Chanukah Dinner of Yeshiva University to be Held at Waldorf Astoria Sunday, December 11

The annual Chanukah Dinner of Yeshiva University will be held this year at the conclusion of the festival of Chanukah, Sunday evening, December 11, at the Waldorf-Astoria. The dinner will be in honor of three new officers of the Board of Trustees: Hon. Herbert Tenzer, Chairman; Stanley Stern, Vice-Chairman and Ludwig Jesselson, Treasurer.

Yeshiva University is currently undergoing a large-scale reorganization in its academic and service areas. Several new University-wide vicepresidents have been appointed by Dr. Norman Lamm, President of the University. Their appointment augurs well for the development of new curricula in the undergraduate and graduate divisions of Yeshiva.

Victor Geller Returns

One of the nicest developments in the reorganization is the return of Victor B. Geller as Dean of the new Division of Communal Services. Dean Geller is one of the most astute observers of Jewish life in this country, particularly with respect to Orthodox community organization and administration. At a recent convention of rabbinic alumni of Yeshiva, Dean Geller explained what this new division will mean to the community.

The division will be composed of four departments. The Department of Rabbinic Services will help to serve the needs of the Yeshiva rabbi in his pulpit or professional work. The Director of that department will be Rabbi Herschel Schacter.

The Department for Synagogue Services will be headed by Rabbi Robert Hirt and will be concerned with establishing relationships with congregations and communities all over the country. This department will service the congregations with religious and educational programs and try to guide new communities in strengthening and developing their synagogue life.

A third department headed by Dr. Abraham Stern will be concerned with Youth Services in an expanded format. In addition to the highly successful Torah leadership seminars, there will be Torah tours out of town and around the world. Family Shabbatonim will be organized and other activities of a similar nature will be launched.

Finally, there will be a Department of Educational Services which will establish relationships with Orthodox Day Schools throughout the country and which will also help to service bureaus of education in the United States, providing personnel for the bureaus and the schools which they service.

The creation of this new Division of Communal Services, headed by Dean Geller and by Robert Hirt as Assistant Dean, means that Yeshiva is making a new commitment to serve the total Jewish community in a vigorous way. We applaud this development as a sign of Yeshiva's deep sense of responsibility toward the totality of Jewish life in America.

We urge our congregants to make reservations for the Yeshiva University dinner as soon as possible. Yeshiva is on the move. If it is to move effectively and successfully, it requires the support of communities such as ours. Your attendance at that dinner will constitute such support.

For the third year in a row, the KJ - Ramaz Blood Bank will hold its Blood Donor Drive. This year it will be on Sunday, November 20th from 9:30 A.M. until 2:30 P.M.

The Blood Bank covers all members of the Congregation and their families and parents of Ramaz students and their families. In the event of an emergency, if a family in the group needs blood, they can obtain it free of charge by calling Abe Esses at 860-3166 or they can contact the Synagogue Office and we will make the necessary arrangements.

In order for the Blood Bank to continue in operation, however, we must have a minimum number of donors each year. It is an act of communal responsibility, therefore, for anyone between the ages of 17 and 65 to come on Sunday, November 20th and to give blood.

We should add that giving blood under any circumstances is always a mitzvah of the highest priority. Since a blood transfusion is always a matter of saving a life (in accordance with the Jewish legal definition of what constitutes saving a life) it follows that anyone who gives blood is performing that great mitzvah.
