Tisha b'Av 5737 will never be forgotten by those who worshipped with us in our main synagogue. The occasion was made unforgettable by the presence in our midst of the Prime Minister of the State of Israel, Honorable Menahem Begin.

The Prime Minister's visit was made possible through the joint efforts of our good friends, Ambassador Haim Herzog and Consul Zvi Levine. The beauty of the occasion was ensured by the outstanding cooperation extended by the officials of the Congregation, the officients of Kehilath Jeshurun and a fine representation of ushers who helped to maintain our traditional dignity.

Even the presence of television cameras and the press did not detract from the beauty and impressiveness of the moment when the Prime Minister entered the Synagogue with the Congregation standing to be greeted by the Rabbi simply with the blessing which is pronounced over Jewish royalty: "Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the Universe Who shares His glory with those who revere Him."

The Prime Minister, together with

Ambassador Simcha Dinitz, Ambassador Herzog and Consul General Ben Ari, sat in the side pew alongside the Rabbi for Ma'ariv services led in a particularly moving fashion by Cantor Davis. Following Ma'ariv, our honored guests, together with others of the Congregation, took their seats on the stairs of the front platform for the reading of Eicha and the reciting of Kinnot. It was a thrilling moment to watch and listen as the Prime Minister read almost every word of Eicha with the Rabbi, the Cantor, Allan Friedman, Binnie Shudofsky and George Baumgarten who led the reading of the five chapters of the Scroll.

Following the Kinnot and the various interpolations, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein asked the Congregation to rise and to chant Shir Ha-Ma'alot B'Shuv Ha-Shem et Shivat Zion to the melody of Ha-Tikva. As the Congregation chanted these words of love of Zion and hope for its redemption, the Prime Minister and his colleagues left the Synagogue in an impressive recession. There was hardly a dry eye as the procession reached the door with the words: "The one who carries the seeds does so in tears; but he will bear the harvest in joy."

COURSE OFFERINGS

TALMUD

405 — Mishna

Instructor: Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein

This course will involve the daily study of one Mishna with classical commentaries. It will meet four times a week following Shacharit, throughout the year.

337 — Talmud: Rosh Hashanah

Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

This course will use the Babylonian Talmud, Tractate Rosh Hashanah and classical commentaries, as its basic text. The main topic of discussion in chapter four is the Rosh Hashanah service of prayer. The course will meet one hour before Mincha Services on Shabbat, throughout the year.

The Lulav procession in the synagogue has become more impressive each year as more worshippers join the line of march. It is desirable to have a Lulav and Etrog for synagogue use and one for home use.

The purchase of a Lulav and Etrog is a requirement of Jewish Law. There is, however, a practical element involved. When one purchases a Lulav and Etrog, he simultaneously contributes to the strengthening of the economy of the State of Israel.
