Disgruntled Soviet Jew an Agent?

One of the seven malcontents who condemned Israel at an officially staged press conference that received front page coverage in the **New York Times** of Saturday, February 7th, has a background that strongly suggests that he was an agent planted by the Soviet Union in Israel.

Borris Bravstein came to Israel in March of 1971. His wife gave birth to a son shortly after their arrival in Israel, the first child to be born at an absorption center. His birth was the occasion for a feast and festivities at the center.

The Bravsteins soon received a flat in Beersheba and Mr. Bravstein's mother received a flat of her own. He also found a good job as an engineer in the Housing Ministry. He seemed quite content with his life in Israel until a Kiev newspaper published an article

signed by him in which he denounced Israel and its government.

In 1972, Bravstein returned to the Soviet Union, receiving his re-entry visa without any delay, unlike other potential returnees, who are forced to languish in a Vienna ghetto because Soviet authorities refuse to readmit them. Strangely, Bravstein got back his former apartment in the Soviet Union that was apparently saved for him. He was given a new job at Ovir, the Soviet visa office, where he interviews Jews applying for visas to emigrate to Israel.

The story of such a "Jew" was apparently news fit to print on the front page of the **New York Times**.

ONE GENERATION AFTER

It is 31 years since the liberation of Auschwitz in January, 1945. During these 31 years, the world has discovered the horrors of man's inhumanity to man, the extent of man's potential bestiality and the reality of hell on earth.

31 years of discovery and memory. But now, one generation after Auschwitz, we wonder: has the world forgotten? Have the Jews themselves forgotten? Has our memory been dimmed by the years, our hearts desensitized, our perception dulled? Have we forgotten what a modern Amelek did to 6,000,000 who died and to hundreds of thousands of others who miraculously survived the concentration camps?

We rather think that people are forgetting. Perhaps such loss of memory is natural. But an unparalleled horror calls for an unparalleled memory. In order to nurture that memory, we will print periodically in this **Bulletin** a personal chronicle from the recollections of a survivor of the death camps. We invite those survivors to write such chronicles which we will publish anonymously in the hope and prayer that "lo tishkach" — we may not forget.

AN ANONYMOUS CHRONICLE

"My own personal experience began during the Passover holidays of 1944, when 5,000 of us were crowded together in a Hungarian ghetto which was fit for only 50 families. On April 27th, following two weeks of such 'living', every one of us had to be in the ghetto streets on one hour's notice. We were herded like cattle to the railroad station.

"It was market day and all of our Christian 'friends' were in the streets, watching how the Jews were driven through the town. I do not remember any onlookers who were not happy about what they saw.

"Arriving at the railroad station, we were jammed into cattle wagons — 70 to 80 people to a wagon. There was one pail of water for us all, no food and no sanitary facilities. Our destination was unknown.

"After several days of traveling under subhuman conditions, we arrived in Birkenau. Some of us arrived dead. Birkenau was a receiving station for Auschwitz. We were ordered to descend from the cattle cars and to form a line of march toward a medical doctor, Mengele. This 'doctor' selected the arrivals to the left or the right. Families were divided forever. Older people and young people with children were sent to the left, which meant that within an hour they would be burn-

ed in the crematorium. Those to the right were marched to a large camp, bewildered, pushed, shoved and beaten by the capos and guards.

"The first order to us was to undress. All of our clothing and possessions were taken from us. Men were separated from women. Everyone walked totally in the nude. We were shaven from head to toe, and only after several days were we given striped pajamas, which were in reality simple rags.

"At night we were housed in large barracks, packed in like sardines. There was no way for sleep or rest. We soon reached the point of total exhaustion.

"I remember my first night in the barracks. Lying on my bunk, I found myself wet from tears which came down from an upper bunk. People cried their hearts out as they started to realize what was happening to them.

"Not many knew the story. I learned from a Jewish capo very shortly after my arrival in the camp the following: 'You see that big chimney with the huge fire? That is where the people are burned. Those going to the left will be gassed and then cremated. Try to get out to a working camp as soon as possible because this is the biggest hell on earth.'"
