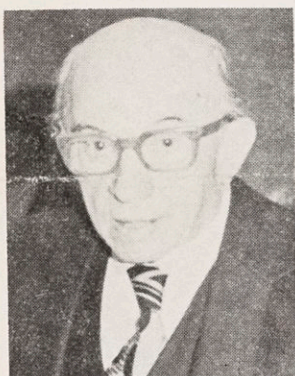

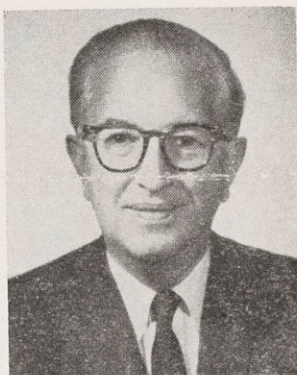

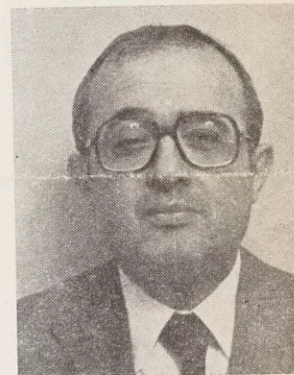

YOUTH ACTIVITIES

Junior Congregation

Under the able leadership of Eugene Major, Junior Congregation (2nd-6th grades) meets every Shabbat and holiday at 10:15 A.M., and ends with its own kiddush. OCTOBER 8 — FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF BIKKUR CHOLIM SOCIETY

This coming Shabbat B'reishit, October 8th, the Bikkur Cholim Society of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun will be one year old. It was exactly a year ago that the Society began holding Shabbat services at Memorial Hospital under the leadership of a number of volunteers from the community.

Since Shabbat B'reishit 5737, services have been held every Shabbat, rain or shine, winter and summer. We continue to get many letters from patients in the hospital who have been inspired by this program.

Each week, one of the men from the Congregation leads the service, assisted by a group of about ten men and women who make the rounds in the hospital and bring down to the service those patients who would like to come. The service lasts a half hour and includes readings in Hebrew and English, together with a little sermonette on the weekly portion. Following the service, there is Kiddush in the special room provided by the hospital and, in addition, Kiddush is brought around by the volunteers to many of those patients who cannot come to the service.

The program is under the leadership of Dr. Albert Hornblass who is in charge of the service and Mrs. Rosalie Kleinhaus who coordinates the volunteer assistants. It is part of the gen-

eral Bikkur Cholim Society which is under the Co-Chairmanship of Mrs. Tova Bulow and Mrs. Sue Robins.

The other major activity of our Society is performed in conjunction with Lenox Hill Hospital where we have a patient visiting service which brings comfort and assistance to the patients in the hospital.

The Society also arranges Shabbat accommodations for relatives of patients in our community. Hundreds of people have been served by this program during the past year.

Members of our Bikkur Cholim Society number more than 50. Among them are singles, married couples, young adults, senior citizens and people from every segment of our Congregation. They are performing a great mitzvah every time they render a service; but they all attest to the fact that they receive far more than they give.

The Bikkur Cholim Society of the Congregation is an auxiliary of the Commission on Synagogue Relations of Federation and performs its services through the cooperation of the Chaplaincy Service of the New York Board of Rabbis. CONGREGATION TO DEDICATE TORAH IN HONOR OF SOVIET JEWS

Dedication to be Highlight of the Simchat Torah Soviet Jewry Rally on Sunday, October 2, 11 A.M.

The Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry will hold a Simchat Torah rally of solidarity with Soviet Jews on Sunday, Chol ha-Moed Sukkot, October 2, at 11 A.M., in Carl Schurz Park at 84th Street and East End Avenue. The Simchat Torah Rally is an annual event of the Conference and is designed to draw attention to the heroism of Soviet Jews who gather outside of the synagogues in Moscow and Leningrad to identify as Jews on this festival.

The Conference has asked our Congregation to dedicate a Sefer Torah in honor of all those Soviet Jews who cannot come to the Torah on Simchat Torah or, for that matter, on any other day of the year. We are making arrangements to dedicate one of our Torahs. We will march with it from in front of the Synagogue and Ramaz School on Sunday morning, October 2nd at 11 o'clock.

We ask all members and friends of the Congregation and parents and students in Ramaz to help make this rally significant — and newsworthy — by assembling promptly at 11 A.M., on October 2nd on 85th Street between Lexington and Park Avenues. We will march from there, together with the Torah, to the park at East End Avenue and 84th Street where we will join the assemblage which will gather from all over Greater New York.

Soviet Jews require a heroic nature to identify themselves as Jews publicly on Simchat Torah. You and I need only two hours of time and a little interest in order to identify ourselves with those heroic Jews. Please join us on October 2nd.
