a small people is sorely taxed and strained by the overwhelming strength of powerful and rich Middle-Eastern states. Our joy is not unmitigated; our gladness is not uncompromised.

Nevertheless we believe in the God whom we address with the words: "Please God, save us." As He has heard us and answered us in history, He will hear us today.

May God who worked miracles for our forefathers in days gone by at this season of the year perform miracles for us speedily and in our time.

## PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING CHANUKAH CANDLES Beginning with Friday Afternoon, November 28

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which should be kept in mind.

1. **The Menorah** — While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary — and desirable — for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah lamps.

2. The Time for Lighting — The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah. On Friday afternoon they are lit before the Sabbath candles and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half.

3. Arranging the Candles — The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candlelighter faces it. Each night an additional candle is lit

4. Lighting the Candles — The candles are lit from left to right — starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited — three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited we light the candles by the flame of the "Shamash."

The reason for using the "Shamash" is in order to avoid using the candles
