Amendments to the Certificate of Incorporation

Last year, an historic amendment to the Certificate of Incorporation of the Congregation was passed by an overwhelming vote. It provided for the right to elect women members of the Congregation as trustees. At that meeting, the first woman trustee in the history of the Congregation was elected. She is Mrs. Meyer Texon and she has been serving as a Board member since last May.

There is a further matter of a similar nature which remains to be clarified in our Certificate of Incorporation. At present, married women are members solely through the membership of their husbands. They have no independent membership rights. The Constitution Committee presented to the Board of Trustees two months ago a proposed amendment which would give the wives of male members independent status as members on their own. This would of course include the right to vote independently.

SISTERHOOD TO HOLD BRUNCHEON

WEDNESDAY, MAY 18th at 11:30

The Sisterhood of the Congregation will hold a Spring Bruncheon on Wednesday morning, May 18th at 11:30 in our Kamber Auditorium. This is the gala annual event of the Sisterhood season which provides a delightful social atmosphere and which also makes it possible for the Sisterhood to carry on its broad and varied program of community support.

What Kind of Community Support?

The Sisterhood does so many things quietly that many of us are not aware of just how much support it renders to the community. Here are some samples:

- 1. The Kiddush served to our worshippers every Shabbat morning is furnished by the Sisterhood and paid for when there is no private sponsor.
- 2. When a memorial tablet must be purchased for the Congregation as is the case this year the Sisterhood pays for it.
- 3. At present, a large group of ladies is engaged in creating a new chupah from needlepoint. This project is paid for and worked for by the Sisterhood.
 - 4. The Y.M.H.A. recently installed

a kosher kitchen for the use of residents who would like to keep kosher while residing at the Y. Through a grant from the Sisterhood all of the necessary utensils, dishes and tableware were provided free of charge.

- 5. Every year the Ramaz School receives a substantial scholarship gift from the Sisterhood. In addition, the Sisterhood is currently paying for a piano which the school needed for its music program.
- 6. The Sisterhood also provides scholarship assistance to enable as many as ten children from the community to attend camp every summer. This is in addition to the charitable work done for "neediest cases."

You see, then, that when you attend the Sisterhood Bruncheon you are in fact making possible many of the essential features that go toward enabling a community to function in happiness as well as in sorrow, in joy as well as in time of difficulty.

Shabbaton and Mini-Demonstration to Remember

We are deeply grateful to Walter Koppel, Chairman of the Shabbaton last weekend, and to his extraordinarily competent co-workers, led by Susan Stein, Jerry Rindner and Ruth and Murray Kushner, to mention but a few, for the beautiful program that made our Shabbaton so memorable. From the beginnings of Kabbalat Shabbat on Friday night until after the luncheon and program on Shabbat day, everything was done to perfection: the services, Ambassador Herzog's address, the delicious meals, the ruach and the delightful, social atmosphere, topped by the panel discussion featuring Dr. Michael Wyshogrod, Hon. Zvi Levine, and Dr. Gilbert Kahn.

One of the surprise highlights of the Shabbaton was the participation of almost the entire congregation on Shabbat morning in a march to the Museum of Art on 82nd Street and Fifth Avenue where we recited prayers in behalf of Anatoly Sharansky who has been held incommunicado for the last five weeks in a Moscow prison. As Rabbi Haskel Lookstein urged from the pulpit, it is simply impossible for us to conduct our lives on a normal schedule when a heroic Jew is being oppressed so blatantly by the Soviet authorities. We had to respond in some way for him, for the Soviet Government and, frankly, even for our own self-respect as Jews.

The Rabbi reminded the Congregation of the law in the Shulchan Aruch which says that one is not allowed to pray out of sorrow on Shabbat except in certain unusual circumstances, among which is the case of a Jew who is taken by non-Jews into captivity. Our mini-demonstration was in fulfillment of that Halachic ruling.

We hope that our prayers will be answered and we pray that the spirit of the Shabbaton itself will inspire us religiously, intellectually and nationally in the months to come.
